

SAN DIEGO ON TOP OF HEAP

Lead Kept With Win From Oakland

Sacramento Beats Beavers By Score of 4 to 1

(By United Press)

San Diego continued at the top of the Pacific Coast league today through a 4-1 victory over Oakland with a 4-run rally in the ninth inning. Ben Cantwell, who had pitched light ball for eight innings, ran into difficulties and before Jack Salveson could be warmed up the Padres had sewed up the game.

Rugger Ardizola turned in another good game for Hollywood and the boys from the night club belt beat Los Angeles 6-2 to take a three to one series edge.

San Francisco began another one-game winning streak by whipping Seattle 3 to 1 behind the steady pitching of Al Epperly. President Charley Graham of the Seals said the other day that with steady pitching, his entire team would get over its jitters. Epperly apparently was just what the doctor ordered, for the Seals played errorless and sparkling ball.

Ted Jennings, whose timely hitting has been eclipsed by poor fielding, came up with a perfect four-for-four, one a double. Jennings has clouted 13 hits in the past two weeks. Hal Turpin gave up two runs in the second when he walked Ted Norbert, and Harvey Storey, Jack Burns and Al Wright followed with singles. Jennings double, Brooks Holder's single and Norbert's infield out brought the third run.

The Rainiers, who still are known as the Indians in the bay region, scored their only run in the eighth when Jo-Jo White, Kelleher and George Arthurs singled.

Sacramento lost Roy Pfeiffer, second baseman, perhaps for the season, when he broke a leg in the second inning of last night's game with Portland. The Solons won the game 4-1.

Pfeiffer was knocked down by Frank Hawkins when the latter sought to break up a double play. Not until the fifth inning did the Beavers get a hit off Bill Schmidt. They put three together in the sixth inning for their only run. Ralph Binkley and Orrell gave the Solons seven hits between them, with Binkley being charged with the defeat. Chet Wiskozek poled a homer in the first inning and Bob Blattner drove in three runs in the fourth to ice the game.

Increases Shown by Forest Game Census

The new game census increases in most of the game animals in Washington and Oregon, according to L. H. Douglass, assistant regional forester in charge of wildlife and range management.

Douglass said that the mild winter made a close count of the deer and elk difficult in some places. The deep snow that ordinarily concentrates these animals onto smaller range areas where they can be counted with some accuracy did not occur. Elk have not only increased in numbers but have spread into new range. They were found on every Oregon forest except the Umpqua and Fremont, and every Washington forest except the Gifford, Chelan and Mount Baker. The mule deer increase probably exceeded the number killed. The Malheur and Fremont ranges are overpopulated, the Deschutes understocked.

The antelope herd increased rapidly both on the national forests and on the range outside. The state of Washington has made a count of 23 head. The biological survey planted 24 head of Rocky Mountain sheep on the Mt. Mountain antelope reserve. This is considered first class bighorn range, according to the Biological Survey.

Blacktail deer may have increased slightly, but a good estimate is hard to make. They are scattered and they live in dense cover. Predatory animals and poachers keep the number down, Douglass said.

O.S.C. WINS BASEBALL GAME

Corvallis, Ore., April 13 (UP)—The Oregon State college baseball team scored an easy 12-4 victory over Linfield college of the Northwest conference yesterday in a pre-season game. Five Linfield batters coupled with sophomore southpaw Gene Williams' five-hit pitching accounted for the victory.

TRACK TEAM THIRD AT HAYWARD MEET

Medford and Salem Take Top Positions

Lava Bear track and field teams performed on two "fronts" yesterday, to win third place at the Hayward relays in Eugene and defeat Redmond 71 to 51 in a dual meet. A 14-man squad was taken to Eugene for the annual relays, in which 28 schools were entered.

Medford won the fourth running of the annual Hayward relays at the state university with a total of 24 points in the "A" competition, defeating Salem, which placed second with 21½ points. Bend scored 14½ points to place third, Beaverton made 8 points, Eugene 6, Albany 2 and Chemawa 1.

The place earned by the Bears was one above that "conceded" by Coach John G. Jones in making a pre-meet prediction in which he correctly named the four winning teams. In the Eugene performance, Bend placed in every event except the shot put relay, and missed fourth place in that event by three inches.

Bend's outstanding performance was in the three-mile relay, won by the Bears as Bill Eby, Bob Russell, Darrell Simons and Leon Devereaux set a pace other "A" teams could not hold. Each of the Bend boys was ahead in his part of the relay.

