

# STOCK TRADE IS UNSETTLED

## Czech Situation Puts Markets Down

### Drop in Steel Operations Also Factor Among Wall Streeters

**MARKETS AT A GLANCE**

Stocks lower in quiet trade. Bonds irregularly lower and quiet. U. S. governments touch new 19.8 high.

Curb stocks irregularly lower. Foreign exchange lower; guildler weak.

New York, May 21 (UP)—Uncertainty over the Czechoslovakian situation and a sharp drop in steel operations at Pittsburgh unsettled the stock market today. Trading was moderately active. Prices registered losses ranging to 2 points.

Bethlehem Steel dropped to 44 1/4 off 2 and U. S. Steel was down 1 1/4 off 4 1/4.

Before New York opened the Amsterdam market was weak, reflecting uncertainties in Czechoslovakia. The situation was considered alarming.

Other adverse market factors included delay in President Roosevelt's signing of the tax bill, but there were several favorable items. Principal was the speech by William O. Douglas, chairman of the securities and exchange commission, who promised cooperation with the stock exchange in eliminating abuses and said the object of the commission was to give the exchange broader policing power, with the commission standing in the background.

Another item construed as favorable was the effort of a senate committee to prevent use of WPA funds for construction of utilities in competition with private companies. Utility shares held better than other sections early, but prices sagged before the close.

Railroad issues yielded fractionally.

Johns Manville lost 3 points and losses of 2 points or more were noted in U. S. Gypsum, Allied Chemical, DuPont, and Owens Illinois Glass. Declines of a point or more were made by Allis Chalmers, Westinghouse Electric, American Metals, Boeing Airplane, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Loew's, McKeesport Tin Plate, Oliver Farm, Sears Roebuck and Union Carbide.

Dow Jones closing stock averages: industrial, 113.25, off 1.74; rail, 21.73, off 0.17; utility, 19.0, off 0.11; 70 stocks, 36.08, off 0.45.

Stock sales approximated 290,000 shares against 220,000 shares in the short session a week ago. Curb stock sales were 56,000 against 42,000.

## Crook County Returns Are Still Incomplete

Prineville, May 21—Four out of five Crook county precincts were still missing from the tabulation columns here this afternoon as returns from yesterday's election were counted, but general interest in the election quickly subsided today when it was learned that Martin had conceded election to Hess in the race for the democratic nomination as governor. Crook county voted strongly in favor of Martin and also gave Sprague a nice vote. Balestine and Pierce led their respective parties in the contests for representative from the escand Oregon district.

There were no local election contests. R. H. Botten, incumbent, is the republican nominee for sheriff, and Ernest McKenzie, city marshal here, is the democratic nominee.

## Knoxville Prepares to Purchase Utility

Knoxville, Tenn., May 21 (UP)—The Knoxville city council today unanimously approved the agreement whereby the city and TVA plan to purchase the electric facilities of the Tennessee Public Service company for \$7,900,000.

It was announced the city's share of the purchase price would be \$5,375,000.

In approving the plan the council praised Mayor Myrnat for "making a good business deal."

W. H. Peters, former city law director, was engaged to help draft contracts for the sale.

Revenue bonds will be issued against the electric system to finance the city's part of the purchase, it was announced.

If the transaction is completed it will mark the first acquisition of private utility properties by the TVA and a municipality it serves.

The republican contest for senator was even more one-sided in Deschutes county, Rufus Holman getting 977 votes and Robert N. Stanfield 344.

For congressman, democrats in this county backed Walter M. Pierce better than two to one. Pierce had 1226 votes and Wade Crawford 603. The republicans favored U. S. Balestine for the position, giving him 790 votes to 269 for Bayard T. Merrill and 114 for Rennie A. Tull.

Rex Putnam, former Redmond school man, carried this county by a big margin in the democratic contest for state superintendent. Putnam had 1118 votes and John W. Leonhardt 535.

## Czech Border Closed; Germans Halt Traffic

sted to a government spokesman said tonight.

The statement was issued after a long conference at the foreign office by Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet with the Czech minister and the British and soviet ambassadors—both of the latter countries being tied by treaty to the protection of Czechoslovakia against aggression.

The statement reiterated that France will discharge her treaty obligations toward Czechoslovakia in the event of aggression. The spokesman said:

"France sincerely hopes that the Czech minority problem can be settled in a friendly manner. France has observed the utmost prudence and has urged Czechoslovakia to give the most possible satisfaction to the Sudeten Germans within the framework of the Czech state, but if Germany crosses the Czech frontier, that will automatically set off war."

London, May 21 (UP)—The mayor of Leger, on the Czech-German border, told the United Press by telephone tonight that police are patrolling the street, everything is most uncertain and the position highly tense.

He refused to comment on the shooting of two Sudeten-German farmers by a border patrol.

## Madrid Neutral Zone Is Shelled by Rebels

Madrid, May 21 (UP)—Rebel batteries shelled the neutral zone of Madrid for the first time today, wrecking the Venezuelan consulate and killing the brother of former Vice-Consul Edouardo Lozano and three servants.

The Venezuelan legation also was damaged. It was believed approximately 12 were killed and 40 wounded during the bombardment, in which about 150 shells were fired.

The roar of artillery in the outskirts of the city and the crash of shells shook the town. Hundreds of terrified civilians took refuge in cellars and underground stations.

Loyalist batteries tried to silence the fire and a violent artillery duel ensued, lasting an hour.

## Butter Trade Steady

Portland, Or., May 21 (UP)—For the fifth consecutive week, the local butter market closed for Saturday's trade with no alterations in the listed quotations or top score and with virtually no difference in the general market position from a week ago.

Market on remaining supplies of old potatoes continued firm Saturday with stepping points holding little or no steels.
