Mighty Popovich to Have Worthy Successor

Missoula, Mont., Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Coach Douglas Fessenden has discovered a counterpart of the mighty Milt Popovich in sophomore Earl Narache and things are looking up around the Montana State university football camp.

"Popo," now with the Chicago Cardinals professional team, made a name for himself here in 1935, '36 and '37.

Fessenden says Narache is as good as "Popo" at his best, except in punting.

Although they face a tough schedule including three Pacific Coast conference opponents, the Grizzlies did not get down to fall practice until Sept. 15.

That left Fessenden only two weeks to build a team around the seven remaining regulars. He lost 17 others.

Still on the doubtful list was a 203 pound center, Harb, another all-state high school player from Butte, who had been counted on to spell Co-Capt. Bob Thornally, Chicago, at the pivot post.

The most outstanding guard possibilities as regulars are Robert Gordon, Kalispell, a 200-pound convert-center, and Glenn Van Bramer, 195-pounder from Billings.

Fessenden has two veteran tackles, Jack Dugan and Tom O'Donnell, and reserve strength in Gene Clawson, 207-pounder, and Roger Lundberg.

Co-Capt. Emil Tabaracci, Great Falls, has a lease on one end of the line and Jack Hoon, Missoula, is expected to get the most frequent call for the other. S. Roberts, Butte, 190-pound sophomore, also will be counted for one of the ends.

Evans Roberts, 175-pounder, an all-state end in his high school days, will be switched to the backfield this year to give it added speed. He can step the hundred in 10 seconds.

Frank Nugent, Miles City, Mont.; Ed Hudacek, Chicago, and Roy Strom, Shelby, Mont., are Fessenden's backfield veterans.

To go with them he has such sophomores as Narache, Doug Campbell, Missoula, former all-state high school quarterback; Don Bryan, Kalispell, shifty 157-pounder and Evan Roberts.

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UNEMPLOYED GIRLS HAVE OWN SHOW

Cooperative Living One of Things Taught

Sheboygan, Wis. (U.P.)—An unusual school in Sheboygan is helping unemployed girls to earn money while they discover and develop hidden talents and aptitudes in themselves which they later can add to their list of assets in seeking jobs.

What's more, the girls, who come from farm and village homes in the Fox river valley, are learning the rudiments of cooperative living, home-making and self-government.

The N.Y.A. cooperation work experience center for women opened its vocational school here in June. Coincidentally, the school was launched on the same day that "Badger boys' state," a one-week period of training in government for Wisconsin high school boys, began at Dalafield. The Sheboygan school, only one of its kind in this region, has a two-month term.

AGES FROM 18 to 24
The girls who attend the school—there are about 24—range in age from 18 to 24. They live in dormitories converted from former domestic science classrooms in the vocational school building. There are sleeping quarters, lounge and living-room, and a kitchen where the girls prepare their meals.

Wages of the students amount to \$24.54 a month at the rate of 46 cents an hour. Of this sum, about \$5 goes directly to the recipient to spend as she sees fit. The rest covers costs of room and board and project expenses.

Projects include sewing, book-binding, canning, library work, office work, recreational activities and handicraft.

Subjects Vary Widely
In addition, the girls are taught buying and budgeting, public speaking, mathematics, music, commercial work and first aid, and they are offered tips on how to convince a prospective employer that he needs their services.

Some of the girls already are employed as assistant directors at city playgrounds. Others have found work in city offices and in the vocational school library.

City and county institutions have received sheets, pillowcases, play suits and other articles made by them.

Samuel F. Johnson, N. Y. A. district supervisor sums up the purpose of the center in these words:

"The chief reason for the unit and for the girls being here is to give them a broad work experience, and experience of cooperative living with educational advantages woven into the scheme."

The test of the Sheboygan experiment will come when the graduates walk into employment offices with their newly-acquired skills.

A "convenience" wall is a feature of the kitchen, concealing an ironing board, cabinets, drying racks, etc. Other features of the bride's kitchen are indirect lighting over both sink and stove. Some of the windows are shown with concealed lights to give a "sunlight" effect even on cloudy days. These are especially effective behind the newer softly colored glass curtains in peach or rose tones.

TROUT PLANTED IN REMOTE LAKES

Packstring Ends Task on Cascade Skyline

Work of planting more than 1,000,000 trout in isolated lakes of the Central Oregon Cascades, in areas that can be reached only over mountain trails, has been completed after two months of effort, state game department officials reported here today.

The million fingerlings were carried into the remote lakes on packstrings. The fish distribution work was started on July 7 and completed only this past week. First plantings of fingerlings was in Faye lake, the packstring moved slowly along the Cascade divide, the final plantings being in Como lake, south of Mt. McLaughlin, in the Klamath country.

Fingerlings used in the planting work were supplied from the Fall river hatchery and carried out to the end of roads in a tank truck. In several localities, portable "holding ponds" were used, when a supply of cold water was obtainable.

A packstring of five mules and two horses, supplied by Sandy Leach of McKenzie Bridge, was used in carrying the trout into the isolated lakes. Harry McGraw of the state fish and game department assisted in the work.

On an average of 1500 trout were transplanted in each of the special water-filled cans carried on the packstrings. Toward the end of the work, the trout were about three inches long.

The trout were distributed in approximately half a hundred lakes along the Cascade divide. Only a few of the lakes stocked last year were visited this year. Lloyd Wilcox, superintendent of the Fall river trout hatchery, reports.

A list of the lakes stocked and the number of trout placed in each has been supplied by the Deschutes County Sportsmen's association.
