

PHILADELPHIA EXPECTS 15,000

Convention Hall Not to Be Taxed

Restaurant, 68 Meeting Rooms Available for Delegates

Philadelphia, March 14 (AP)—The estimated 15,000 persons, including delegates, who will witness the nomination of a republican presidential candidate next June 24, will not overtax the commodious Philadelphia municipal auditorium.

Scene of most of the 1940 G. O. P. national convention's activity, the gigantic structure, designed in Italian Renaissance style, will accommodate 15,000 persons comfortably, without temporary structural changes which probably will be made before the convective opens.

A main auditorium, 300 feet long and 226 feet wide, with a classic vaulted ceiling stretching an average of 88 feet above the floor, will provide seating arrangements for 13,500 spectators, while 1,500 more will be seated on the spacious stage, which is 116 feet wide and 56 feet deep.

Not Marred by Pillars

A feature of the hall is its complete lack of supporting columns. Its balconies are of the hanging type, and not a single pillar obstructs the view

of any spectator in any part of the auditorium.

While seats in the balconies are permanent, the main floor is equipped with seats removable to make space for dancing, basketball, ice hockey and other indoor sports. The main floor provides 230,369 square feet of exhibition space, with facilities for gas, electricity, compressed air, hot and cold water, live steam and telephone service available for scores of small booths.

In addition to the main convention hall, there are 68 adjacent meeting rooms, the largest of which—the ballroom—seats 1,800 persons and is complete with stage and theatrical facilities.

Convention delegates will be entertained by—among other things—a \$60,000 pipe organ, considered one of the finest instruments of its type in the country. Capable of reproducing the sound of any musical instrument, the organ has three consoles—one for theatrical music, one for cathedral music, and a reproducing console.

The restaurant, on the floor below the main arena, is a complete modern culinary unit. The structure is complete with modern air-conditioning apparatus, which will spare convention delegates the hardship of a Philadelphia June.

Built in 1931

One of the newest of the nation's great halls, the municipal auditorium was opened in June, 1931, when the American Medical society held its annual convention, and exhibition there. Greatest of all its meetings to date was the 1936 democratic national convention, all demands of which were met by the hall's facilities.

While facilities are present to meet ordinary requirements, a special staff will be pressed into use, as in 1936, to meet the demands of a national political convention. Press sections

First Quarter Tax Payments \$417,126

Taxes totaling \$417,126.41 were paid into the county tax collector's office from January 1 to March 15, it was reported today by R. I. Hamby, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections. This includes taxes paid for all years, and amounts to 70.94 per cent of the budget levy this year, which is \$589,072.88.

The 1940 taxes paid during the first quarter were \$309,178.60, or 62.79 per cent of the levy, said Hamby. With the passing of March 15, discounts are no longer available on tax payments for the first quarter, and interest will be charged on them at the rate of two-thirds of a per cent each month. The next quarter payment is due June 15.
