Double Win Scored on Cardinals

Yankee Losing Streak Is Broken With Victory Over Boston

New York, May 13 (UP)—The Cincinnati Reds aren't paying one bit of attention to the "jinx boys" who are digging up new reasons every day why Bill McKechnie's club won't relax in the National league.

Not being the least superstitious the Reds ignore those crepe-hangers who point out that no team which lost the world series in four straight games ever came back to win the pennant the next season. Nor do they give a tumble to those skeptics who claim that no victim of a no-hit, no-run game ever won a flag. The Reds were recently humiliated by one Tex Carleton.

But since then they have given a very good imitation of a club that plays each game today and forgets about yesterday and tomorrow. Since Carleton's no-hitter, the Reds have won 9 out of 10 games and forged into the National league lead.

The Reds' latest exploit is a twin victory over what the experts concede to be their most dangerous rivals, the Cardinals. They smacked down St. Louis yesterday, 7-1 and 13-4, making four straight wins over the Cardinals without a loss. Up to now there seems to be no comparison between the Reds and Cards. In 4 games the Reds have won them all, scored 38 runs to the Cards' 11, made 48 hits to their 35, used four pitchers (all going the route) against 12 for the Red Birds.

Paul Derringer held the Cards to four hits in the opener, winning his third game.

Dizzy Dean was blasted out of the box again but the Cubs rallied to beat the Pirates 7-5. Billy Herman's homer with two on doing the damage in the 8th. Brooklyn beat the Phils 5-3. Second Freddy Fitzsimmons. The Giants nosed out the Bees 3-2, for their fifth straight. Mel Ott drove in the winning run.

The longest Yankee losing streak in 10 years—eight straight—came to an end when Red Ruffing blanked the Red Sox 4-0, before 41,376, largest throng of the season at Yankee stadium. Ruffing pitched brilliantly.

Johnny Babich, Athletics' rookie, won his fourth game by defeating the Senators, 4-2. He allowed only six hits. A walk and doubles by Sam Chapman and Al Rubeling provided the winning runs.

Pair of Games Dropped 5-2, 6-5

Douglass Stars in First Contests of 1940 Season

Albany defeated Bend 5 to 2 and 6 to 5 in an Oregon state league double-header here yesterday afternoon as the 1940 season opened on the local diamond before a large first-day crowd. Although victors, the visitors were able to score in only three innings.

Albany stowed away the first contest with a five-run rally in the fifth. Three runs in the third and another three in the fifth enabled the Linn county team, one of the strongest in the state league this season, to nose out the Elks in the second contest, a thriller from start to finish.

In each of the seven-inning games, the Elks took an early lead, but fell behind following the blitzkrieg attacks of the Alico.

For the Elks, the league contests were the first of the season, inasmuch as not even a practice game could be lined up because of inclement weather this spring and changes in the dressing room before the team played ball that was just short of being airtight, so far as fielding was concerned. Only once did the ball get away from the Elks, but it got so far away that time that enough runs came in to salt away the contest for Albany.

Boek Douglass, home town boy, made his debut in semi-pro ball in the Sunday afternoon games and turned in a brilliant performance. It was Douglass, playing short for the Elks, who scored the first run of the game in the opening contest of the afternoon. He got on base by pounding out a lousy two-bagger. Douglass also handled three hot assists without a bobble, scored one run in the first game and two in the second.
