

MADIGAN TO DRAW SALARY

Fired Coach to Just Sit Around

Contract of St. Mary's Mentor Runs for 13 Months

San Francisco, March 13 (AP)—Edward P. (Slip) Madigan, who was fired as St. Mary's football coach because he wouldn't quit, said today he planned to "show up at Moraga each day and just sit doing nothing" until the 13 months salary still due on his contract is paid him.

Slip, who made St. Mary's a power in the football world, claimed a feud with Andrew Burke, a member of the board of athletic control, was responsible for his dismissal.

The board issued a second statement denying Madigan's assertion and revealed the decision to buy up his contract had been taken a week ago. It was suggested he ask for a leave of absence or to be relieved of his duties, with assurance no publicity would be given until Madigan himself could make it public and thus save himself embarrassment.

Instead Madigan wrote Brother Albert, president of St. Mary's, declining to resign or ask for a leave, the board statement said, leaving no alternative but to release the story for publication.

"I don't see any reason to feel badly about it," said Madigan. "The whole thing is purely a question of personal enmity between myself and Andrew Burke. He has always threatened to 'get me'."

"I knew this was coming and I have written letters to my friends around the country, seeking business opportunities. I can't say I will leave coaching for good, but I do prefer to enter business."

"After all, I was a lieutenant in the United States navy and I'm a graduate in law. I still know my way around."

In the "good years" after St. Mary's grew from a one-mousepower institution that lost 127 to 0 to California, Slip's salary and commissions ran around \$20,000 a year, but after bondholders foreclosed on St. Mary's and cancelled his percentages, it dropped to about \$15,000 a year.

J. Phillip Murphy, chairman of the athletic board, was in Seattle last week. He refused to deny reports he had conferred with Coach Jimmy Phelan of Washington. Phelan's contract still has a year to run, but he has not been happy with the wolves yapping at his heels and perhaps could be enticed away. Murphy also planned to go to Los Angeles this week, possibly to interview Mike Fecarevich, former Loyola coach, and Justin M. (Sam) Barry of Southern California.

Wolfe Tone Wins on Hood's Magic Mile

Timberline Lodge, Ore., March 13 (AP)—Wolfe Tone, a member of the Timberline Ski club, today was awarded the first gold ski for negotiating Mount Hood's magic mile source in one minute, 9.6 seconds.

Test Chairman Jim Nutter said Tone's average speed for the measured mile course was 51.8 miles an hour. Silver skis are awarded for times of a minute and one half or less, and bronze skis for three minutes or less.

California's Turkey Holdover Crop Large

Sacramento, Cal., March 13 (AP)—A record holdover storage of turkeys from the 1939 season will result in raising of slightly fewer birds in 1940 than in 1939, it was reported by the California cooperative crop reporting service.

The 1939 crop reached an all-time high of 3,281,000 turkeys, bringing low average prices and accounting for the above average storage. Cold storage holdings in California on Feb. 15 totaled 6,560,000 pounds.

McLemore's Sport Parade

Daytona Beach, Fla., March 13 (AP)—Without so much as a hint from him that he ever plans to retire, scores of persons have been suggested as possible successors to Judge Kenneth Mountain Landis as high commissioner of organized baseball.

Among those who have been mentioned as candidates for Landis' \$75,000 a year job are James A. Farley, postmaster-general, Jimmy Walker, playboy mayor of New York; Winston Churchill, Britain's first lord of the admiralty; Aimee Semple McPherson, America's first admiral of the lord, and almost everyone else of whom who ever have heard.

Any one of the persons mentioned would be fine for the job but not one of them would be my first choice when and if the bushy-haired Landis decides to quit and spend the remainder of his life trying to get home in two on long par four golf holes.

My vote would be cast for a screwy article who operates under the name of Joe Engel. He is not quite as well known as Winston Churchill say, or as Farley or Walker. But he would bring to baseball something that none of these gentlemen could. Farley would bring it shrewdness, Walker would contribute charm, and Churchill would furnish it action. But these are not the things baseball needs.

What baseball needs is novelty. It is just about the same game that it was when A. Doubleday, its creator, was playing a bewhiskered first base. The sport has been crying, and loudly, for an injection of imagination, a sport of color, and a transfusion of change.

Engel would provide this. He'd either provide it or die trying. As a player, scout, owner, manager, and almost everything else connected with baseball, he has proved that he has no patience with the accepted order of things. His present position is president of the Chattanooga lookouts team of the Southern Association.

He moved into Chattanooga when baseball was dying and the lookouts were lower than the thermometer was in Florida this winter. Engel figured, and rightly, that Chattanooga, having a high community I. Q., had tired of hum-drum, day-in-and-day-out, the same old game of baseball.

So he proceeded to give the game a shot in the arm. He decorated the Chattanooga park with cages of canaries. Reason: Even if the team is losing the customers can listen to the songs of the sweetest singers known to mankind.

He staged a wild elephant hunt with native Africans doing the hunting, right in the confines of the ball park. Reason: Thousands of persons have seen a nine-inning ball game, but how many have ever seen a bit of Africa—gay, wild, untamed Africa? To further interest in the team, and make it a definite part of the community, he sold shares in the club. Any fan could buy a share of the club and become a voter. The club now is owned by thousands of Chattanooga rooters.

Last year Chattanooga won the Southern league pennant. Kiki Cuyler is manager and tremendously popular with the fans. When time came for Cuyler to be signed for another contract Engel didn't have him sign in the usual and dull manner. He held a signing night, and before a packed park, wrestled Cuyler to the ground at homeplate and, threatening him with a bat, forced him to accept a new contract. He once traded an infielder for a turkey. In fact, he has done almost everything since he took charge of the Lookouts.

Give him all of baseball to work with, in a job like Landis holds, and every day would be New Year's eve, no holds barred, and every man for himself. Of course, Engel as high commissioner would all but kill baseball's old foggies. Come to think of it, that would be a pretty good idea.

**Powell Butte Harbors
Hungarian Partridges**

Three pairs of Hungarian partridges were released this morning in the south slopes of Powell Butte by James O. Gillfillan, it was reported this morning by Don Peoples, secretary of the local chamber of commerce. The birds were sent from the state game farm at Ontario.

This consignment of birds is the 15th released near Bend during the past 15 years, said Peoples, and as yet the partridges have not established themselves in the vicinity, although there are a few at Powell Butte. However, the other shipments were made in bunches of unmated birds from two to five dozen at a time. This is the first attempt made to set free mated partridges, and it is hoped they will thrive in their new environment.

Previous "plantings" of the Hungarian game birds have been at Tumalo, Cloverdale, southeast of Bend, on the Deschutes river, and Powell Butte.

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