"The performance of the entire Bend team pleased me very much," Coach Jones declared on his return to his home here. "In some events, I did not even expect the boys to qualify. The way they came through was satisfactory to me." Bend placed third in the sprint medley, and also third in the mile relay. The Bears took a fourth in the 440-yard relay and tied for third in the high jump relay. This tie was with Salem.

The Bears performed in their new uniforms. Ideal weather prevailed for the Eugene meet.

In the Redmond-Bend dual meet, Kilgore of the Panthers was high point man with 15 points accounted for by three first places. Redden was high for the Bears, with firsts in the two hurdle events and a tie in the pole vault. The dual meet points will count toward letters for the Bears.

New York, April 13 (UP)—A tip on a Kentucky derby horse travels faster than a hummingbird hurtling for home. Three years ago the public choice was Billionaire. He finished 20th and last to War Admiral. Two years ago the smart boys whispered the name of Bull Lea. He trailed in eighth place, 16 lengths behind Lawman. Last year the wise money was on Technician. This bold bucko ended fifth behind Johnstown.

Still it seems, the suckers never learn. This year, a new hot thing is riding the crest of the winter books. The name of this beauty is Mioland. The Brenda Diana Duff Frazier of 1940. In the short space of a single month this one-horse incident has dropped from 100-1 to 40-1 to 15-1 to 12-1 and still is sinking.

Mioland is a solid third choice for the derby. Although he lacks some of what behind Bimelech and Andy K, he is tied with Carrier Pigeon. In every bookie shop you hear his name and in southern California he is hotter than the forest fire which swept Santa Monica. But what I would like to know and, incidentally, what most of the real turf experts want to know, is why Mioland is getting this tremendous backing.

In his first race under the Howard banner, Mioland finished 13th. In his next, the \$50,000 Santa Anita derby, he closed a dozen lengths from the half to finish a flying fourth. The next time out he won.

This was in the \$10,000 San Juan Capistrano handicap, the gateway day feature at the great green California plant. In that race, Mioland defeated every top horse who had whipped him in the Santa Anita derby. He finished the mile and a sixteenth in 1:42 2/5, a length and a quarter in front. The winter book parade has dated from there.

Where this parade will end, I frankly don't know. We do know where Billionaire, Bull Lea, and Technician ended. We know, as well, where by choices usually end. After all, I was on Billionaire, Bull Lea and Technician. I gave them to you as money-back sure things. This year, however, I'm doubtful about Mioland. In fact, I don't think I like him. So better climb aboard, suckers, before I give you my four-star special for 1940. If you do it now, I promise I won't pick Mioland on May 3.

Elks Practice in Spite of Uncertainty

Bend's Oregon State league Elks were still uncertain of participating in league play today, but regardless of this uncertainty Manager Clyde Stokoe has called a practice session for Sunday afternoon, at 1 p. m. on the municipal diamond. The participation of the Bend team in league play is to depend on plans for the illumination of the local field, to make night games, required under the league schedule, possible. Plans for illumination of the local grounds are still being studied.

Manager Stokoe expects to have two complete teams on hand tomorrow and a practice contest has been scheduled. Fans interested in the Elks' 1940 talent have been invited to watch the players in action. Bend is scheduled to open its season on April 27, in Silverton. However, if the local field cannot be lighted, the Elks plan to abandon ball for this season, it has been announced.

Four pitchers have turned out for practice this season. They include John Murdock, all state star in Idaho last year; Jim Farmer, Lyle Turpin and Bob Houtchens. Catchers who have reported for practice are Wally Kromers and Murel Nehl.

Bill Hatch is working on first base, Harlow Burton is on second and Bob Douglass is holding down shortstop. Jack Gordon is the Elks' third baseman.

Regulars who so far have showed up for outfield duty are Joe Decker and George Walker. In addition to these old standbys, a considerable number of other players are trying out for places on the team and making fine showings. Manager Stokoe said.

North Crater Lake Approach Now Open

The north approach to Crater Lake, blocked by snow since late last fall, this morning was reopened to traffic, according to information obtained by the Bend chamber of commerce. Reopening of this paved route brings Crater Lake to within approximately 100 miles of Bend.

It was also announced from the chamber office this morning that the Diamond Lake cutoff, route that connects the Dallas-California highway with the Pacific highway in the Medford area is open. An attempt was made to open this cutoff about two weeks ago, but a snow storm halted the work.
