SALEM IS QUIET DURING WEEK-END

Fireworks Due Monday in Legislature

Salem, Or., Jan. 21 (AP)—Salem was quiet today, with many Oregon legislators out of town and few committees in session. Both houses adjourned before noon yesterday, but there were prospects of fireworks Monday when two vital bills are scheduled to be debated.

On the Monday afternoon calendar is Governor Charles A. Sprague's disputed bill amending the state unemployment compensation law so that it will conform with national statutes.

The senate committee on revision of laws reported it out "do pass," after minor revisions. Organized labor, whose leaders contend certification of the Oregon unemployment law can only be gained through repeal of the anti-picketing law, is expected to oppose the Sprague bill.

Slated to drop into the senate hopper Monday is the bill revising the Oregon public utility district law. It was withheld from yesterday's session because Governor Sprague objected to a clause which would permit directors of a power district to issue unlimited revenue certificates.

It was reported the bill will be amended so that issuance of the certificates will require authority of the voters. The bill, if passed, will repeal the present P. U. D. law. It is backed by the Bonneville administration, the state grange and the farmers' union.

Tested Recipes

A simple well-planned, well-prepared meal, attractively served is one of the most pleasant forms of entertainment. Mrs. Dorothy Bishop, acting home demonstration agent, said today. Where it is possible to entertain at meal time, the greatest pleasure can usually be given with the least effort. An extra touch or two may be added to the regular family meal. It is better nutrition practice to serve guests at regular meal hours than between meals. Over weight is one of the common results of eating heavy between-meal refreshments. Suggestions are included in the bulletin H.E. 858 on file in Mrs. Bishop's office.

One of the recipes included is for spoon bread to be served for four to six persons. The ingredients necessary follow:

- 2 1/2 c. milk
1/2 c. cornmeal
2 t. salt
2 T. butter
2 egg yolks, beaten
1 t. baking powder
2 egg whites, beaten stiff

Place the milk and salt in the top of a double boiler and heat. Stir cornmeal gradually into the hot milk and cook over hot water one-half hour. Add butter to cornmeal mush and mix to even consistency. The mush should be soft and moist, something like mashed potato. If stiff add more liquid.

Beat egg yolks, add baking powder, and mix. Stir the egg yolk mixture into the stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into deep greased baking dish and bake in moderate oven 20 to 25 minutes. If desired richer, add more butter. Spoon bread may be baked in shallow greased cake or pie tins, forming a more crusty product with a

less soft interior. Serve spoon bread hot and with a spoon. It is delicious with fruit syrup over it.
