

California Claims Championship and Rose Bowl Bid on Basis of Tie

Claims of U.S.C. Are Waved Aside

Voting Next Monday to Settle Dispute

San Francisco, Nov. 21 (AP)—So far as the University of California's graduate manager of athletics, is concerned, California's Golden Bears are in the Rose Bowl already. "We're the champions, aren't we?" Priestly said after California had beaten Stanford, 6-0, to finish its Pacific coast conference football campaign with six wins and one defeat, and its regular season schedule with nine victories and one setback.

Priestly insists it doesn't make any difference what happens in Thursday's biggest far western Thanksgiving day game, when University of Southern California and U. C. L. A. square off at Los Angeles.

U. C. C., by winning, can tie California in the conference standing with a record of six wins over conference foes and one setback.

That isn't good enough, the California grad manager says.

In the prize ring, he pointed out, the champion keeps his title if the bout is a draw.

Tearing the same reasoning to the gridiron, Priestly insists that California, 1937 champion and Rose Bowl winner, should go to the Pasadena classic New Year's day again because no team was able to do better than tie the Golden Bears' record this year.

Of course Priestly has only one vote in the 10 that will be cast Monday, Nov. 22, in selecting the far western representative for the game which puts at least \$100,000 in the athletic treasury of the conference team chosen.

Other votes will come from U. S. C., U. C. L. A., Stanford, Washington, Washington State, Oregon, Oregon State, Idaho and Montana. There will be much jockeying and much political maneuvering, most sources believe, between the close of the U. S. C.-U. C. L. A. game and the telegraphic vote.

Stanford, with a record of two wins and five defeats in conference play, finishes its poorest season in years against Dartmouth from the east in one of Saturday's three big games.

Washington and Washington State will meet at Seattle and Oregon and Oregon State will play another "state championship" game at Portland. Oregon's stock rose last Saturday when the Webfeet trimmed Washington, 3-0, on Jim Nicholson's field goal.

The heaviest firing this week will come Thursday. The main games present U. S. C.-U. C. L. A.; Utah, big seven champion by virtue of a 49-0 win over Wyoming; and Arizona, surprise 20-12 winners over Marquette, against Montana. San Jose State, which eked out a 6-0 win over the San Diego Marines to keep its perfect record unspooled, meets Flagstaff Teachers, Whitman plays Willamette, and Fresno State plays Santa Barbara in other important games.

Santa Clara comes back to the wars Sunday against Detroit in Sacramento. While Gonzaga, beaten 8-0 by University of San Francisco yesterday, plays Loyola, which Hardin-Simmons beat, 19-0.

Sport Parade

Houston, Tex., Nov. 21 (AP)—In just about the time it takes to boil two three-minute eggs, Texas Christian university showed me more football last Saturday afternoon than I had seen in six entire earlier games.

Before I settled down in the press box to watch T. C. U. against Rice I had seen Columbia, Yale, Colgate, Oregon, Fordham, Pennsylvania, Navy, Alabama, Tulane, Vanderbilt and Tennessee in action. Columbia had shown me a fine passer in Luckman, Fordham a sizzling attack centering around Eshmont, Alabama a staunch defense, and Tennessee a strong, balanced club without any real weakness. As a matter of fact, when I left Nashville a week ago I felt that in Tennessee I had seen the best team in the country, one capable of jacking any club.

But T. C. U. against Rice changed what passes for my mind and changed it in six minutes—six minutes which saw Horned Frogs make three touchdown marches of 63 yards, 88 yards, and 52 yards, respectively.

These three touchdowns followed an opening one that netted a score when the game scarcely was underway.

The men handled themselves with cool assurance. There was no hurry. No fuss, no kicking of pants or slapping of backs. They were workmen, doing a job well.

This poise is the answer to the team's success, according to Coach Dutch Meyer.

"We discourage inspirational football," Meyer told me, "and stress poise and the efficient carrying out of assignments. We used to try and key the boys up, but that didn't work. It once cost us a conference championship. In fact, that was the year S. M. U. beat us with what I think was an inferior team. We hopped the boys up for that game and put them under pressure even before they got to the field. As a result, they lost their balance, played with their hearts instead of their heads, so to speak, and were beaten. It was the fault of the coaching staff and we learned our lesson."

In O'Brien, Meyer believes he has as fine a back as he ever coached. And that his center, Ky Lydrich, is one of the really great all-around players in southwest history.

Oh yes, T. C. U. wants to go to the Rose Bowl.

And if it does, here's a tip to the team that is chosen to play it—don't agree to any winner-take-all basis, because you might have to walk home.

Thanksgiving Day Game Is Scheduled

Portland, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP)—It was all over today but the shouting and a few post-season games that will figure inconspicuously in the windup of Oregon's prep school football campaign.

The record of Jefferson high of Portland, considered by many to be the state's best eleven, appeared safe as the Democrats scheduled a Thanksgiving day game at Multnomah stadium with Milwaukie, champions of the no-name league.

