Talent for March 29 Viewed

Thirty-Six-Round Card To Be Held at Gymnasium

Bend veterans in charge of the benefit card to be presented in the local gymnasium on the night of March 29 took time out today to look over the talent lined up by Matchmaker Harold Kline and agreed that the card should prove a Central Oregon attraction. Doors are to open at 7 o'clock and action will start promptly at 8 o'clock.

The fights will be streamlined affairs, if plans outlined by Kline are carried out. Thirty-six rounds of boxing have been lined up, but the number of the fights will not go the scheduled limits.

The benefit card will bring back to the local ring Flash Jordan, a hard fighter from Corvallis, and Dave Morse, 140 pound battler from Prineville. Jordan, popular with local fans, has never lost a decision in the local ring. In the second part of the double main event, Bob Chambers, 131 pounds, Bend, will tangle with Earl Downey, 151 pounder from Redmond. The double main events will be eight round fights.

Jackie McKay, CCC regional champion of the Vancouver district of Washington, will meet Orin Johnson, 130 youth from the Wapinitia reservation, in one of the preliminaries. In another of the "warmer uppers," Don Parke, 145 pounds, Bend, will meet Bud Harms, 146 pound knock-out artist from Powell Butte.
