

# HEAVY DAMAGE DONE AT MALTA

## Land Operations Are Small in Africa

### Italians Carry Out Air Raids on Allied Bases

Dome, June 21 (AP)—Heavy damage in air raids to the British Mediterranean base of Malta and the French North African base at Bizerta was claimed today in Italy's 10th war communique. The raids last night caused many fires, the communique said.

Operations continued on the eastern frontier of Libya, Italy's North African colony, the communique said, and while land activities were limited to "small tactical fights" it was claimed that Italian airplanes had destroyed 10 allied planes and 40 British tanks.

The communique claimed that Italian planes had raided the British air base at Mersa Matruh in Egypt and it said enemy planes raided the Italian base at Javello last night, causing little damage.

It was claimed that anti-aircraft guns shot down two British planes. One allied plane, it was said, raided Imperia on the Italian Riviera but only one bomb was dropped and in open country, causing no damage and no casualties.

Italian planes continued close reconnaissance of all enemy naval bases in the Mediterranean, according to the high command.

## Prineville Freight Shipments Increase

Prineville, June 21 (Special)—Shipments of freight over the City of Prineville railway for the first five months of 1940 were nearly double that for the first five months of 1939, according to figures obtained from the local railway office.

From January 1, 1939, to June 1, 1939, 704 cars of lumber, 88 cars of cattle, 13 cars of sheep and 75 cars of miscellaneous freight, making a total of 880 cars rolled over the city-owned railway.

From January 1, 1940, to June 1, 1940, 1271 cars of lumber, 61 cars of cattle, one car of hogs, seven cars of sheep and 92 cars of miscellaneous freight were shipped over the railway, making a total of 1432 cars of freight.

## Federal Men Guard Sued Italian Vessel

Astoria, Ore., June 21 (AP)—Federal officials kept a close guard on the Italian freighter, Leme, today after they received unconfirmed reports she might attempt to slip out to sea.

The Leme was interned when the company was sued on grounds that another ship of the line delivered at San Francisco a cargo of bananas which had been damaged en route. The suit was filed by two Guatemalans.

The Leme is owned by the Italia Societa Anonima de Navigazione. Another suit was instituted against her for \$100,000 worth of fuel oil delivered to the line. The suits were an outgrowth of Italy's declaration of war.
