

# Elks Come From Behind to Defeat Washington Browns Sunday

## Graser Triples With Sacks Full Seventh Inning Rally Snatches Victory

A three bagger by Wally Graser in the seventh inning, at a time when the Elks were trailing 2 to 0 and the bases were full, gave Bend a brilliant 3-to-2 victory over the Washington Browns here yesterday afternoon, as the Elks drew a bye in state league competition. The game was the fastest and the best seen on the local field this year.

Up until the seventh inning, the Elks had collected only one hit, and things looked rather bad for the home town team. Bend hit first in the second inning, after Decker and Bubalo struck out and Wally Graser came to bat. Graser hit a hard single over second, but got no farther than first.

George Walker was first up in the seventh inning. He singled and the infield hit appeared to upset Pitcher Lacy of the Browns. Lacy walked Decker and Bubalo, filling the bases. This brought Wally Graser to bat once more. Lacy got two strikes on Graser, but the Bend shortstop met a fast one square on the nose for a three base hit to score Walker, Decker, and Bubalo. That hit won the game for Bend and ended the scoring for the afternoon.

The Elks were held to four hits by the Browns, and Wally Graser collected two of these. Working nicely on the mound for the Elks, Bill Hatch held the powerful Browns to seven hits, well scattered, and two runs. Errors by Hatch's fellow players played a part in the Browns' limited scoring.

A fine play by Vernon Reynolds, Elk third sacker, probably saved the day for Bend. In the sixth inning, the Browns had runners on second and third when Caston hit a very hard ground ball down the third base line that looked like a cinch for a two or three base hit and several runs. But the hard hit ball did not get past Reynolds. He made a beautiful back field catch of the hard hit grounder and retired the runner at first.

Working together as a unit, the Elks played nice ball. Murel Nehl handled the catching for Big Bill Hatch and turned in an outstanding game. Bend's several errors were chiefly caused by the fact that the Elks realized they were up against tough competition. The team the Browns brought here yesterday was the strongest that ever represented the colored nine, formerly known as the St. Louis Blues. Lacy used a fast curve ball against the Elks.

### MAJOR LEAGUES

New York, June 13 (UP)—The New York Yankees beat Cleveland's two greatest pitchers in one game—Johnny Allen and Bob Feller—who folded before 43,702 fans yesterday.

Red Ruffing scored his eighth victory, beating the Indians, 7-6. Ruffing hit a homer with two mates aboard, and rookie Joe Gordon won the game with a homer off Feller in the eighth with Dickey on base.

The New York Giants divided a doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals to maintain their two-game National league lead over the Chicago Cubs. The Giants ran their winning streak to five straight by taking the first game, 8-5. The Cards won their first game of the season from the Giants by annexing the nightcap, 4-1.

Detroit beat Washington, 18-12, after trailing at one time, 11-1. With Gehring and York hitting homers in the sixth the Tigers scored 10 runs. The Athletics won the day's only twin triumph by beating the St. Louis Browns, 8-3, and 1-0 (5 innings). Bob Johnson hit two homers for the A's.

The Boston Red Sox and Chicago White Sox broke even in a doubleheader. The Red Sox won the opener, 3-2. The White Sox took the nightcap, 4-3.

Scoring nine runs in the eighth inning, the Cubs beat Brooklyn, 9-3, but succumbed to Freddy Fitzsimmons' four-hit pitching to lose 6-0 in the second game.

Cincinnati split with Boston, the Bees winning the first game, 6-5, in 10 innings and the Reds taking the second, 7-4.

Pittsburgh won from the Phillies, 11-5.

Golf—Ralph Guldahl retained his U. S. open championship, goldfom to biggest prize by shooting 284, including a sub-par last round of 69, at Cherry Hills, Denver. Guldahl was the first champion to repeat since Bob Jones in 1930 and his winning margin of six strokes was the biggest since 1921. Dick Metz of Chicago was second with 290; Tony Penna of Dayton and Harry Cooper of Chicago, third with 292; Byron Nelson, Reading, fifth with 294; and Emory Zimmerman, Portland, Or., sixth with 295. Patty Berg of Minneapolis, won the women's trans-Mississippi at Tulsa by beating Mrs. Opal Hill, Kansas City, 6 and 5.

Baseball—Johnny Vandermeer, Cincinnati National's rookie left-hander, hurled a no-hit, no-run game against Boston Saturday, the first game of its kind in the league since 1934.

Horse racing—Ligarotti, owned jointly by Bing Crosby and Lin Howard, won the \$5,000 Ingleswood stakes at Hollywood park. Thomas Healey's Tatterdemalion set a track record of 1:44 1/5 in winning the Brandywine stakes at a mile and one-sixteenth at Wilmington, Del. Mythical King registered his fourth straight victory in taking the \$5,000 Shevlin stakes at Aqueduct.

Track and field—Glenn Cunningham won a special three-quarter mile event at the New York A. C. games in New York and also captured an exhibition half-mile at East Orange, N. J.

