(Continued from page one) marital status and length of service. "These enrollees will be subject to all the privileges, duties and regulations applying to other enrollees, and will receive a base pay of \$20 per month, plus food, lodging and clothing," the announcement states.

"However, at least \$22.50 of the \$30 must be allotted to dependents, or, if the applicant has no dependents, he must make a monthly deposit of \$22.50 which will be returned to him when he is discharged.

"The locally selected enrollees will have equal opportunity for education, training and advancement to positions of assistant leaders at \$26 per month and leaders at \$45 per month.

"The bureau is desirous of obtaining men experienced in logging or clearing work who will enroll in this position."

The CCC company moved to the Wikip site yesterday in occupying temporary tent quarters near the kidnap bridge. Later, portable type permanent buildings will be erected on a half mile downstream from the temporary location. Whether the three company camp will be situated through contract or by government forces has not yet been decided.

Pick-a-Back Plane Flies Over Atlantic

(Continued from page one) its departure from Montreal to make the time of arrival at the Port American Airways base at Port Washington about 4 p. m.

The Mercury's flight is one of 15 experimental survey flights in which Imperial Airways plans to test three types of equipment designed for transatlantic commercial service.

The composite aircraft, invented by Major Robert H. Mayo, was designed to permit takeoffs with heavier loads than would be possible if the Mercury had to depend upon its own lifting power to get into the air.

The motor plane, a modification of the four-engine empire flying boat, carries the smaller craft on its back in taking off, releasing it high in the air.

Plans are for the Mercury to complete the round trip from Lyons by way of the Azores and Lisbon, Portugal.

HEALTH UNIT IS DISCUSSED HERE

State Director Tells of Program in Oregon

A warning that Deschutes county should take some immediate action if it desires to secure federal funds for the establishment of a health unit was issued by Dr. A. E. Bastron, state director of county health units, and assistant state health officer, when speaking before county court members, city officers and physicians today noon in the Pine Tavern. Meeting with the group were directors of the Bend chamber of commerce, with C. L. Latel presiding, and officers of the Deschutes County Health association.

Mrs. Walter Emard was in charge of the meeting, as president of the county health association.

Although Dr. Bastron suggested immediate action if Deschutes wishes to secure social security funds for the establishment of a health unit, he tempered his warning and suggestion with the proposal that people first intimately acquaint themselves with county health unit work such acquaintance, Dr. Bastron indicated, would result in general approval of the program.

Seventy seven per cent of the people of Oregon are now under health unit supervision, Dr. Bastron said. There are 14 full time health units in the state. Two years ago there were only six.

Deschutes county, the state officer said, is one of the four highest in the state in maternity and child death rates. Not physicians, but expectant mothers who are out of contact with nurses and physicians are to blame for this high rate, comparable to that of some southern states, the state officer added. The manner in which a health unit will provide the needed contact was explained.

Syphilis also came in for attention, and Dr. Bastron revealed that a recent check on food handlers in The Dalles brought 17 open cases of this contagious disease to light. Manner in which Sweden in 18 years cleared its scourge of syphilis was mentioned by Dr. Bastron.

Means of financing a health unit in Deschutes county were considered, with Commissioner W. J. Baer asking a number of questions. Probably by next July \$3000 of federal money will be available, it was mentioned. A full time physician, whose time would be largely devoted to educational and preventive work; two nurses and a sanitarian would be required.

District Weatherman In Bend Wednesday

Edward L. Wells, district meteorologist, visited Bend yesterday afternoon, looked over his temperature instruments in the local weather station, and agreed that the day was mighty warm. However, he refused to concur in the belief that Oregon east of the mountains has had an abnormal dry spring and early summer. West of the Cascades, he contended, the season has been very dry.

Although Bend has been in a dry zone this spring and summer, other parts of eastern Oregon yesterday plenty of moisture, Wells reports. He told of finding lakes where he had noted none on previous trips into the eastern Oregon country. Strangely enough, Ukiah, in the John Day basin, reported the greatest monthly amount of moisture during June, 4.69 inches.

"Precipitation was less than normal in western counties and over the Cascades," Wells stated in summarizing June rainfall. "East of the mountains, an excess of moisture was reported, especially in the more important wheat areas. A few scattered stations in the extreme east reported a deficiency. The excess in eastern counties was due to thunderstorms, which in some cases were extremely violent and caused considerable damage to property and crops. A thunderstorm over Birch creek canyon in Unadilla county on the afternoon of June 22 was accompanied by intense rainfall, estimated at 2.50 inches in 20 minutes."

Wells was here on one of his regular inspection trips. He came here from the south, after examining stations in the Harney, Lake and Klamath areas. In Redmond, he was to appoint a new observer, to take the place of the Rev. Percy Arkle, who recently died. The Rev. Arkle was observer in Redmond for 12 years, taking over the work when the station was established.

The Bend station, maintained jointly by Wells' department and the county, is now recognized as one of the most important in Oregon.

AAA Asks Farmers to Accept Wheat Plans

Washington, July 21 (AP)—Agricultural adjustment administrator H. R. Tolley appealed to farmers today for compliance with the \$5,300,000-acre wheat allotment program for 1939 to prevent repetition of a price-depressing, Lumper crop.

The AAA has announced the division of the acreage paid by states, which later will be divided among counties, and eventually among individual farmers who, by limiting their wheat acres, will obtain farm benefit payments.

Each state was awarded 74.36 per cent of its average seeded acreage, plus the amount diverted under previous AAA programs in the last 10 years, with adjustment for the trend in acreage during the last three years.

The 1939 allotments by states included Idaho, 195,549; Oregon, 708,203; and Washington, 1,181,159.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 21 (AP)—The congressional committee investigating the Tennessee valley authority today smoothed over internal differences and adopted a resolution permitting TVA employees to offer information to any committee witnesses designated by the chairman of the congressional group.

Rep. Thomas A. Jenkins, R., Ohio, who battled verbally with Francis Biddle, counsel for the committee, on the right of witnesses to question TVA employees, offered the resolution.

Meanwhile, Dr. A. E. Morgan, ousted chairman of the board, sat to one side waiting to be recalled to testify. Dr. Morgan started the controversy when he complained he was not allowed to question TVA employees without first notifying the TVA management.
