

COUGARS LOSE TITLE CHANCE

Washington Takes Tilt At Pullman, 53-52

Oregon State and Oregon Left in Northern Division Race

Pullman, Wash., Feb. 21 (AP)—The northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball title race today was reduced to two teams—Oregon State college and University of Oregon; with the odds all in favor of the former.

Washington State college gave up its mathematical chance for a tie by losing last night to University of Washington, 53-52. The Huskies' margin came on a free throw by Bobby Dorr in the last 20 seconds.

The Cougars led at halftime, 30-25, but their defense fell apart and in the final minutes the outcome was constantly in doubt. The lead changed five times in the closing seven minutes.

But with little over a minute to go, Center Jack Jennings put W. S. C. ahead 52-50. Then Bill McDonald, Washington center, tied the score, followed by Dorr's decisive conversion—his only point of the game.

Scoring honors went to Guard Bob Voelker of Washington with 16 points. Only the Oregon quintet, with four defeats, has a mathematical opportunity now. Oregon State college, with two defeats and three games to play, can clinch the title by defeating the Webfoots this week-end.

U. of O. Works Out At Spring Football

Eugene, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP)—Sixty-five footballers answered the call to spring practice at the University of Oregon yesterday.

Coach G. A. "Tex" Oliver, who decided on the early sessions in order to take advantage of unusually clear February weather, said drills would be held three times a week, weather permitting.

Of the 65 aspirants, about 20 were veterans of the 1939 varsity.

Former Pro Coach to Work at Occidental

Los Angeles, Feb. 21 (AP)—Occidental college today looked forward to a new brand of football after signing Elmer C. Henderson, former coach of the professional Detroit Lions, as head coach.

Los Angeles, Feb. 21 (AP)—There may be a better, quicker formula for success than staying the distance with Joe Louis in a prize fight ring, but those of us who sat around Godoy's hotel suite here yesterday have our doubts.

Even marrying the boss's daughter, or winning the democratic primary in Alabama doesn't furnish as quick a cut to fame and fortune. Three weeks ago, before Godoy went 15 rounds with the champion in Madison Square Garden, he was as unknown as the cause of a common cold. His name was a household word in only one household—that of Manana and Papa Godoy, somewhere down in Chile.

Now you should see him. He traveled across country in the elegance of a maharajah. His brief stops at such points as Kansas City and St. Louis brought out cheering crowds. He was interviewed and photographed and his listeners hung on his words like acrobats on a horizontal bar.

Los Angeles and nearby Hollywood, neither of which is unaccustomed to celebrities, were excited by his arrival. The man nobody knew three weeks ago was besieged by so many offers and invitations that his charge d'affaires could not handle all of them and was forced to engage an assistant to do the job.

The movies wanted him. Hollywood called up to ask him if he were available to make several short subjects and even the mighty Zanuck expressed an interest in having him play in a new super-production, "The South American Way."

Radio concerns kept his phone ringing. Could he speak on this hour? Could he tell of his fight with Louis on this 15 minutes? And would he have time enough to guest star on that national hook-up?

The theaters went right out and hired him. Without asking to see the cup for rhumbaing and tangoing he says he won in Buenos Aires, Montevideo, and Madison Square Garden, agents booked him for ball room numbers and up went his name in lights.

His hotel room was a mad-house, what with phones clanging, bellhops flying in and out with messages, and autograph seekers all but beating down the door to get a genuine "Arturo Godoy" on a slip of paper.

Body couldn't accept all the offers. There were too many even for a set of Siamese twins, working in double shifts. So, with the aid of his tour manager, Billy McCarney, he sifted them out and took only the best. Time was a consideration, too, because Los Angeles is not the only city that wants a peek at the man who stayed with Louis. He must leave within ten days to fulfill engagements in Buffalo, Peoria, Sauk Centre, and way points.

For the moment he is much more of an attraction than the man who licked him. Louis beat him, and kept the title, but dropped into comparative obscurity, while Godoy was vaulted into the position of a national figure.

Godoy is not the only man who has feathered his nest with dollar bills on the strength of having survived 15 rounds with Louis. Tommy Farr's defeat by the champion was worth much more to him than any victory he ever scored. And Bob Pastor is still living on the reputation of having stayed ten rounds with the Detroit Bomber.

Billy McCarney, the old carpet-bagger of boxing, who is handling Godoy on tour, says the South American should be champion today.
