

VANDALISM IS BASIS OF SUIT

Brewing Firm Suing for Injunction

Witnesses Admit Violence in Union Beer War at Portland

Portland, Ore., July 13 (UP)—Stories of vandalism and terrorism were told by witnesses testifying yesterday in the suit lodged against Dave Beck and the teamsters' union by the United Union Brewers of Walla Walla, Wash.

The brewing company, which opened a suit for an injunction against the teamsters on March 14, sent eight men to the stand as Special Master Nicholas Janney reported the case to take further testimony.

The plaintiffs witnesses admitted throwing rocks through windows and beating drivers of trucks delivering beer not brewed by teamsters' union affiliates.

"Everyone was doing it," Jess Farrington, who said he fought under the ring name of Jess La Barba and was a member of 1932 Olympic team, declared in discussing window smashing. Farrington, now in jail on a malicious destruction of property charge, said he took part in two window-breaking expeditions.

The United Brewers is seeking an injunction against Beck and Daniel Tobin as heads of the teamsters' union to restrain them from interfering with delivery of its beer. The hearing will be resumed against next Monday.

Hillsboro, Ore., July 13 (UP) Jack Estabrook, Portland, financial secretary of the Warehousemen's union, will go on trial here for the third time September 6 on charges of bombing the William Furey place at Rock Creek. Estabrook's two previous trials ended in hung juries. He is at liberty on \$10,000 bond.

MATTSON CASE CLUES FALSE

Suspected Man Former Asylum Inmate

Officers Take Him Back to Institution After Questioning

(Continued from page one) have to be mentally unbalanced." Olson has changed his story several times. Chief Cole said, but he would not disclose the differences. Cole said he did not think anyone else was connected with the case if Olson were proved to be the kidnaper.

Arrested Saturday—Olson, an eastern Washington wheat farm worker, was taken into custody last Saturday near Brixville, Wash. After long questioning Olson signed a written statement that he had abducted the Mattson boy, son of a prominent Tacoma physician, on Dec. 27, 1936, killed him and buried the body near Everett, Wash.

Prosecutor Stuart Elliott refused to issue a kidnapping warrant against Olson.

Olson, the police said, had implicated another man who had been arrested and then released.

"Olson fits the description of the Mattson kidnaper," said Cole. "But we are not certain at all that his confession will stand up."

Stricken by an ever-penetrating conscience after 18 months of silence, Olson readily admitted participation in the crime when he was taken into custody, the police said, but for some time denied he was the actual kidnaper or that he had killed the boy.

However, after 36 hours of questioning, Olson made a complete confession and signed his name to it, the police announced.

These were the highlights of Olson's story of the kidnapping, as the police recounted it.

On the night of Dec. 27, 1936, Olson entered the Mattson home in the living room where Charles, his sister Muriel, and her friend, Virginia Chaffield, of Seattle, William, a brother then 14, was asleep upstairs.

Olson was naked. He wanted money, and had entered the house with the intention of robbing its occupants. Learning there was no money to be had, he took up Charles and ran out. Dr. and Mrs. William Whitlock Mattson, the parents, were out for the evening.

Olson said he dragged the struggling boy down a bluff at the rear of the Mattson home, carried him across a highway and railroad tracks, then

put him in a rowboat on the Tacoma waterfront.

He rowed across Commencement bay, then went north to the vicinity of Everett.

Olson said he buried the body in a field where it was found by a rabbit hunter, 19-year-old Gordon Morrison, on Jan. 11, 1937.

Olson said remorse overcame him last week and he told his employer at Brixville that he had killed a man. "I want to talk to some policeman who will keep me from a mob," he said.

Sheriff Melvin Orestreich of Adams county and a state policeman were summoned to talk with Olson.

The officers had questioned him only a few minutes when they realized they said Olson's resemblance to descriptions of the Mattson kidnaper.

The state patrolman immediately arrested Olson of the crime.

"You killed the Mattson boy," he said.

The farm worker steadfastly denied it was the Mattson case he wished to confess, but gradually admitted he participated in it. Under continued questioning Olson at last confessed to the abduction and slaying, but insisted he had not committed the crime single-handed.

It had taken just six minutes to bring the case to its premature end, and leave the count and countess to disentangle themselves from the disaster to their marriage.

Resolution Is Modified, Laid on Table

Salem, Ore., July 13 (UP)—Delegates to the 18th annual convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will elect officers and choose the 1939 convention city at the final business conference today.

Contest for the junior vice-commander post was attracting principal attention as the officers of commander and senior vice-commander were usually seen by promotion. Leslie A. Williams, present senior vice-commander, was expected to be elected commander, and it was believed that John H. Shum would be promoted from junior vice-commander to senior vice-commander.

Provided it was mentioned for the post of junior vice-commander were O. J. Johnson, Pendleton, F. W. Horton, Marshfield, and Phillip H. Ringle, Salem.

Governor Charles H. Martin Tuesday decorated nine men who distinguished themselves in overseas service. The presentations were made at an impressive ceremony on the courthouse square.

Decorated were Douglas M. Kay, Sherman, L. Croze, Virgil Golden, Leon Hansen, C. V. Richardson, Grover Hinkle, G. G. Weaver and Phillip Ringle, all of Salem. A purple cross and silver star for gallantry in action was presented to Hansen. Ringle received a silver star with a palm leaf, a double citation for bravery in action. All others received a purple cross from the one-time mayor-general.

Washington Democrat Session Lively Affair

Tacoma, Wash., July 13 (UP)—The state democratic convention developed into a riotous assembly at midday when approximately 200 left-wingers stormed the speaker's platform during a violent argument over adoption of a right-wing proposal.

The left-wingers rushed the temporary chairman, D. Elwood Caples of Vancouver, during a roll-call vote on the motion of George Adams of Shelton to abolish the unit rule and allow each delegate to vote his individual opinion.

The proposal was to be the first real test of strength between the two factions. It immediately resulted in wild furor. Both left-wingers and right-wingers stood on chairs, shouted imprecations at each other and generally raised a rumpus.

Several fist fights nearly broke out.

Lieutenant Governor Victor A. Meyers attempted to quiet the left-wing, of which he is a leader, but his voice was drowned out in the rabble, which also smothered the roll call vote shortly after the clerk began taking it. Meyers doggedly kept trying to restore order, however.
