U. S. SELLS MORE TO PHILIPPINES

Gain of 41 Per Cent Made in One Year

Washington (AP)—Reflecting the strong financial position of the Philippines in 1937, the United States sold goods valued at \$85,028,000 to the islands last year, a preliminary annual report of the commercial department reveals.

This was a gain of 41 per cent over the previous year and 90 per cent over 1933, the recent low level in United States-Philippines trade. The value of United States exports to the islands last year was the third highest in the history of trade between the two countries.

over 1936. This was due to the notable increase in Philippine manufacture and the establishment of several new companies.
The Philippines imported \$235,000 worth of sugar mill machinery in 1937, compared with \$180,000 in 1936. The department pointed out that trade in this line is mostly a matter of supplying repair and replacement parts because of the retrenchment that is now under way, due to the large world production of sugar and the strict quota regulations now in effect.

Another is Henry J. Bean, candidate for the non-partisan office of judge of the supreme court, position No. 2. On the supreme court Mr. Bean is now serving his second term as supreme justice, and has had 27 years of experience as a member of Oregon's highest tribunal.
