ARMY AIR CHIEF REPORTED KILLED

Believe Westover Victim of Plane Crash

Burbank, Calif., Sept. 21 (AP).—Brigadier General Oscar Westover, chief of the army air corp, and a sergeant flying with him, were reported killed today when their army plane crashed in a field on the outskirts of Burbank.

Shortly after the crash an official at union air terminal told the United Press that he understood General Westover was one of the victims.

"I am positive I am correct, but I can not give a definite confirmation to you," he said.

The army plane was circling near the Lockheed aviation plant preparatory to landing when it suddenly crashed, aviation men said.

The crash occurred within sight of the air control tower at union air terminal where most of the big transcontinental airlines land.

The observers, however, could not tell from that distance exactly what had happened.

The two bodies were burned beyond recognition and identification was practically impossible. On the tail of the ship, a Northrop pursuit was the insignia number "T". This according to aviation men probably indicated the Westover craft which was due into the Lockheed field at 1:30 p. m., the approximate time of the crash. Accompanying General Westover was his pilot Sergeant Sam Hynes, who has flown with the general for three years.

The men were from Bolling field, Washington, D. C., according to information at the Lockheed plant.

SHOOT DEER 25 TIMES
Ashland, Ore. (AP).—Dr. C. A. Haines exhibited a huge buck he killed in northern California, but wouldn't say how much it weighed. His reluctance may have been due to the knowledge that much of the weight was probably due to lead. Haines admitted he shot the deer 25 times before finally dropping it.

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PIERCE VISITS RESERVOIR SITES

Will Return to Bend to Hold Conference

Representative Walter M. Pierce today was obtaining first hand information to the Deschutes irrigation project on a visit to the Wikup and Crane prairie basins, selected as the sites of reservoirs to serve North Unit lands of Jefferson county and existing projects south of Crooked river.

Representative Pierce was accompanied on his up river trip today by C. C. Fisher, Deschutes project construction engineer.

At the Wikup site, the bureau of reclamation is now handling work preliminary to the construction of a dam behind which will be impounded 180,000 acre feet of water that will be diverted from the Deschutes channel immediately north of Bend and carried over the Redmond plateau to Jefferson county for use on a 50,000 acre irrigation. At Crane prairie, the old North Canal Co. earth fill dam is to be reconstructed by the bureau of reclamation, with the C. O. I. district as the sponsoring group, and water stored there will be available for the C. O. I., the Arnold and the Lone Pine districts.

Working with other members of Oregon's congressional delegation, Representative Pierce played a major part in securing the final approval of the Deschutes project, construction of which will extend over a period of several years.

When in the up river country today, Representative Pierce was to view at least portions of the 10,000 acre basin that will be cleared before water is stored behind the Wikup dam. Three CCC companies have been assigned by the bureau of reclamation to assist in the clearing work. One camp is already stationed at the Wikup. The two others are operating out of Redmond.

Yesterday, Representative Pierce met with Central Oregon lumber operators. The representative is a member of a congressional committee named to make a study of forest problems.

This evening, Representative Pierce is to confer with members of the democratic central committee here.

Spain Premier Juan Negrin announced to the league of nations assembly today that republican Spain had decided immediately to complete withdrawal of non-Spanish combatants from its army.

Negrin asked the league to send a commission to Spain immediately to supervise the withdrawal, which will include all combatants who have acquired Spanish nationality since July 1, 1938.

Tokyo, Sept. 21 (AP).—The cabinet today approved Japan's refusal of a league of nations invitation to confer under the league mandate on settlement of the China war. The invitation was sent early this week from Geneva upon China's request.

Hong Kong, Sept. 21 (AP).—There are 125,000 persons homeless as a result of floods along the Yellow river, Chinese reports said today. An area of more than 18,000 square miles was flooded. Damage was estimated at \$50,000,000.

