

CHAMBERLAIN NOT DISMAYED

Firm Warning Is Given to Mussolini

Abandonment of Policy of Appeasement May Be Result of Trip

Rome, Jan. 13 (AP)—Great Britain has informed Italy that in the event of trouble between Italy and France, Britain would be solidly behind France, an unimpeachable source revealed today.

The long-heralded conference between Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Premier Benito Mussolini has proved a fiasco, it was indicated, and may result in virtual abandonment of Chamberlain's "appeasement" policy and a hardening of the dividing line between the democracies and dictatorships.

In reply to Chamberlain's warning, the Chamberlain of the Home conversation, Mussolini assured Chamberlain that he does not envisage any hostilities against France.

Mussolini's Mediterranean demands and his refusal to take his troops out of Spain proved the stumbling blocks which prevented the conference from achieving any concrete results.

It was disclosed that the Italians informed the British that Mussolini expects the Spanish war to collapse finally "within a few weeks," after which the Italian forces would be withdrawn.

Mussolini was understood to have told Chamberlain that after liquidation of the Spanish war, the situation would be reviewed again between Britain and Italy.

The intension in sources close to the British Legation was that if Mussolini's belief that the Spanish insurgents will be in Barcelona within a few weeks does not materialize, Mussolini will reconsider whether he should not begin to liquidate Italy's participation.

A reliable source said Mussolini informed Chamberlain he believed the question of foreign interference in Spain in future would be settled automatically after the war by the will of the Spanish people themselves. That viewpoint would leave open the question of what material advantages Italy, Germany or any foreign power would gain from the outcome of the war.

Mussolini was said by French sources to have assured Chamberlain repeatedly of his determination to work for peace, lending it point by his declaration that he does not mediate hostilities against France.

Presumably that would mean direct negotiations with France on his Mediterranean demands, since Chamberlain firmly refused to mediate. The French considered the refusal a diplomatic setback for Mussolini.

Chamberlain seemed unperturbed by the outcome of the Home conversation. He was received in formal audience by the pope today and was understood to have told him that he was satisfied with the results of his Rome visit.

The pope, it was understood, encouraged Chamberlain to continue his peace efforts, and complimented him on his efforts to solve the Jewish refugee problem and end the war in Spain.

Burgos, Spain, Jan. 13 (AP)—The nationalist military headquarters announced today that their troops had

occupied Tortosa in a mighty sweep toward the Mediterranean seacoast south of Tarragona.

Tortosa is on the main highway and railroad lines running parallel with the seacoast about 40 miles south of Tarragona and less than ten miles inland from the coast.

The sudden forward surge of nationalist troops on the southern section of the Catalan front made the fall of Tortosa only a matter of time—a short time, according to the military reports to headquarters.

The Spanish war seemed to have been the one point on which Chamberlain and Mussolini found themselves in agreement. Mussolini had hoped to see Chamberlain recognize the nationalists as belligerents, to enable them to blockade the loyalist coasts legally and starve out the loyalist government.

Instead, it was believed Chamberlain challenged Mussolini to fulfill his promise to take his troops out of Spain, roads when the British-Italian friendship agreement was negotiated last April.

Nationalists captured Porella, on the Valencia-Barcelona highway today, freeing the entire Ebro sector from the hands of the loyalists, it was announced here.

BRITAIN QUELLS REVOLT OF ARABS

Holy Land Again Quiet After Long Siege

Jerusalem, Jan. 13 (AP)—Great Britain's military experts believe their armed forces have broken the back of the Arab nationalist revolt in Palestine in a struggle estimated to have cost 2,000 dead and 3,000 wounded.

Since early last summer a mechanized British army of 20,000 troops, backed by war planes and 5,000 armed police, has fought a guerrilla war against well-organized Arab rebels who had flung down the most serious challenge to Britain's authority in the holy land in the past 20 years.

For a time the Arabs were virtual masters of large areas of the holy land, including Bethlehem and Nablus, and even the old city of Jerusalem. They organized their own law courts and collected taxes. British authority in some parts of the country seemed dead.

Then Great Britain, stung into action, clamped down martial law over the whole country and launched a military campaign against the rebels that quickly drove them from the towns and lowlands into the barren hill country, where they were pursued by mechanized columns and bombing planes.

Today, with the Arab revolt seemingly on the wane and internal discussions splitting the ranks of the Arab nationalists themselves, Palestine anxiously awaits the forthcoming round table conference in London Jan. 18. At this conference, British government representatives will meet delegates of Palestine Arabs and Jews and of the neighboring Arab states of Egypt, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Transjordan and Yemen.

The conference represents Great Britain's supreme effort to bring peace to the holy land and to find a compromise between the apparently irreconcilable demands of Arab nationalism and Jewish aspirations for a national home. In the holy land itself there is only little hope among either Arabs or Jews that the conference can succeed. The cleavage seems too great on the surface, but some way to a solution may be found.

The conflict is an old one but recently became more serious. For more than 35 months the Arab nationalist insurgents have defied the armed might of the British empire. The present revolt began early in 1936. The only period of comparative peace during those 35 months of slaughter, arson and terrorism was between October 1936, and June, 1937, when a truce was called while the Peel commission was investigating conditions in Palestine.

The latest wave of bloodshed reached its peak in the autumn of 1938 while Great Britain's attention was occupied by the Czechoslovak crisis that brought Europe to the brink of war in September. The Arab nationalists, well armed and organized, seized control of large areas of Palestine.

west, amounting to about 40 million bushels a year were all fed to hogs, it would increase the production by approximately this figure.

Contrary to previous belief, it is now known that wheat is just as desirable for fattening livestock as corn or barley, when properly used, says Lindgren. Oregon State college experiments have shown that it requires in the neighborhood of 40 pounds of grain to produce 100 pounds of pork, whereas corn alone is used. "Shim milk or good alfalfa pasture during the fattening period make possible a considerable reduction in the feed grain used."

Wheat at the present time is considerably lower than the average price of corn on which middle western farmers have been able to show a profit in hog production. The rapid increase in alfalfa acreage in the Willamette valley affords additional inducement for growers in that area to give hog production more consideration, Lindgren concludes.

HOG PRODUCTION MAY BE INCREASED

Use for Surplus Wheat of
Oregon Seen

A reasonable increase in hog numbers on Oregon farms is justified under present conditions, stated H. A. Lindgren, extension livestock specialist at Oregon State college, in a recent analysis of hog production in the west, given over KOAC.

In the past Oregon farmers have limited their hog production to approximately the numbers needed to consume farm waste, such as skim milk, cull fruits and vegetables on general farms, or in gleaming stubble fields in wheat areas. This policy tended to maintain a favorable price differential between Portland and Chicago markets.

In recent years, however, the situation has changed both as regards this price differential and the availability of low priced feed grain. Seven of the 11 western states produce fewer hogs than they consume, the deficit for the entire area amounting to about three million head a year. It is interesting to note, he points out, that if the average wheat surplus in the Pacific north-
