

# STOCKS HAVE FIRMER TONE

## Commodities Steady to Firm Today

### War News, Improvement In Domestic Business Big Factors

New York, Oct. 21 (U.P.)—The stock market developed a firmer tendency today in volume double that of a week ago. Bonds were firm with U. S. issues and foreign loans higher. Commodities were steady to firm.

Improvement in the share market hinged on the German statement denying further peace moves; receipts of the first big foreign war order—2,000 trucks valued at \$3,500,000; and further business improvement.

Truck stocks stood out from the start, many rising to new highs on word that the French had placed the 2,000-truck order. Studebaker opened 12,000 shares at 9 1/4 and then rose to a new high at 9 3/4.

Other truck shares to make new tops were Mack at 31 1/4 up 1/4; Diamond T Motor at 9 1/2 up 1/4; and White at 14 1/4 up 1/4. Clark Equipment, makers of truck parts, reached a new high at 33 1/2 up 1/4. International Harvester, also a truck producer, rose a point.

Motors, motor equipments, and rubbers made fractional gains. Chrysler was sustained by announcement conference would be resumed Monday between company officials and the union.

Steel shares were aided by indications the country's steelmaking operations would mount to a new record high next week.

United States Steel at 77 1/2 up 1/4; Bethlehem 31 1/2 up 1/4; Inland 23 1/4 up 1/4; Republic 27 1/2 up 1/4; and Wheeling Steel 35 1/2 up 1/4, the last a new high for the year.

Commonwealth & Southern was active in the utilities. A block of 10,000 shares sold after the stock opened on 9,500 shares. It held at 1 1/2, unchanged.

Aviations resumed their rise under the leadership of Douglas which gained a point. Curtiss-Wright equalled its high. Other war issues were firm, including the coppers and rail equipments. Small advances were noted in the leading rails.

Flintkote rose a point in the building shares. Sears Roebuck made a new high and Montgomery Ward equalled its high in the mail orders.

Dow Jones closing stock averages: Industrial, 153.86, up 0.86; rail, 34.78, up 0.20; utility, 26.05, up 0.18.

Stock sales approximated 540,000 shares against 250,000 in the short session last week. Curb stock sales were 86,000 shares against 59,000 last Saturday.
