Prisoners Not Found On Island

Oregon and Washington Being Combed For Pair

Tacoma, Wash., April 13 (AP)—The search for two of this country's most infamous bank robbers was intensified in Washington and Oregon today as it became apparent that they had slipped through patrols after escaping from McNeil island federal prison.

Joseph Paul Cretzer, 28, former "bank robber No. 1" and "public enemy No. 4" on federal bureau of identification "wanted" list, and his brother-in-law, Arnold Thomas Kyle, 29, stole a truck Thursday and fled in a shower of bullets. They were serving 25 years each for robbing a Los Angeles bank.

The nearest approach to the mainland from McNeil island is 800 yards and Warden E. B. Swope at first doubted that they could have escaped through a quickly reinforced island patrol. He believed now, however, that they had either swum the icy waters of Puget sound or escaped in a fisherman's boat. The truck was abandoned on the island.

FFA Meet to Be at OSC April 25 to 27

Five hundred students and teachers of Smith-Hughes agriculture, from 52 different high schools in Oregon, will attend the annual FFA convention at Oregon State college April 25 to 27. For some years the attendance has been limited to this figure, being the maximum that can be cared for adequately on the campus.

The executive committee headed by David Baum of Union, now a freshman at Oregon State, will meet on Wednesday, April 24, to prepare final details and transact business in advance of the general meeting. In addition to a score of work contests, the delegates will also hold state finals in parliamentary procedure and public speaking contests, and will take part in a number of radio broadcasts.

Held in connection with the FFA convention will be the annual Ag fair, conducted by students in agriculture at the college. It will start Friday, April 26, with a parade, to be followed in the evening with a jam-boree in the gymnasium, consisting of various races, driving contests, staff members' driving contests, and the like.

Friday night and Saturday each of the 10 departments in the school will operate a booth. Saturday evening the annual "Little International" will be held to pick winners in livestock showmanship.

Episcopal Church Meet At Klamath on Monday

The annual convocation of the Episcopal church in eastern Oregon will open in St. Paul's church, Klamath Falls, on April 16, it has been announced by the Rev. G. R. V. Bolster of Trinity Episcopal church in Bend. A local delegation will be present. The Klamath Falls convocation is to last three days.

Delegates from church points throughout the diocese will be present and the assembly will be addressed by the Rt. Rev. W. P. Remington, D.D., of eastern Oregon, and by the Rt. Rev. Noel Porter, D.D., bishop of Sacramento.

Coincident with the convocation, the annual gathering of the Church Women's Service league of eastern Oregon will be held, with Mrs. Gertrude Phetteplace, formerly of Bend, presiding.

The program for convocation will include a banquet at the Willard hotel on Wednesday evening following a trip by the visitors to Crater lake in the afternoon.

Delegates attending from Trinity church of Bend are expected to include the Rev. Bolster, rector; Hugh Smith, Frank R. Prince and H. A. Miller and representatives from the outlying missions of Prineville and Cross Keys. A large number of members of the Episcopal Guild are also planning on attending the women's meeting.

Sons of Norway at Portland Convention

Portland, April 13 (AP)—Delegates to the 28th annual convention of the Sons of Norway lodge, Pacific coast district, met today to elect officers and complete resolutions.

Yesterday the delegates, representing lodges from Alaska, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and southern California, passed resolutions condemning the invasion of Denmark and Norway and approving establishment of a fund-raising system for post-war rehabilitation.

The principal resolution offered sympathy to the invaded Scandinavian nations and promised aid "with all means at our disposal in accordance with the peaceful aims of our own country."

About 30 members of the local Sons of Norway lodge are in attendance at the Portland meeting. The regular meeting of the local on Saturday night was cancelled because of the large number that is away.

New Airplane Added At Local Airfield
