

FORD AGAINST ANNUAL WAGE

Plan Is Not Feasible, Manufacturer Says

Rumors After Roosevelt Visit Set At Rest at Dearborn

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Dearborn, Mich., May 13 (UP)—An executive of the Ford Motor company told the United Press today that Henry Ford was unalterably opposed to giving his workers an annual, guaranteed wage.

Ford's idea was explained to be that most workers themselves opposed the set wage because it would rob them of their maximum potential earning power.

There had been considerable speculation as to whether Ford was considering the establishment of a minimum annual wage, and whether he had discussed such a plan on his visit to the White House recently. President Roosevelt had publicly suggested such a plan to employers generally, and it was thought he might have broached it with Ford.

The company spokesman told the United Press today, however, that Ford considered the plan neither feasible for his vast River Rouge plant nor for the industry as a whole, and that he regarded the entire theory of annual wages as "impractical and illogical."

A month ago, Governor Frank Murphy, a close ally of the administration, publicly called upon Ford to establish an annual minimum wage. The manufacturer declined comment at the time. There were indications that Murphy's appeal to Ford to plan the movement on request from Washington.

A few days before Ford visited Washington two weeks ago, an independent labor organization of Ford workers made a request to Edsel Ford, president of the company, for a \$1,500 annual minimum wage. It was the Ford Brotherhood of America, described by the national labor relations board as a company union, which made the proposal after conferring with Ford counsel.

The brotherhood proposed each worker would buy a Ford car every two years as part of the plan.

It was learned the request was taken under advisement by Ford officials and rejected. The attitude of a Ford official said then: "If we would guarantee an annual wage," he asked, "who would guarantee us an annual production?"
