

STOCKS RISE LATE IN DAY

Rally Comes Near End of Dull Session

Gains Are Substituted for Early Losses in Wall Street

New York, Nov. 21 (U.P.)—A strong tone developed on the stock market today in the last few minutes of trading. Prices jumped from the early lows and turned the last irregularly higher from an irregularly lower tendency prevailing earlier in the last hour.

Douglas Aircraft hit 70 and closed at 69 1/2, up 3 1/2 points from the previous close and up 2 1/2 points from the low made earlier in the last hour. Consolidated Aircraft, United Aircraft and Boeing rose more than a point each. Wright closed 2 points higher.

Bethlehem Steel ran up 2 1/2 points from 11 1/2 to close at 14 1/4, up 1 1/2 points net, and U. S. Steel closed at 67, up 1 1/2 points from the low and up 1/2 points net.

Chrysler wiped out a 1 1/2 point gain and closed unchanged at 81 1/2. Other sections of the list were lifted though less spectacularly. Anaconda led the coppers higher and closed with a gain of more than a point.

Aiding the late rise was a statement by Senator Edward R. Burke that revision of the Wagner labor relations act would be number one problem for congress. Other favorable items included a better technical position for the market, senate hearings on profit-sharing systems in return for tax concessions and a big steel order for Bethlehem.

The industrial and rail averages were down slightly on the day while the utility average made a slight gain. Dow Jones closing stock averages: industrial 153.26, off 0.12; rail 30.77, off 0.17; utility 23.13, up 0.19; and 65 stocks 49.71 off 0.04.

Stock sales approximated 940,000 shares against 1,420,000 shares Friday. Curb stock sales were 228,000 shares against 300,000 Friday.
