

STOCK TRADE QUIETS DOWN

Weakness in Movies Is Major Factor

Rallies Are Checked When Cautious Traders Take Profits

MARKETS AT A GLANCE Stocks irregular and fairly active. Bonds higher; U. S. governments irregular.

New York, July 21 (UP)—Weakness in movie shares acted as a damper on stocks today. Sporadic rallies ran into profit-taking which left the main list irregular at the close.

Sentiment continued cautiously bullish, however, and trading dwindled. Volume ran some 600,000 shares below yesterday's session.

Bonds were irregularly higher. Wheat closed on fractional gains. Cotton futures moved up nearly 50 cents a bale.

Many favorite stocks, including Chrysler, reached new highs for the year in early trading. Coppers, rubbers, steels, farm equipments and autos were in best demand.

Later, however, new selling came into movie shares and spread to other groups. Most gains were wiped out but as the close approached many leaders came back from the lows to show moderate gains.

The day's news was not particularly encouraging. Movie stocks continued under influence of the federal anti-trust suit. Although bank clearing in New York made a good showing, other sections of the country showed little improvement and the total for last week continued below a year ago.

Dow's broke 3 1/2 points before meeting mild support which scaled the loss moderately. Paramount and Warner Brothers lost about a point. Most utility leaders showed small losses. Steel shares went into late trading with small gains after B. H. Johnson had declined from a rise of 2 points and U. S. Steel had equalled its high for the year at 62 1/2, up 1 1/2.

Chrysler maintained a small net gain after an early run-up of 2 1/2 points to a new high of 73. Santa Fe maintained almost a point of an earlier gain of about 2 points, but other rails were up only fractionally. Case held most of a gain of 4 1/4 points to a new peak.

Although final trading was quiet, most issues moved up from the lows and closed in mid-way between their top and bottom for the session. Dow Jones closing stock averages: Industrial, 141.92, up .008, high, 29.78, up .018, utility, 22.07, off .048.

Stock sales approximated 1,310,000 shares against 2,510,000 yesterday. Curt stock sales were 236,000 shares against 367,000.
