

New Tennis Courts to Be Scene of Inter-city Tournament Sunday

Klamath Squad To Invade Bend

Matches Scheduled for Sunday Morning

Bend's new tennis courts, surfaced with asphalt during the past month, will be put in use for the first time Sunday in an inter-city tournament between teams representing Bend and Klamath Falls. The courts are being marked this week with yellow lacquer, similar to the traffic lane lines on state highways. The marking will not be completed until Saturday, giving little chance for practice on the new surface before the tournament.

Bend's squad for the tournament will be selected from a group of 10 players, eight being named. In the group are Kenneth Ballantyne, Jerry Olson, Lawrence Gales, Einar Solfors, Bob Foley, Mason Maurer, Maurice Isted, Don Nettleton, Harold Nicholson and Gene Gullis.

Any tennis players wishing to compete for places on the Bend squad in future tournaments are asked to contact Olson. Contests with several town teams are being arranged.

The Klamath Falls squad will be headed by Clifton Richmond, mayor of Klamath Falls. In the group will be Johnny Merryman, former Pomona junior college player; Jack Crawford, two year letterman in tennis at University of Oregon, and Eddie Dent. The other four members of the Klamath team had not been announced today.

Both singles and doubles will be played, with competition beginning at 9:30 a. m.

The concrete tennis courts at the high school, badly cracked in recent years, have been covered with about two inches of asphalt pavement. The work was done by the Warren Northwest company in connection with construction of a set of handball courts alongside the tennis courts. Preliminary grading and concrete work was done under a WPA project last month.

SHUTE DETHRONED BY JIMMY HINES

PGA Champion Defeated in Third Round

Shawnee On Delaware, Pa., July 13 (AP)—One of golf's longest winning streaks was broken today when Denny Shute of West Newton, Mass., the defending champion, was beaten 2 and 1 by Jimmy Hines of New York in the third round of the national PGA tournament.

Shute had won the title two years in succession and his defeat today was his first in 15 P. G. A. matches. Tomorrow Hines, in the quarter-finals, will meet Byron Nelson of Reading, Pa., who crushed Harry Bassler of Long Beach, Cal., 11 and 10.

Jim Foulis, of Chicago, one of the dark horse entries, reached the quarter-finals with a 6 and 5 victory over Marvin Stahl of Lansing.

Shute, who finished the first round all square with Hines, was never ahead in the afternoon session. Two down after 27 holes, he took the 28th and 29th to level the match, but went behind on the 30th when Hines laid him a stymie. Denny did not again draw level.

The end came on the 35th when Shute hooked his drive into the rough, was short with his second, off the green with his third, and had a bogey six.

Sam Snead, the belting West Virginian, moved into the round of eight with a 4-and-3 victory over Felix Serafin, Clarks Summit, Pa. Snead will play Foulis tomorrow.

Billy Burke of Cleveland, the genial cigar-smoker who won the national open title in 1931, was put out by Horton Smith of Chicago, 3 and 2.

Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., moved along with a 4 and 3 victory over Dick Metz of Chicago, who yesterday eliminated U. S. Open Champion Ralph Guldahl.

Paul Runyan, White Plains, N. Y., defeated Ray Mangrum, Oakmont, Pa., 1 up, 37 holes.

Gene Sarazen, Brookfield Centre, Conn., defeated Jimmy Demaret, Houston, 1 up, 38 holes.

World War Veteran Many Times Honored

Asheville, N. C. (UP)—An Asheville druggist has been presented three additional medals by the federal government for service during the World War.

These exhibitions of temper turned the gallery against him. If he doesn't check upon his tournament manners Ralph is likely to find himself the Jack Sharkey of golf.

Joe Belfiore of Detroit is game. Just before he started out on his match with Tony Manero, Belfiore learned of his father's death in New York.

But he went down swinging to the former open champion. They raise 'em tough in Texas if Jimmy Demaret is a typical product.

Most of the press stretch out and rest between rounds, but Jimmy spends his intermissions playing ping pong.

Jimmy Foulis, who upset Jimmy Thomson in the second round, has the finest golfing background of any man in the tournament. His father and his father's father were born in a masie patch of the old St. Andrews course in Scotland, and he can trace his love for golf clear back to a Foulis who tended the fairways of St. Andrews at the time of Cromwell.

Dave Foulis, Jimmy's papa, invented the club we know as the masie niblick and patented the first lining for a golf cup. And Jimmy's Uncle Jim won the second national open in the year 1896.

Marvin Stahl, Lansing, Michigan boy who has been a sensation in the tournament, fulfilled a wish of long standing yesterday. He was introduced to Gene Sarazen. Marvin had been wanting to shake the illustrious Mr. Sarazen's hand ever since he caddied for him back in 1928.

Denny Shute spends an hour or two each night pouring over his stamp collection. Thomson was actually glad to lose yesterday, because the defeat enabled him to catch a night train for Chicago where his wife, the former movie queen, Viola Dana, is recuperating from an operation.

Paul Runyan would win a tournament style show in a walk. He reached a new high in detail yesterday when he appeared in a Snow White polo shirt with "Paul" fetchingly embroidered on the right wing of the collar.

Billy Burke, smokes 10 to 12 cigars during a round. He says they get him so dizzy he isn't awed by a five foot putt.

Anglo-German rapprochement is essential to any lasting plan for peace but it involves tremendous difficulties economically as well as politically and the negotiations may be expected to move very slowly.

Meanwhile, on the fighting fronts, China Japanese aerial bombers again led the Yangtze offensive toward Hankow, pouring explosives into the Chinese defenses at Kiangling has created a serious problem for the Chinese, who have been destroying the city in preparation for withdrawal, as well as for Japanese.

British representatives have protested vigorously to the Chinese government. Canton again was bombed by the Japanese and new raids were expected on the Hankow area.
