

AIR FORCE OF 13,000 EXPECTED

Roosevelt's Program Is Analyzed

Mass Production Expected to Reduce Cost Of Army Airplanes

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt said today the administration's proposed aircraft expansion program—which may give the nation a maximum of nearly 13,000 fighting planes—can be carried forward almost entirely with present facilities of private industry.

Roosevelt did not estimate, in a press conference discussion of his new defense program, the exact number of planes which will be built in the new program.

In his message to congress he specified a minimum of 5,000 but declared it is hoped that enough placed on such a large scale will materially reduce the unit cost and actually produce many more planes.

Aircraft experts suggested that mass production under the new program might give the army as many as 6,700 new planes. With other expansion programs already under way, that could mean a total army and navy plane force of nearly 13,000.

Roosevelt said the possibilities of a "bottle neck" in construction existed due to the fact the program would require 15 to 20 per cent more skilled aircraft builders.

Roosevelt said that all the new planes would be constructed in private plants except a few ships of an experimental type that might be turned out in the naval airplane factory at Philadelphia.

New guns, requested in the program would be manufactured in government plants, such as the Washington naval gun factory, and the arsenals at Watervliet, N. Y., and Rock Island, Ill.

Roosevelt was asked whether he contemplated a new roadway system for the transportation of anti-aircraft artillery. He said there was interest in the construction of trans-continental and north and south highways, using works progress administration labor.

Roosevelt, in a special message to congress yesterday, asked for approximately \$532,000,000, of which \$210,000,000 would be spent in the fiscal year 1940; the remainder would be in the form of contract authorizations to be paid for at a future date. This was in addition to more than \$1,100,000,000 requested in the regular army and navy budgets.

The emergency appropriation, of which \$300,000,000 would be earmarked for the construction of or letting contracts for army planes, would conceivably enable an increase of 6,700 planes in the army air force alone. The \$210,000,000 asked for the naval air arm would enable construction of an additional 350 planes.

In the regular budget message, provision was made for both the army and navy to continue building as rapidly as possible towards the respective goals of 2,530, established by the Baker board, and a minimum of 3,000, fixed by congress for the navy last year in the naval expansion bill.

Under those programs, the number of planes was aimed toward 5,320 within two or three years. The new aerial expansion plan, it was said, would add more than 7,000 planes to that figure, making the total nearly 13,000.

Aviation experts said that the 13,000 figure depends upon the type of plane to be constructed. Roosevelt did not explain that point in his message, but it was believed the present ratio between combat planes and bombers would be maintained.

NEW BUILDING IN REDMOND STARTED

Good Gallery on Hand to Watch Excavation

Redmond, Jan. 13 (Special)—Excavation was under way here today for a new building to be constructed for Walt Franks, cattle buyer of Redmond. There was a good gallery of spectators watching this latest symbol of Redmond's growth.

The site is at 5th and E streets, which is on the Redmond-Prineville highway one block east of the principal highway intersection in Redmond. The property is 50 by 100 feet and was recently purchased from Frank W. McCaffery by Franks. It adjoins the Central Oregon Irrigation district office building which is at the west property line. The right-of-way of the C. O. I. lateral ditch on 5th street joins the Franks property on the east.

Franks said today that various reports have circulated regarding the kind of building he will construct, and that some of these reports indicate others know more about the building than he does at the present time.

He said next Tuesday he expects to settle the matter and award the contract, and at that time he will be able definitely to advise those interested accurately and in detail. His present excavations, he said, are to determine the amount of seepage from the C. O. I. ditch in order to determine how much of a basement he could put under the building. Indications this morning were that seepage was so much that a basement would be impracticable.
