

# Elks Spot Hills Creek Two Runs, But Get Over Stage Fright and Win

## Home Runs Help Pile Up Scores Farmer Tames Valley Wrecking Crew

Three errors on the first three plays of the game failed to dampen the ardor of the Bend Elks in their Oregon State league contest with Hills Creek here yesterday and, after recovering from their stage fright, the home players settled down to work and batted out a 7 to 2 victory. Two home runs, by Decker and Hawkins, several other extra base hits and two double plays were instrumental in Bend's victory.

The first two men at bat for Hills Creek scored on three errors. After that not a single Hills Creek player reached third base. Big Jim Farmer was in fine form and held the Lane county nine, twice victors over Silverton, hitless in the first four innings. Farmer yielded only five hits, all singles, in the entire game, and two of these were in the last inning as Bend's star twirler rested his ailing arm.

Bend's flurry of errors in the first inning was partly due to the inability of the Elks' recently injured players to get their legs and arms coordinated. Still favoring his injured ankle, Burton was in trouble several times early in the game, but once he got warmed up he took part in two double plays. Hills Creek saved most of its errors until late in the game.

It was in the seventh that the Elks really turned on the steam, with two down. Walker, first up in that inning, was retired on a high fly to first. Hatch was out on a fly to center.

Zimmer singled, then continued on to second on an outfield error. Decker followed with a homer that went far over the fielders' heads, to bury itself in dust near the far northeast corner of the race track. Gordon made first an error, then Tommy Hawkins came through with a homer far into left field. It was then that Bun Kelsey, one of the outstanding pitchers of the state league and holder of two wins over Silverton, retired in favor of Gardner.

On Thursday evening of this week, the Elks will be seen in twilight action, against the Colored House of David nine. The evening game will start at 5:30 p. m.

After the Reds' infield had exploded and tossed the first game to the Cards in a horrendous exhibition in the eighth, Mike personally escorted the Red Birds to triumph in the nightcap with two homers—his 21st and 22nd. The Georgia boy smacked in six of his team's seven runs.

For him the measured tread of nurses' feet, not the singing drive of thoroughbreds; for him the soft commands of physicians, not the blatant bark of bookies.

But the track at Saratoga is not without its Bradley, and down the back stretch, into the homestretch, and around the turns are colts which carry his well known silks. It's been six long years—through snow and wind and rain and sun—since the green barrel-hoops of One-Two Ed have come a'rolling home first across the bluegrass of old Kaintuck.

Colonel E. R. Bradley shoots for the derby. That's his race. Let others come to glory in the Preakness, the Classic or the Withers, all that he asks is that on a sunny day in May his colors will come flying down the stretch on top, in front, in the race of American races—the Kentucky Derby.

One-Two Ed is a man who doesn't believe the early bird catches the worm. While many of America's other breeders and racers pre-viewed their best two-year-olds as long as three months ago, Colonel Bradley kept his beauties in the barn. He brought them along slowly and he ran them against their inferiors until he was ready. Then, bang and bang again, he picked his spots and he won them.

First there is Bimelech, a strapping bay colt named after a biblical character. Bimelech is by Black Toney, and of course you've heard of Black Toney. He's dead now, but when he was standing at court at the colonel's Kentucky farm he sired Black Gold for Mrs. R. M. Hoots and he sired Broker's Tip for the colonel.

Bimelech has been to the post three times and every time he finished he went right for the winner's circle. He wasn't started until June 28, and then he went against a handfull of plugs at Suffolk Downs. He won by three lengths breezing. After that he was given a rest and then went back to work on July 14. Favored at 3-5, he came home six lengths on top.

Boy Angler is the second. The colonel bred him and the colonel owns him, but for the time at least he is under lease to the Mr. French stable. Boy Angler is the son of Burgo King and the grandson of Black Honey, so in him the family ties are double knotted. Like his stablemate, he is undefeated—four starts and four triumphs—but he has had close squeaks.

## Doubles Champions Retain Their Title

Chestnut Hill, Mass., Aug. 21 (UP)—Alice Marble and Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Fabyan won the women's national doubles for the third straight year today when they defeated the British Wightman cup team of Kay Stammers and Mrs. Freda James Hamersley, 7-5, 8-6.

It was the 10th major tournament victory for Miss Marble and Mrs. Fabyan who paired together for the first time at Rye, N. Y., two years ago this month.

The U. S. Wightman cuppers, who also hold the Wimbledon title, required exactly one hour to vanquish the Britishers in a match that featured both brilliant and erratic tennis.

Chestnut Hill, Mass., Aug. 21 (UP)—Australia's crack Davis cup combine of Adrian Quist and Jack Bromwich became the fourth foreign team in 58 years to win the national tennis doubles today when they defeated their fellow countrymen, Jack Crawford and Harry Hopman, 8-6, 6-1, 6-4 on the grass courts of Longwood Cricket club.

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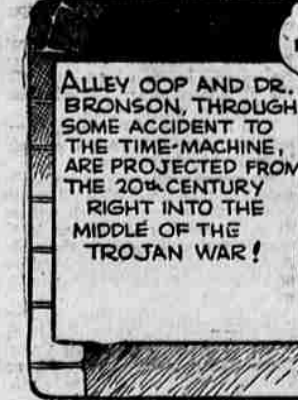
