

STOCKS RISE AGAIN TODAY

Advance Follows News of Czech Surrender

Czech Bonds Sag as Much as 15 Points After Action Is Known Markets at a Glance

Stocks higher in moderate trading. Bonds higher; U. S. government bonds higher. Foreign stocks higher and quiet. Rubber exchange higher. Cotton easy. Wheat off 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents; corn off 3/4 to 1 1/4. Rubber steady.

New York, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Stocks advanced for the third consecutive session today when Prague accepted the plan to partition Czechoslovakia. Stocks opened quiet and irregularly higher. Then prices slipped off until word of the Czech action brought a swift comeback. For a time, dealings were so heavy that tickers ran several minutes late.

Prices eased when Premier Mussolini, in a speech, demanded that the problem of all Czech minorities be settled "integrally," but the rise was resumed in late dealings. Advances ranged from fractions to more than a point. Some high-priced issues had advances of 4 points or more.

Bond trading in world markets was featured by a break in Czech bonds. The issues crashed as much as 15 points in London, in New York they dropped as much as 9 1/2 points.

Greatest activity in stocks centered in automobile issues. General Motors reached 46 1/2 up 3/4 and Chrysler 72 1/2 up 1 1/2. Moderate demand was noted for motor equipment and rubber tire shares. U. S. Rubber had a gain of more than a point.

United States Steel was sustained on the Dow-Jones estimate of its producing rate which showed a gain of 4 points from last week. The stock touched 58 1/2 up 1 point. Bethlehem touched 58 1/2 up 1 and Crucible 34 1/2 up 1/2. Inland was up 4 points.

Railroad shares were depressed after an early rise on word from Washington that railroad management would not back down on its demands for a 15 per cent wage reduction. Utilities firmed under lead of Public Service. Farm shares were fractions to a point higher. Oils dipped. Coppers were steady.

Widest gains were made by Allied Chemical, Laclede Gas preferred, Philip Morris, and Pacific Tin, which were 2 to more than 4 points above the previous close.

Dow Jones closing stock averages: industrial 139.29, up 0.88; rail, 25.86, up 0.29; utility, 18.88, up 0.18.

Stock sales approximated 1,000,000 shares against 1,200,000 yesterday. Curb stock sales were 124,000 against 118,000 shares in the previous session.

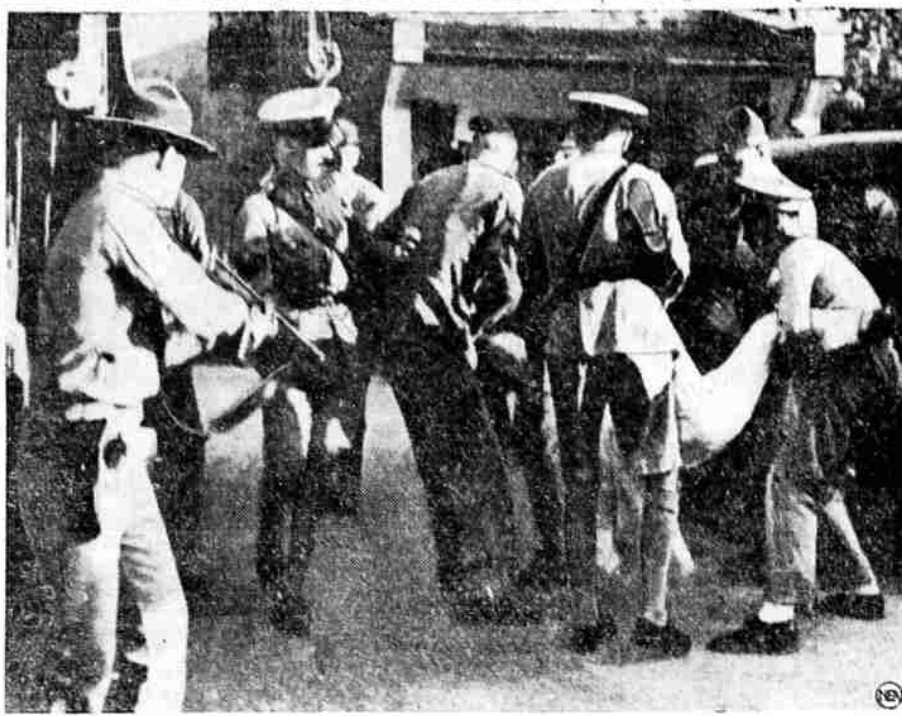

pendous international deal forced by Hitler returns Germany to an equal footing among the powers. The stigma of World War defeat has been wiped out. The way has been opened for economic stability by drawing the central European powers into the Nazi orbit. And, barring a sudden upset, they will come into the Nazi orbit.

Repercussions of the showdown on Czechoslovakia will be felt for a long time—might still flare into war on a few hours notice in event of untoward developments. The mere technicalities of completing the Czech deal are great and cannot be carried through without difficulties.

Britain and France must go through bitter parliamentary fights which conceivably could upset the entire deal. The Czechs are famous as fighters and may take matters out of the hands of their government leaders. The Sudeten nazis are itching to race back across the frontier from Germany and begin shooting. Russia and Rumania warned against any move to take away their minority populations.

In the world financial markets there were repercussions, too. The Prague stock exchange was suspended. Ireland sold \$10,800,000 worth of British securities, which had been part of the national currency backing. Czech bonds collapsed in London.
