

HONG KONG TO BE MOBILIZED

Conscription Plan is Rumored

Many Chinese Residents Are British Subjects And Liable to Call

London, July 13 (U.P.)—The British government has decided to conscript all able-bodied British subjects in Hong Kong for defense service, it was said today in a reliable quarter.
Hong Kong authorities are already preparing for the conscription machinery, the informant said, and compulsory military service probably will be inaugurated within one week.
It was understood that a defense force similar to the British territorial forces—corresponding to the American national guard—would be created.
Hong Kong's total non-Chinese population is only 22,582. But the Chinese population numbers 984,400, and many of these, as British subjects, will be subject to call.

Aside from being Britain's far eastern naval base, backed up by Singapore, Hong Kong now has a regular army garrison including an infantry brigade.
There are four heavy artillery batteries, two anti-aircraft batteries, two medium batteries, two companies of royal engineers and units of the signal corps, royal army service corps (quartermaster), the medical corps, the ordnance corps, the pay corps, the veterinary corps, and the military police corps.

In addition there is a volunteer defense corps including two artillery brigades, an engineer company, a machine gun troop, a motor machine gun platoon, five machine gun companies, and auxiliary units including a nursing corps.

Informed quarters said that the reported conscription decision would mean a reversal of the view long held by many, that Hong Kong could not be defended.

The decision to introduce conscription could be interpreted as follows:
1. A trial balloon, in prospect of the extension of conscription to all British crown colonies as opposed to dominions.

2. A British gesture to the Japanese, a show of strength similar to the air force plan for "showing the flag" by making flights to friendly countries.

3. The result of a decision that Britain and France, it was noted that the conscription report came soon after an unprecedented conference of British and French navy, army and air force chiefs from all over the far and middle east.

U. S. INVESTIGATES HARLAN MINE WAR

Lewis Asks Inquiry Into Riots at Shafts

Washington, July 13 (U.P.)—Attorney General Frank Murphy announced today that two observers from the justice department civil liberties unit left today to study conditions in Harlan county, Kentucky.

Washington, July 13 (U.P.)—President John L. Lewis of the Congress of Industrial Organizations today asked that the federal government intervene in "bloody Harlan" county, Kentucky, to protect miners from a "politically disappointed and angry governor."

Lewis, who also is president of the C. I. O.'s United Mine Workers union, wrote Attorney General Frank Murphy, charging that Governor A. B. (Happy) Chandler "purposes and wounds them (the miners) with the same ferocity and lack of restraint that characterize the habits of a Dominican dictator."

One miner was killed yesterday and one national guardsman and six miners were wounded in a gun battle between guardsmen and United Mine Workers pickets in Harlan county.

TROOPS REINFORCED
Harlan, Ky., July 13 (U.P.)—National guard reinforcements moved into "bloody" Harlan county with heavy war equipment today to aid in maintaining law and order in the strife-torn Harlan coal fields.

Governor A. B. (Happy) Chandler denounced union leaders and ordered the troops to the scene after a day of fighting in which one striking miner was killed and two guardsmen, five miners and a woman were injured. The new troops were members of two machine gun units and numbered about 200.

They were accompanied by two military tanks and reinforced 300 troops who have been patrolling the

coal fields since a breakdown a month ago in negotiations between mine operators and the United Mine Workers of America, affiliate of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, over a union demand for a union shop agreement.

The fighting occurred in a pitched battle between U. M. W. A. pickets and national guardsmen who were protecting non-union miners at the Mahan-Ellison mine at Stanfill, nine miles southwest of Harlan. The guardsmen arrested about 200 miners and marched them to Harlan. The marchers broke ranks and another battle followed on the streets of Harlan.

Chandler charged that an "incendiary" speech made Sunday by William Turnblazer, president of district 19 of the U. M. W. A., was responsible for the outbreak. He said Turnblazer had urged strikers to resume picketing and to cut off production at non-union mines. He also condemned ac-

tivities of George Tiller, secretary-treasurer of district 19, who, with his wife, was arrested at the Stanfill outbreak.

Jack C. Petrey, photographer for the Knoxville, Tenn., News-Sentinel, said four guardsmen manhandled him and destroyed his camera when he attempted to take a picture of the courthouse square.

MENUTT TAKES OATH
Washington, July 13 (U.P.)—Paul V. McNutt took the oath of office as administrator of the new federal security agency today and promised to maintain present policies of the agencies he will supervise. They include the social security, public health service, youth administration and others.
