Extensive Improvement Made on Bend Theater

Extensive improvement of the Liberty theater, including the painting of new carpet, the redecoration of the foyer, the repainting of the front and the installation of new illumination effects, was completed today when a huge flashing eagle, 10 feet in height, was placed high atop a new neon sign.

The neon illuminated sign, erected to replace a sign in use since 1926, is 39 feet in height, according to information from T. M. O'Donnell, owner of the Liberty theater building. The top of the tall sign is 55 feet above the street level.

Tested Recipes If you are looking for a rich dessert that can be made ahead of time, Mrs. Sara H. Wertz, county home demonstration agent, offers this recipe for pineapple loaf, with the following ingredients: Two-thirds cup butter, 2 cups powdered sugar, 3 eggs, separated, 1 No. 2½ can crushed pineapple, 1 cup whipping cream, ½ teaspoon salt, 40 graham crackers. Cream the butter, add powdered sugar, and well beaten egg yolks. Fold in well-drained pineapple. Beat the egg whites, beat the cream, combine the two, then add to the first mixture, folding in carefully. Crush crackers very fine, divide into half, and place one half in bottom of pan. Place cake mixture on top of this, leaving top rough. Sprinkle remainder of crumbs on top, and let stand at least eight hours in refrigerator. Serves 15. Patrolling Bering sea, U. 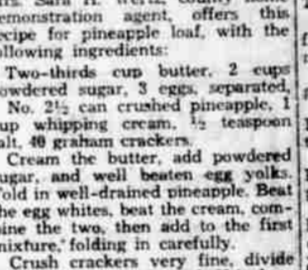
