New York, Feb. 21 (UP)—Strength in wheat and heavy demand for copper metal featured the nation's markets today. Stock and bond markets showed irregular activity as traders turned cautious in advance of the Washington's birthday holiday tomorrow.

Lack of demand for shares in the main list brought declines ranging to a point although there was no particular pressure. Many special issues made new highs and a few had wide gains.

Steels were depressed despite favorable news. The Iron Age saw indications of leveling off in the decline in operations shortly. Bethlehem touched 78, off 1 1/2, but came back substantially. At its low U. S. Steel was off more than a point.

Automobile shares were firm except Chrysler which lost nearly a point. Studebaker, most active stock on the board, made a new high at 12 1/2, up 1/2. General Motors was up fractionally.

Railroad issues were steady to slightly easier on indications the next few trading reports will show a more than seasonal decline. Little trading was done in utilities and they fluctuated narrowly.

Airways were mixed. Bendix made a new high at 30 1/2, up 1/2 point, and then drifted down to a small loss. United Aircraft registered a small advance.

New highs for the year were made by Colgate, Consolidated Copper Mines, Inspiration Copper, Magna Copper, Miami Copper, Dietrich-Werner-Gilbert, Diamond T Motor, Twin Coach, General Telephone, Gillette, Howe Sound, Martin-Perry, Marshall Field and National Distillers.

Low Jones preliminary closing stock averages industrial, 148.34; oil, 31.40; rail, 30.80; 4.72; utility, 25.35; up 0.05; 65 stocks, 49.2; up 0.14.

Stock sales approximated 780,000 shares against 813,000 shares yesterday. Curb stock sales were 166,500 compared with 130,000 shares in the previous session.

BOSTON WOOL
Boston, Feb. 21 (UP)—A waiting attitude predominated in the Boston wool market today. The U. S. agriculture department reported.

Users were showing no interest in greasy combing domestic wools except for specialties such as low quarter quantity or for an occasional small quantity of some grade to piece out stocks for immediate needs.

Despite the lack of demand holders of territory wools were maintaining quotations at last week's level. Combings three-eighths blood territory wool which is currently one of the most plentiful grades of domestic wools on this market were quoted fairly firmly at 80 to 82 cents scoured basis.

Woman Organist Well Received at Concert
Miss Claire Coci, distinguished young organist from New York city, lived up to her reputation as one of the country's foremost woman organists by her performance on the new Kimball pipe organ in Bend's First Baptist church last night.

Before a large audience which filled the church, Miss Coci presented her recital of classic and popular music. In the recital "Toccata and Fugue in D Minor," by Bach, which opened the concert, the artist displayed the finely balanced tonal resources of the organ by a sparkling technique. The Bach "Choral" which followed was played in well chosen, broad, sweeping lines. Buxtehude's "Lute" literally danced in classic figuration.

Miss Coci's next two groups contained the more popular variety of music. "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," and "Noel," both received enthusiastic response from the audience. Two other American compositions represented were "Toccata on St. Theodore," by Roland Diggle, and "Carillon," by Eric Delamarter.

Probably the two most startling numbers on the program were the "Toccata" from Widor's fifth symphony, and the "Finale" from Vienne's first symphony, both played in scintillating, clean cut style.

Initiative Proposes Return of Pinballs
Portland, Feb. 21 (UP)—An initiative proposal to legalize pinballs, punchboards, bingo, bank nights and other such operations was ready today for filing with the secretary of state at Salem sometime this week.

The document, consisting of 34 typewritten pages and 26 sections, will be filed by John V. Van Horne, secretary-treasurer of the Oregon Merchants' Legislative league.

Van Horne claimed revenue from the proposed amendment, if adopted, would be about \$2,000,000 annually, the greater part of which would be returned to the counties to pay county costs of old age assistance.

The total included nine officers among whom was Commander S. A. Cooper; 145 enlisted men, and members of the staff of the navy, army and air force institute.
