

Autumn Heat Wave Worries Football Squads Invading California

Illinois Faces Big Assignment

Oregon Also Wonders About Reserves

San Francisco, Oct. 13 (UP)—An autumn heat wave, covering most of California, is going to be a big factor tomorrow in the football games which will be played by Pacific Coast conference teams on golden state gridirons.

Illinois, a visitor from the mid-west, and Oregon, a neighbor from the northwest, are especially fearful of what that hot California sun is going to do to their gridiron squads in their battles with University of Southern California and University of California respectively.

The Trojans, taking time off from their quest of another conference title to play an intercollegiate game, have sufficient manpower to withstand high temperatures but with Bob Zuppke's Illini the question of adequate reserves is a vital one that may deprive the visitors of what little chance they had of taking the men of Troy.

Oregon, by its record, rates superior to the twice-beaten California Bears. But California has the longer list of reserves in case the game turns into a contest of heat endurance.

U. C. L. A., victorious in a night game over Texas Christian and in the cool northwest over Washington, meets Stanford at Palo Alto. Stanford, beaten by Oregon State and Oregon so far, has revised its lineup with Hampton Pool switched from guard to quarterback and several tackle shifts made.

Another kind of heat—traditional rivalry—will play a part in the game at Pullman involving Washington and Washington State, each seeking its first conference win. Most of the experts favor Phelan's Washington Huskies. Oregon State, eighth member of the conference, plays Portland in an outside game.

The three conference and the Illinois-U. S. C. intersectional game top the program which lists seven Friday night contests: 19 on Saturday, and two on Sunday.

Sport Parade

New York, Oct. 13 (UP)—To look at them you'd never guess it, but Mike Jacobs and the British empire have something in common.

The sun never sets on their enterprises. Mike hasn't been around quite as long as the British empire (again you'd never guess it by looking at them), but he is just about as far-flung. The fact that he has dug up Arturo Godoy and signed him for a fight with Joe Louis is proof of that.

I doubt if any organization in the world, other than Mike Jacobs', could have located Godoy. He left here some two years ago with \$8,000 in his pockets and with only a vague reference to Chile as a forwarding address.

To intimates (members of some of Hell's Kitchen's finest families, by the way), he confided that once reaching Chile he planned to plunge into the interior, select a tree that cast enough shade to cover his bulk, slip off his shoes, and live until his stake was exhausted. As a man can't spend a great deal of money stretched out under a tree with his shoes off, Godoy figured his \$8,000 would last him for life.

But he didn't reckon with the vast Jacobs' boxing organization, which, apparently, keeps a card index on every owner of a cauliflower ear in the world. It must have come as a rude shock to him when that messenger boy reached him (probably by mule) with an offer to fight Louis. I can visualize him, there under the tree, debating the wisdom of making the long trip north for the purpose of getting his profile battered into an even worse state of disrepair. I imagine he didn't yield until he figured out that the 17½ per cent of the gate guaranteed him would run into enough money to allow him to buy his own tree, under which he could sit until his beard twined with the branches and afforded him even better shade for the 24 hour siestas he loves so well.

Godoy won't last long with Louis, but he is likely to draw a full house into Madison Square Garden for his bout with the champion. This because he will provide good copy for the publicity machine that Jacobs keeps running night and day. Godoy can be sold to the public, no doubt about that. He holds two clear cut decisions over Tony Galento, the man who lasted four rounds with Louis and who knocked out Lou Nova.

The Chilean is the roughest fighter to show around New York in the past 10 years. Galento is a stickler for the rules compared to the South American, who considers ring etiquette something for sissies. He slaps, cuffs, backhands, knees, butts, elbows, and would gladly add biting to his repertoire if it were suggested to him. And you must say this for Arturo—he never complains about what the

other fellow does to him. He can take it just as ungracefully as he hands it out. But he is easy to hit. Even if they camouflaged him with var-colored stripes of paint or with underbrush, Louis couldn't help landing on him. And what Louis can hit, Louis can beat. Godoy is too slow, too big, too awkward to elude the champion for more than a round or two. After that—well, he'll get stretched out. But as that is a position he likes, I don't suppose there is any need to sympathize with him.

LITTLE CIVIL WAR TO OPEN TONIGHT

Frosh Meet Rooks Under Multnomah Lights

Portland, Ore., Oct. 13 (UP)—The annual "little civil war" football battle between the University of Oregon freshmen and the Oregon State college rooks is scheduled tonight at the Multnomah civic stadium in Portland.

It will be the first game of the season for both clubs. John Warren, Duckling coach, said he has "the best material in several years," while Bill McKelip, Orange mentor, declined comment.

The game is expected to provide the opposing schools a line on each other's 1940 varsity prospects, and for that reason will be well scouted. Warren indicated he would start Roy Ell, former Jefferson high of Portland star, at fullback, with two imports, Louis Beaum of Pittsburgh, Penn., and Jim Shepard of White Bear, Minn., at the halfback posts.

McKelip did not name his starters, but Orange followers said Lloyd Wickert, former Aberdeen, Wash., star, is a certainty at one tackle.
