

## STOCK PRICES RALLY TODAY

### Trading Volume Dips; Rise Technical

### European Situation Seems Quieter; London Market Up

New York, March 21 (U.P.)—The stock market rallied today after five sessions of decline. Trading lightened. Gains ranged from more than 3 points.

The advance was ascribed more to technical factors than to any real demand. The European situation was quieter and the London stock market made a substantial gain.

Bonds were better. U. S. government issues improved and Treasury 7 1/2's rebounded 5 points to 35 after the recent wide break. Foreign currencies were steady. Commodities were mixed, with wheat and cotton easier and copper, rubber, hides and silk firm.

Financial sentiment was improved by indications that the country's stock exchanges and the securities and exchange commission would overcome differences and work out a plan for revision of certain sections of the securities act of 1934.

Firmer prices for copper and metal for bigger demand for the metal for armament expansion brought good buying into copper shares. Another factor was word that the Children's finance committee is considering a plan to supplement the proposed copper export tax with a higher income tax on copper producers.

Copper shares were up fractions to more than a point. One-point gains were made by Anaconda and Kennecott, International Nickel and American Smelting was up fractionally. Home-stake Mining rose more than a point in the gold section.

Anticipation of higher earnings for the steel companies in the first quarter helped steel. Bethlehem sold at 68 1/2, up 1 1/4, and U. S. Steel, 57 1/2, up 1 1/4.

American Telephone, which lost more than 2 points yesterday, rose to 158, up 3 1/2. Gas and Electric utilities had fractional advances.

Railroad issues showed gains ranging to more than a point. Standard Oil of New Jersey led oil shares higher on improved demand for gasoline. Allied Chemical and Du Pont were steady. U. S. Gypsum gained 3 points.

Cane rose 2 points. Motors were strong, with Chrysler and general motors up more than a point each. Dow Jones closing stock averages: industrial, 143.41, up 2.13; rail, 32.01, up 0.55; utility, 24.17, up 0.48; 65 stocks, 48.13, up 0.78.

Stock sales were 690,000 shares compared with 950,000 yesterday. Curb stock sales totaled 116,000 shares against 153,000 in the previous session.

Stockmen To Meet in Myrtle Point in May

Myrtle Point, Ore.—All southwest Oregon is cooperating to make the 1939 state convention of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers association one of the most interesting and successful ever held, it was indicated at the monthly meeting of the Coos county chamber of commerce held in Empire.

The organization, comprising six city chambers of commerce in Coos county, voted its united support to the plans outlined by Wallace B. Deament of Myrtle Point, general chairman for the event. Dates set for the convention are May 26 and 27.

Members of the Marshfield delegation stated that some of their number will have charge of the elaborate seafood dinner to be served on the beach below that city, and participate in plans for a caravan tour of Coos county and the beaches.

C. L. Jamison, state secretary of the association, checked over the plans formulated by the local committee and expressed the opinion that the Myrtle Point convention would be one of the most interesting in the history of the association.

He also stated that it will be the first time the annual meeting has ever been held west of the mountains in Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valleys to attend in large numbers.

Several nationally known speakers will appear on the program Jamison announced, and additional details are to be published at a later date.

**Water Treatment Used To Revive Oil Wells**

Bradford, Pa., (U.P.)—The problem of how to make the nation's oil reserves last longer has been partly solved by a Buffalo, N. Y., engineer, who reveals a method of treating water through which oil wells may be made to yield 20 per cent more than can now be recovered.

Dr. Raymond Nauth asserts that tests several months ago proved his formula for treating water used to produce oil. He expects "dry" wells to increase production to 50 per cent of the total oil in the ground.

As recorded by Dr. Nauth in a speech here to chemistry students of St. Bonaventure college and oil producers from Pennsylvania and western New York, his system calls for treating water so that it has a protective coating in the pipes to prevent corrosion and yet not plug up the oil-containing interstices in the oil sands.

The formula calls first for chlorinating water to remove all organic matter. Then it is mixed with lime and soda under steam and passed to a settling tank, where superfluous

carbonates are removed by a sludge pump. The next step is to de-aerate the relatively clear water by steam, which removes oxygen, carbon dioxide and other gases, and then pass the water through a filter to remove any further particles.

Dr. Nauth said that in a test on two wells in this area production was increased from 25 to 75 barrels a day.