Because of the ninth-term ruling which bars such players from state teams but allows them to play in Portland, McLaughlin high of Milwaukie negotiated for a game with Medford, instead of Jefferson.

But it was learned that Coach Skeet O'Connell refused to cancel Ashland high school's turkey day game with Medford to allow the Tigers to tangle with the Pioneers, so the undefeated Blue mountain team will retire for the season.

Milwaukie will be a worthy opponent of Jeff. for the no-name championship through the season with but a single loss—a 20-19 heartbreaker to Salem. Jefferson, however, won the Portland title without a defeat.

All the favorites came through as expected in their games this week-end. Salem, beaten only once this year, walked over Silverton, 20-0; Milwaukie took Gresham, 25-0; Medford won from Grants Pass, 21-6; and The Dalles nook out Pendleton, 7-6.

Other scores: Lebanon 27, Dallas 23; Seaside 20, St. Helens 18; Tigard 7, Hillsboro 0; Corvallis 0, Beaverton 0; Scappoose 19, Canby 7; Sandy 12, Parkrose 6; Pacific Frosh 19, Newberg 0; Columbia Prep 14, Hill Military 0; Woodburn 28, Molalla 6.

The Oregon leaders rates today about like this: Jefferson, undefeated; Mac-Hi, unbeaten in Oregon but defeated by Walla Walla, Wash.; Medford, beaten by Eureka, Cal., and tied by Hood River, Milwaukie, beaten by Salem; Salem, beaten by Eugene; Klamath Falls beaten by Medford and tied by Bend.

Those are the best half dozen. Some smaller teams have records as good, but they played less important opponents and commanded less attention.

The last big football day will be Thanksgiving, when several important clashes will be fought, in addition to the Jefferson-Milwaukie and Medford-Ashland battles.

They include Salem at Corvallis, Eugene at Tillamook, McMinnville at Albany, Junction City at Cottage Grove; North Bend at Marshfield; West Linn at Lebanon; Forest Grove at Hillsboro; Newberg at Sherwood; Tigard at Beaverton; Florence at Waldport, and Taft at Newport.

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Partial Eclipse of Sun Scheduled Today

A partial eclipse of the sun which astronomically begins on November 22 will be seen from Bend at sunset this evening, providing the western skies remain clear. This eclipse will have its official beginning on the Asiatic side of the international date line, where a new day will have started, but will be seen from western America while the old day, November 21, still lingers.

The first dark late out of the lower side of the sun will be seen shortly after 4 o'clock this evening. Professor J. Hugh Pruett, University of Oregon general extension astronomer, reports. The sun will set at about 4:30 o'clock, with its lower part hidden by the eastward moving moon.

Professor Pruett advises the use of a piece of glass lightly smoked over a candle flame or photographic negatives by people observing the partial eclipse.

This evening's partial eclipse of the sun will be generally visible in western America, parts of the Pacific ocean, northern Japan and north-eastern Asia.

BIG FIVE KEEP RECORDS CLEAN

No Upsets on Gridirons This Weekend

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—Football comes banging down the home stretch this week amidst the moaning of bookies and the purring of form players who had a great day Saturday as the perfect record "big five" came through unscathed.

With upsets taking a holiday for the first time this year Notre Dame, Texas Christian, Duke, Tennessee and Oklahoma remained unbeaten, untied. But it's a steep grade past the grandstand for all but Oklahoma's soomers, whose last two games should be easy victories.

For unscored-on Duke, which won a skimpy 7-0 victory over North Carolina State to clinch the southern conference title Saturday, the outlook is darkest. This week-end the Blue Devils play Pittsburgh, whose second and third stringers romped to a 26-0 victory over troublesome Penn State Saturday. A victory over the Panthers would skyrocket Duke to the No. 1 candidacy for the eastern Rose Bowl bid.

Despite the importance of this tilt, it will be overshadowed in fanfare by the traditional Army-Navy classic at Philadelphia.

Notre Dame, top prospect for the mythical national title, is idle this week in preparation for its cross-country haul to tackle Southern California Dec. 3 after a hair-raising 9-7 victory over Northwestern.

Texas Christian, second only to the Irish in national rating, figures to have one of its toughest battles of the season against Southern Methodist Saturday, deciding the southern-western conference T. C. U. vanquished Rice 29-7.

Tennessee meets its traditional foe, Kentucky, Thanksgiving, but its sternest test comes Dec. 3 when it faces Mississippi's Rebels.

Oklahoma took the big six title Saturday, with a 10-0 victory over Iowa State, previously undefeated. Neither Oklahoma Aggies nor Washington State of Pullman, their wind-up opponents, appear capable of causing the soomers trouble.

The only games that ended in what could be called upsets or surprises, were not on the pool cards Oregon's 3-3 triumph over Washington, conqueror of Southern California the week previous, topped the upsets.

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
