County Convention Is Planned Friday

Baptist Association Holds Conference Tuesday, 100 Attending

Redmond, Sept. 21—The annual convention of the Deschutes county W. C. T. U. will be held in Redmond Friday, September 22. Sessions will be held both morning and afternoon, with a potluck dinner at noon, according to Mrs. S. S. Martin, county president.

The morning session will begin with devotionals at the Baptist church at 10 a. m. At 11:30, Rev. Stewart Bain of the Baptist church will speak on "World Events in the Light of God's Word." The afternoon session will begin at 2 p. m. and will be held at the Christian church. Talks by leaders in the local W. C. T. U. movement will be given, and there will be an address by Mrs. Lois Hanch, formerly of Prineville, who will tell of her experiences during the past two years in China.

CHARLES H. FOSTER DIES

Redmond, Sept. 21—Funeral services for Charles H. Foster, who died Monday at the age of 88, will be held in Redmond Friday at 2 p. m. from the Baptist church, with Rev. Stewart Bain in charge of the services.

Mr. Foster, who was born in Illinois, came to the Santiam country in 1881, where he established the upper Soda springs resort. He operated this until 1900, when he moved to Sisters. For several years he had been living with a son, R. C. Foster, at Camp Sherman. He would have been 89 on the tenth of October.

He is survived by three sons, H. A. Foster of Prineville; Lewis D. Foster of Redmond, and R. C. Foster of Camp Sherman; and by three daughters, Mrs. Mary Frost of Fort Johns, California; Mrs. C. L. Henson of Redmond; and Mrs. Vern Prosser of Blaine.

Burial will be in Redmond cemetery.
