

Fraternity Crasher Gets Two-Year Term

Eugene, Ore., Dec. 21 (AP)—Eddie Baker—self-styled brother in bond of the adopted Pi Kappa Alpha—today was on his way to Salem to serve a term not to exceed two years for what his "brothers" at the University of Oregon and Washington consider was "downright unfraternal."

According to testimony revealed in the circuit court of Judge G. F. Skipworth, Baker had a habit of dropping in on the fraternity, and after absorbing considerable hospitality, dropping out with all the loose change he could find.

He was finally arrested on the Washington campus and returned to Eugene for trial, where he was sentenced to a two-year term, the maximum.

State Buys \$100,000 Worth of Auto Tires

Salem, Ore., Dec. 21 (AP)—The state board of control yesterday awarded contracts for approximately \$100,000 worth of tires and tubes for the state fleet for 1940.

The contract, calling for delivery as requested throughout the year, was split among three Portland firms that submitted the lowest bids.

The Labor Spring and Tire Co. will furnish Gillette tires, Signal Oil company, Lee tires, and Munnell & Sherman will furnish McClaren tires.

The state used Lee tires exclusively this year. The prices secured this year were slightly lower but an increase in the fleet will make the total price for 1940 approximately the same as for 1939.

The state also purchased 10 four-wheel drive trucks from the Howard-Copper Corp. of Portland on a net bid of \$38,410, and four semi-trailers from Wentworth & Irwin, Portland, for a total price of \$5,995. Two small trucks were bought from the Western Road Machinery Co., Portland, at a total cost of \$5,538.00. All of the trucks were bought for the state highway commission.

Washington, Dec. 21 (AP)—Tommy Loughran, former light-heavyweight champion, ran afoul of the law today in his claims for a correspondence course to create paragons of strength.

The federal trade commission issued a complaint against Loughran, who once fought Primo Carnera for the heavyweight championship, charging that he had misrepresented the course in advertising.

College of Pacific Beaten in Hawaiians

Honolulu, Dec. 21 (AP)—The Healan team of Honolulu defeated Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg's College of Pacific touring squad last night, 18 to 7.

Healan gained a 12-point advantage in the first period that the California team was unable to match. The Hawaiians' third touchdown was made in the third quarter. The Bengal's only score came in the second quarter.

The brilliant ball-carrying of Jud Atchinson, former Texas university star, gave the Healan victory over the College of Pacific football team before 5,000 persons here last night.

Atchinson personally scored two touchdowns for the town team and passed to Morse for the third. Bill Thomas, Tiger halfback, was removed in the first quarter with a leg injury, which handicapped Pacific's offensive.

Healan made 200 yards from scrimmage and 76 yards from passes, while Pacific rushed the ball 118 yards and passed for 50. Each team made nine first downs.

Oregon State college meets Healan here on Christmas day. The Beavers also have a New Year's day engagement with the University of Hawaii.
