DIVISION A

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All entries made at Poultry building on grounds.

2. A "Trio" shall consist of one male and two females and must be cooped together. Separate classes for old and young trios. No bird will be considered in competition under four months old. Birds entered in Trios shall be eligible for entry also in the individual classes but the separate entry must be made and the bird banded on the first day of the fair with tags to be furnished by the management.

3. For the purpose of the exhibition term "cock" shall be a male hatched previous to January 1, 1939, a cockerel a male hatched after January 1, 1939, a hen a female hatched previous to January 1, 1939, a pullet a female hatched since January 1, 1939.

4. All breeds of fowls, geese, ducks and turkeys recognized by the latest edition of the "American Standard of Perfection" are entitled to entry for regular premiums, as well as other fowls found worthy by the judges.

REDMOND OFFERS
SPECIAL AWARDSPrizes Will Stimulate
Exhibit Interest

Donated by business men of Redmond, many special premiums are being offered Deschutes county fair exhibitors this fall. These prizes range from a \$25.00 cash award to three F. F. A. boys exhibiting the best rope halters made by themselves to a \$250 merchandise award to the winner of first premium in the class for the largest watermelons.

Primary purpose of the numerous special prizes is to arouse further interest in bringing outstanding exhibits to the fair. Some 45 special awards are being offered. One of the special awards amounts to \$10, offered by the Redmond chamber of commerce to be divided among winners of top places in the individual farm exhibits.

In past years, the majority of the farm exhibits were displayed principally because of growers' pride in the county fair, or were solicited by representatives of the association in charge. For many years, the late Fred B. Wilson was in charge of the work of collecting farm exhibits.

Special awards offered this year cover many farm endeavors. One of the \$10 awards is being offered by Frank McCaffery for the best sheaf of peppermint displayed.

6. The Association will pay careful and diligent attention to all exhibits in fairness to their owners, all birds will be fed, watered and will receive the best of care whether the exhibitor is present or not. The management will endeavor to have your birds shown to the best advantage and kept in good condition.

7. Make yourself thoroughly conversant with the rules as set forth in this premium list, as your thorough knowledge of the same will greatly help us to give your birds the care and treatment they deserve.

8. Exhibitors may place signs on exhibits after the judging is completed the first day, giving names, addresses, and if for sale. Signs may be left with the clerk to be placed, if desired.

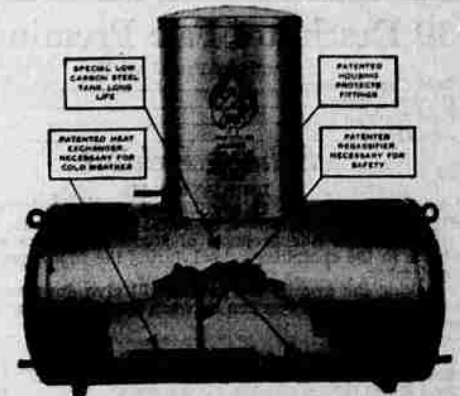
