Three From Bend Expect to Report Sept. 14

Eugene, Aug. 21 (Special)—A trio of former Bend high school football stars will be in the thick of competition for regular positions on the University of Oregon grid squad this fall.

Roy Dyer, Bob Hendershot and Leonard Surles are the ex-Lava Bears who will report to Coach Tex Oliver on September 14 for the start of the 1939 campaign.

Approximately 60 varsity players will report to Oliver on September 14 for the state of practice. The Webfoots will have just two weeks in which to prepare for their opening conference game against Southern California on September 30 at Los Angeles.

Prospects are considered bright for a strong Oregon conference entry this fall with 26 veterans back from the 1938 team.

He went into the bathroom, and a few seconds later a pistol shot reverberated through the house.

Wichita, Kans., Aug. 21 (AP)—The 1939 national semi-pro baseball tournament was close to a climax today, but at least a dozen teams remained in the competition with a chance to survive and capture the \$5,000 first prize money.

Four teams have won three games. They are the Silverton, Or., Red Sox, owned by Tom Yawkey, the president of the Boston American league club; Buford, Ga.; Bona Allen, the 1938 title winners; Enid, Okla.; Champlin, and the Mount Pleasant, Texas, Cubs. All were in the final money last season.
