HIGHWAY FUNDS BEING DIVERTED

Increase in Accidents Seen As Result

Washington, Oct. 20.—American highways are almost as dangerous as a battlefield, according to reports by the U. S. bureau of public roads and the national safety council.

Last year 39,500 persons were reported killed and 1,360,000 were injured on highways. These casualties were greater than American losses in any similar period of the World war.

Responsibility for a large percentage of the automobile accidents was attributed by the bureau to misuse and diversion of automobile tax funds. It said \$161,413,000—13½ cents out of every highway tax dollar—

was used last year for non-highway purposes.

Two States Cut Off
The bureau withheld \$472,862 in federal aid from Massachusetts and \$250,000 from New Jersey for illegal diversion of state highway funds, mostly for relief purposes. Georgia was placed on probation and North Dakota warned for questionable practices.

The use of highway funds for other purposes by several states is being investigated and action may be taken soon, bureau officials said. They said, however, that it was impossible to ascertain how much money had been allocated by states to counties and diverted to other uses.

State highway income in 1937 totaled \$1,195,625,000 and expenditures—including payments on debt, state police, local roads and non-highway purposes—amounted to \$1,166,706,000, the bureau reported. Federal contributions amounted to \$252,762,000.

Fault Found With Road
Even that amount was insufficient

to keep highways in good condition and build new roads, the bureau said. No official estimate was available as to the number of persons killed or injured in "death traps" on highways, but officials said faulty roads contributed to a great number of accidents.

The bureau is conducting a joint investigation with states to locate and eliminate dangerous roads and bridges. Officials said the inquiry is being made in 46 states and that the results will be made public upon completion.

It is hoped to arouse public sentiment to force highway officials to keep public roads in good condition. Economic losses last year from automobile accidents were estimated by the safety council at \$1,700,000,000—about 3 per cent of the national income and enough to finance the building of 35 Empire State buildings.

Low Grade Ores Are Worked With Profit

Washington, Oct. 20.—Depletion of rich mineral resources has compelled the mining industry to work low grade ores which would have been discarded a generation ago, the WPA reports.

Despite the decline in mineral content, inventions born of the necessity of working such ore have increased the output of the individual miner, research project workers found in a study of mineral technology.

Assistant WPA Administrator Corrington Gill said the trend is reflected in "the heavy relief rolls of many western mining areas where early inventions have won, in the changing geographical distribution of employment opportunities . . . as mining shifts to new localities and in the modified skills required by 'mass mining' of low grade deposits with varieties of equipment."

The report observed that Michigan

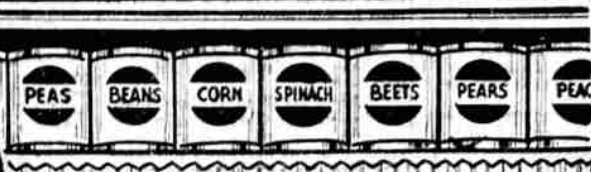
copper mines reduced their output by 58 per cent between 1931 and 1937 and raised the yield by 45 per cent by means of selective mining. While the output of copper per man was not greatly decreased employment underground was reduced 72 per cent.

It was found that approximately one-half of the nation's copper supply comes from mines which were considered worthless in 1900. In spite of a 27 per cent decline in the yield of lead mines over the last 50 years, the report said, the deposits are still being worked at a profit.

"Metal mining has had to adjust itself to a lower grade of ore, and the success of this process has been one of the important victories of mineral technology," the report said.
