Tax Payment Made on Tumalo Timber Lands

Seven-eighths of the special school levy for the Tumalo district on property formerly owned by Emily Wells and S. O. Johnson was paid yesterday to R. I. Hamby, deputy sheriff. The portion of the tax including interest was \$908.25. One-eighth of the tax on the property amounting to \$118 is owed by S. O. Johnson. Through an error, the special levy was not added to the county tax rolls last year and the taxes on the jointly owned property were paid before the omission was discovered. George H. Brewster, attorney for Emily Wells, appeared before the county court early this month asking if the portion of tax would be accepted. The one-eighth portion was purchased from Johnson and later Mrs. Wells sold it to the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company.

Code of Road Urged on World-Wide Basis Montreal (U.P.)--A "code of the road" similar to the "code of the sea," which would be recognized by motorists, may be in effect one day throughout the world, Count Dr. Ludekerke Beaufort, vice-president of the International Automobile Association, said in an interview here. Count Beaufort, who is also vice-president of the Automobile club of France, was one of the 75 delegates from Europe who attended the annual convention of the international association in Washington at the beginning of the month. Forty-two countries were represented, including delegates from Germany and Italy. Central idea of the convention, the count said, was to extend traveling privileges for motorists throughout the world. Much had already been done in cutting away of red tape for motorists crossing borders, and now the association hopes to establish an international code of the road. "We have a code of the sea that is recognized by all mariners," he said, "and one day we hope to have a similar code of the road." "Young Mr. Lincoln"