Tennis—The United States defeated Great Britain, 5-2, in the women's Wimbledon cup matches at Wimbledon, England. Don Budge made a tennis grand slam by winning the French national hard court title to add to his American, British and Australian crowns. ## Ski Tournament Held on Mt. Hood Slopes Sunday

Portland, Or., June 13 (UP)—Lewis Davis of the Tyee ski runners in Vancouver, B. C., captured first place in the senior gold rose race on Mount Hood in the rose festival ski tournament Sunday. His time was 3 minutes, 21 seconds for the three-mile course.

Davis was closely followed by two other Vancouver skiers, Gid Johnson of the Hollywood-Pacific Ski club, in second place with a time of 4:07, and Harry Burfield of the same club with a time of 4:19.

Scott Osborn, Penguin Ski club, Seattle, finished fourth in 4:23. Cecil Morris was the first local skier to finish, placing fifth in 4:29. Fifty skiers participated in the race which was witnessed by 3500 persons.

Gretchen Kunigh, blande star of the Washington Ski club, Seattle, won the downhill race for women. She far outdistanced her competitors with her fast time of 2 minutes 25 seconds. Laurence French, Portland, was second; Maryanne Hill, Portland, was third; and Virginia Bowden, Seattle, was fourth.

## Dr. Willing, Mrs. Eva Oregon Golf Champions

Portland, Or., June 13 (UP)—An eagle three on the 37th hole at Columbia-Edgewater Country club Saturday gave Dr. O. F. Willing his fifth Oregon Golf championship.

The Portland Dentist staved off the last round rush of Harold Salvador, tourney finalist in both 1937 and 1938, to win on the first extra hole.

Mrs. B. E. Eva won the women's championship by defeating Muriel Ventch, 17-year-old Longview, Wash., high school girl, six up.

Wes Berner, City View, defeated Harry Bates, Eastmoreland, 2 and 1, to win the first flight finals. Oscar Furuset, Columbia-Edgewater, beat Richard Weschul, University of Oregon, 1 up, in the second flight, and Clifford Smith, University of Oregon, won from Mile Montag in the third bracket, 3 and 2.

In the fourth flight, Paul Walgren, Corvallis, defeated Jim Shaw, Columbia-Edgewater, 6 and 5. Ralph Holliday, also of Columbia-Edgewater, beat Earl Fortmiller, Albany, on the 19th hole of the fifth flight final, and Tom Hanning, Columbia-Edgewater, won from R. W. Hillbitt, Columbia-Edgewater, 6 and 5, in the sixth flight.

In a play-off for medal honors, Roy Wiggins carded a 69 to beat out Don Moe. Moe and Wiggins were tied at the end of medal play.

## Sport Parade

Denver, Colo., June 13 (UP)—Even par for 72 holes over one of the finest tests of golf in the United States. Not a single six on his card.

A crackling sub-par 69 in the final round when the pressure was on. That's how Ralph Guldahl won the 1938 national open and became the first successful defender of the title since Bob Jones in 1930.

And if you don't think the business of repeating in the open, with the world's greatest golfers as your rivals is a task, just take a look at the record books. Billy Burke won in 1931 and was seventh in 1932. Gene Sarazen took it all in 1933 and finished a scrambling 28th a year later when Johnny Goodman was the winner. Goodman could finish no better than 43rd in his defense in 1934 and Olin Dutra, the winner, was 12th to San Parks the next year. Parks didn't qualify for the last two rounds at Baltusrol when Manero won, and Tony was a submerged 41st at Detroit last year.

But not so Guldahl. The Texan, who only two years ago was hounded by poverty and seemed headed out of golf forever, established an all-time record score of 281 to dominate his field in 1937, and then came right back last Saturday to spread-eagle his foes with a magnificent show of stroking, brains, and heart.

Read all the records and talk to the oldest critics and you won't read or hear of a finer competitive round than Guldahl fired in the shadows of the Rockies at Cherry Hills late Saturday. Four strokes off the leader, Dick Metz, with 18 holes to go, Guldahl provided 8,000 spectators with a round they'll be talking about for years.

When boldness was required he threw his 210 pounds into the shot and let it ride. When finesse was needed he played his shots with the touch of a violinist. Under pressure that literally ripped his rivals apart at the seams, Guldahl coldly, quietly, analyzed every angle. He conquered the wind, the crowd, and the condition of a course that had been churned to lumps by almost a solid week of play by a big field.

He didn't hit a bad shot on this round, and precious few during the entire tournament. Over a layout that had been groomed to make trouble for an off-line or poorly stroked shot, Guldahl never played a hole in more than five strokes. Others had as much as 19 shots on a hole.

Guldahl's even par 284 stands out the more when placed against a background furnished by the aggregates of some of the other famed shotmakers. Here are a few of them: Ed Dudley, 315; Bobby Cruickshank, 312; Lawson Little and Sam Snead, 308; Jimmy Thompson, 308; Morten Smith, 300, and John Revolta, 299.

The champion's score gives life to the argument that Cherry Hills was not a fair test. As a matter of fact, it offered the finest test of golf on any open tournament site in the past decade. It called for all the shots in the bag and the execution of them with the head as well as the hands.
