

BORAH FEARFUL FOR NEUTRALITY

Almost Impossible Now, Senator Says

Washington, April 21 (AP)—Sen. William E. Borah, R. Ida., today indicated relief that American opinion on Europe's crisis has hardened to the point that true neutrality has become almost impossible.

Borah expressed his opinion during questioning of Mrs. Helen Taft Manning, witness before the senate foreign relations committee which is considering revision of U. S. neutrality laws.

"Already," Borah said, "things have taken place which makes it impossible for other nations to look upon us as a neutral."

He said he did not refer to any specific statement or act by a government spokesman, but referred rather to the manner in which national opinion had shaped itself on European affairs.

Borah said his conclusion was based upon "the general condition of mind" throughout the country toward totalitarian states.

The senator felt the foreign relations committee would find it "difficult to get ourselves in a state of mind" approximating a judicial attitude.

"Haven't the people already made up their minds who is right and who is wrong?" he asked. "We have practically passed upon who is an aggressor. The thing that is uppermost in my mind is that there is no neutrality at this time because of conditions that exist in the world."

Mrs. Manning, daughter of President Taft and a supporter of mandatory neutrality provisions, said many persons had realized that their feelings were involving the United States in the international crisis.

"I was simply anxious to know your thought as to the possibility of this committee coming to any agreement which would be accepted as a neutral position," Borah said.

Referring to the Chinese-Japanese conflict Borah said the people of this country "ought not to expect the wrong side to lose or win, but we do."

The house foreign relations committee heard Lawrence Dennis, a former diplomatic officer, declare that the United States must renounce the doctrine of collective security of President Roosevelt and former Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson or expect to engage in a war.
