

# RISE IN SUGAR AID TO BEETS

## Crop Worth About 150 Million Dollars

### Large Number of Men Are Employed in Cultivation; Industry Helped

Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 21.—Harvest of the 1939 sugar beet crop—valued at more than \$150,000,000—is in full swing with 165,000 growers, field and factory workers living in nine western states.

There are 55 factories in the nine-state area that includes Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Oregon, Washington, California, South Dakota and Colorado.

Operations of the factories got under way for the season in late September, reaches a peak in late October and will continue until early December with runs averaging 80 days each.

The nine-state region normally produces about 70 per cent of the total beet sugar produced in the United States. The remainder comes from Michigan, Nebraska, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin.

Officials of the western industry estimated that one hundred pound bag of refined sugar this year compared with the 1938 production of 24,530,000 one-hundred pound bags.

**Income to Exceed 1938 Figures**

However, the return of about \$145,440,000 from refined sugar and \$6,000,000 from by-products—beet tops, molasses and beet pulp for stock feed—will be higher this year, officials said, because of the higher price now being received for sugar.

The total payrolls for harvesting and processing the 1939 crop were estimated at \$31,000,000 to be divided among 166,000 workers.

Emphasizing the importance of sugar beets to the west, industry officials said other benefits would include \$20,784,400 received by transportation companies and \$14,846,000 paid federal and state governments in taxes.

In the Utah area, officials estimated 1939 operations would give employment to 2,100 workers in factories and receiving stations and 19,000 farmers and field workers. Their payroll will be \$3,810,240. Value of the Utah sugar crop was estimated at \$12,960,000 plus an additional \$55,000 in by-products. The harvest is in 31,340 acres.

**Eight Factories in Idaho**

Idaho has eight factories and its sugar harvest will return a payroll of \$4,264,500 to 2,400 factory and receiving workers and 22,000 farmers and field laborers. The sugar content value of Idaho's beets was estimated at \$17,520,000 with an additional \$731,460 in by-products, all harvested from 73,000 acres.

There is only one factory in Washington, but it will process 628,000 tons of beets that will yield an estimated 27,000 tons of sugar worth \$3,240,000 and \$140,000 in by-products. The \$344,000 payroll will go to 300 factory workers and 2,700 farmers who will work a total of 13,500 acres.

Montana has five factories and will process 900,000 tons of beets. The sugar yield was estimated at 137,000 tons worth \$16,440,000, while by-products were valued at \$678,000. Montana sugar workers include 1,500 in factories and 13,600 on farms totaling 75,000 acres. The Montana payroll was estimated at \$3,156,000.

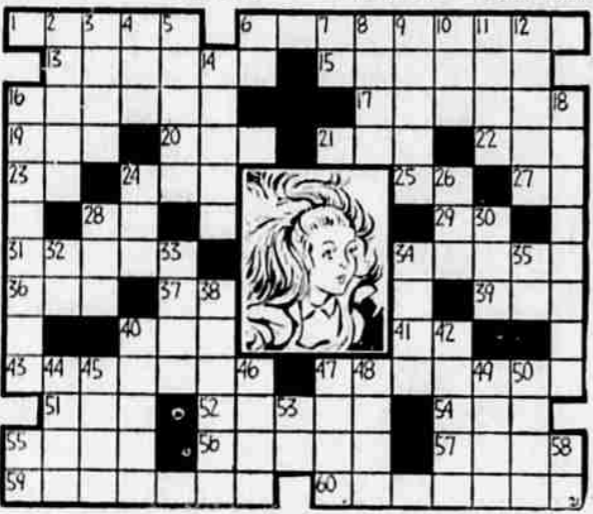

In Wyoming, 621,000 tons of beets will be harvested from 50,000 acres and processed by five factories with the sugar yield of 108,000 tons worth \$12,960,000. By-products were valued at \$471,000. Payrolls in Wyoming will total \$2,700,000, distributed among 1,500 factory and 13,600 farm workers.

California Has 160,000 Acres

The picture in California is 10 factories processing 2,320,000 tons of beets, yielding 333,000 tons of sugar worth \$39,960,000, plus \$1,514,000 in by-products from 160,000 acres. California's sugar industry will pay \$5,863,000 to 3,000 factory and 27,000 farm workers.

Colorado's 17 factory will process 1,718,000 tons of beets, expected to yield 353,000 tons of sugar valued at \$42,360,000 and \$1,471,000 in by-products. The Colorado payroll was estimated at \$9,457,000, distributed among 5,100 factory workers and 46,000 farmers who till 156,000 acres devoted to sugar beets.

In South Dakota the single plant will process 70,000 tons of sugar from 7,200 acres. The yield of 10,000 tons of sugar was estimated to be worth \$1,200,000, while value of by-products was said by officials to approximate \$59,360. Three hundred factory

workers and 2,700 farmers and agricultural workers will share a payroll of \$544,000.

## Concert Association Will Present Star

The Bend Cooperative Concert Association will open its season next Wednesday, presenting Rose Bampton, Metropolitan opera star, in a concert at the high school gymnasium. The concert will begin at 8 o'clock and admission will be by membership card only.

Members of the association who were enrolled last week may exchange their receipts for membership cards at the chamber of commerce office beginning Monday, it was announced today.

Rose Bampton made her operatic debut at the Metropolitan only a few years ago, but has won nation-wide acclaim. She has been a favored soloist with the New York philharmonic, the Philadelphia, Cleveland, St. Louis and Detroit symphonies and many other famous musical organizations.

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## JUNIOR RED CROSS UNITS ORGANIZED

### Fifteen Schools are Taking Part in Program

Thirteen Deschutes county schools are now training for Junior Red Cross work and this group will be increased to 15 in the near future when the Redmond Grade school and the Allen school of Bend are formally signed for junior activities. Mrs. Max Hemingway, chairman of this phase of Red Cross activities, has announced. The schools already enrolled are Reid, Kenwood and St. Francis of Bend, Placerville, Pinehurst, Cloverdale, Sisters, Tumalo, Terrebonne, Tehow Butte, Young and Richardson.

In preparation for the 1939 American Red Cross roll call, to open on November 7, the juniors of Allen and Kenwood schools are making original posters to be displayed in downtown stores. These schools will also present Red Cross playlets at service clubs previous to the roll call.

The Richardson school has prepared an album of Central Oregon to exchange with a school of similar size in the south. The album contains original art work of Central Oregon scenery, bird and flowers, as well as interesting data dealing with history, geography, sports and industries of this section of the state. Several other schools of the county are planning to make albums as a part of their Red Cross work this year.

Many of the enrolled schools have chosen holidays throughout the year for which they will make trays for the St. Charles hospital. Members at the Tetherow Butte school are working on ash trays and vases to be presented to the hospital.

Mrs. Hemingway reports that the school children of the county, enrolled in the various junior units, are taking part in the national safety campaign.

"These boys and girls," she said, "will be serving as members of a national youth army of 10,000,000 pupils of private and parochial schools who will take home check lists distributed by the Red Cross and will seek the cooperation of their families in making a careful examination of their homes and surroundings to find and remove all possible causes of accident, death and injury."

"Last year, there were more than 100,000 accidents on the farms of America and 4300 of these were fatal," Mrs. Hemingway said. She added that "it is apparent that there is no one who has greater need for being accident-minded than the farmer." Mrs. Hemingway pointed out that the principal agents of farm accidents are, first, machinery, and second, livestock.