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O'Connor Defeated In Democratic Race

New Jersey—Republicans nominated W. Warren Barbour for the senate by overwhelming majority. Democrats nominated William H. J. Ely, unopposed. Eleven of 14 incumbent congressmen sought re-nomination, only one was opposed.

Wisconsin—Gov. Philip F. LaFollette was re-nominated to unprecedented fourth term by his new party, national progressives of America. His opponent, Glenn Turner, socialist, got small protest vote as a result of LaFollette's break with Milwaukee socialists. Robert K. Henry and Julius P. Hill were running close race for republican gubernatorial nomination and Henry was leading Jerome Fox for the democratic nomination. Sen. F. Ryan Duffy, D., raised by President Roosevelt for his loyalty to the new deal, was unopposed for re-nomination. Alexander Wiley was leading John B. Chappie in republican senatorial race.

Massachusetts—Democrats nominated James M. Curley for governor. A former governor, 63 years old, he defeated three opponents including Gov. Charles F. Hawley and Lieut. Gov. Francis A. Kelly.

Everett Saltonstall, former house speaker, won the republican gubernatorial nomination. Incomplete returns indicated that all 15 Massachusetts congressmen—10 republicans and five democrats—had been re-nominated.

Portland man, lost, traced by smoke.

A lost hunter today was blamed for a forest fire reported by lookouts this afternoon at 2 o'clock to be burning vigorously in the vicinity of Dry butte, north of Fall river in a region generally known as the Three Trappers country.

Eight men were on the fire this afternoon and 20 more, with camp equipment, were on their way out. The blaze was reported burning in mixed yellow pine, jack pine and brush, on an old lava flow.

Foresters said the fire was started by Arthur Knutsen of Portland last night when he was lost in the rugged country. This morning, lookouts located the smoke and James Burgess, fire guard at Fall river, was sent out. He found Knutsen near the fire.

The Portland man apparently started the fire last night, in a down log, to keep warm. This morning, he left the fire, wandered around the hills, and was back near the blaze when located.

Foresters have indicated that it will be necessary to bring charges against the lost hunter, accusing him of leaving a fire in the woods.

Knutsen was at the Fall river station this afternoon, awaiting contact with other members of his party.

Speakers at the tri-county institute to be held October 3 in Prineville for schools from Deschutes, Crook, and Jefferson counties have been selected. J. Alton Thompson, Deschutes county school superintendent, announced today. Dr. Edward O. Sisson of Portland, from the department of philosophy of Reed college, will deliver the main address. His topic will be "American Principles of Living."

Rex Putnam of Salem, state superintendent of schools, will be present for the day-long institute. Among those who will take part in the conferences and general program are John C. Johnson of LaPine, Miss Eda Williams of Bend, Miss Lillie M. Estelystyn of Pendleton, Miss Sophie Messenger of Prineville, Mrs. Leona Brigham of Grandview, the Rev. E. J. Achenbach of Prineville, Mrs. J. Dorothy Bishop of Bend, acting home demonstration agent for Deschutes county, Mrs. Emmos of Portland, supervisor of the Multnomah county schools, Miss Bertha M. Lary of Redmond, V. I. Basler of Prineville, Miss Betty Peavy of Prineville, and Ford Hurrell of Terrebonne.

County school superintendents from the three counties who are arranging the program are Mrs. Lillian Watts of Madras, Jefferson county schools; R. H. McAtee of Prineville, Crook county schools; and Thompson.

Motorist Unhurt When Cars Hit on Highway

Two California cars and one trailer were extensively damaged but occupants escaped without serious injury in an accident on The Dalles-Columbia highway about two miles north of Madras yesterday afternoon. One machine was licensed to C. A. Magaw of Holtville, Cal., and the other to Clyde E. Farlow of Lindsay, Cal.

The side of the trailer, attached to Farlow's car, was ripped away by the side-swiping impact. The front of one of the machines was partly scorched in the collision and the side of the other was crushed so badly that it had to be used to open the doors.
