

FELLER HURLS NEAR NO-HIT

Sievert of Athletics Is Successful Batter

Cincinnati May Run Away With National League Leadership

Cincinnati, July 13 (U.P.)—Doubleheaders, the Cincinnati Reds' deep-dish apple pie, might turn the National league into a minor runaway in the next few days.

The league leading Reds, who've won 17 games and lost only three in doubleheaders this season, have a pair of twin bills today and tomorrow and if they turn on the heat as they have in past duels they'll begin to open up daylight between them and their most dangerous rivals, the Brooklyn Dodgers.

In an effort to bring the Dodgers out of their 3-game slump, Manager Leo Durocher has announced a big shakeup in the Brooklyn lineup. He will bench Peeewe Reese in favor of himself, send Rookie Charley Giffert to the outfield instead of Joe Vesk and move Joe Medwick out of the clean-up spot. Medwick will go to the No. 3 spot with Babe Phelps hitting cleanup.

Pitching under the lights in Philadelphia last night, Bob Feller made a bid for his second no-hitter by holding the Athletics to one hit as the league-leading Indians triumphed 1-0. Feller's no-hitter was spoiled by Dick Sievert, who singled in the eighth.

The victory increased the Indians' lead to a full game over the idle Tigers.

The Cubs blanked the Bees, 2-0, on rookie southpaw Verne Olsen's five-hit pitching for his fifth victory. Olsen fanned seven and walked the same number. Bill Poseel, although yielding only six hits, was the loser.

The Phillies snapped the Pirates' four-game winning streak in a night game at Pittsburgh, 6-3. Hugh Mulcahy gave up seven hits for his eighth win.

Oakland Outfielder May Go to Detroit

Oakland, Cal., July 13 (U.P.)—A deal is underway whereby Mike Christoff, slugging outfielder, will join the Detroit American league club in the near future. It was disclosed today by V. A. Devincenzi, head of the Oaks club.

However, it all depends on willingness of Tiger officials to agree on price. Devincenzi hedged. The Oaks' chief wants a suitable price in addition to player help for Christoff's immediate delivery.

Del Baker, Oakland catcher when the Oaks won the 1927 pennant and now Detroit manager, thinks Christoff can give the Detroit Tigers the punch needed to win the pennant.

Seattle meanwhile was eking out a 3 to 2 14-inning victory over San Francisco.

Four errors contributed to the downfall of San Francisco at the hands of Seattle, and not one of the three runs scored by the Rainiers was earned off Frank Dasso. Paul Gregor gave one earned run to the Oaks.

San Diego went to town in the seventh inning and blasted out seven runs to defeat Los Angeles, 11 to 3. Hollywood scored two runs in the ninth for a 3 to 2 win over Portland. Although Ray Harrell gave the Stars only six hits, as against eight off Wayne Osborne, the Twinks grouped them in the third and ninth for their runs.

Bill Ross and his all-powerful Jack and Jill Tavernmen were scheduled to arrive in Central Oregon early today, and before meeting the Elks in an Oregon State league doubleheader here Sunday afternoon will face Prineville under the lights of the Crook county field tonight. After the game tonight, Ross plans to bring his team to Bend for a good rest before the Oregon State league battle. Ross has not yet announced his starting lineup for the State league games here Sunday afternoon, but it is expected that Clow, a right hander, will be used in one game and Pendergrass, a southpaw, in the other game. The first game of the doubleheader tomorrow afternoon will start at 1:30 p. m.

Bend's regular lineup will be ready for duty tomorrow. This lineup includes one of the fastest infield lineups in the league, with Jack Gordon at third, Wally Graser at short, Harlow Burton at second and John Bubala at first. Graser and Burton are at present leading the Elks in hitting. Graser has a .404 average and Burton is just behind with an average of .393.

In the outfield for the Elks tomorrow will be Andy Hurney, George Walker and either Clyde Askew or Murel Nehl. Walker, who has had some tough luck in the hitting department this season, has been hitting the ball in recent games. In Eugene, he got four hits out of seven times up. One of these was a long home run. Hurney, in right field, has been hitting .247, and has one of the most accurate throwing arms in the league. Wally Kremers and Nehl will handle the catching tomorrow, and the starting pitchers will probably be Lyle Turpin and Jim Farmer.
