

CLEVELAND ON TOP OF LEAGUE

Feller Wins Twentieth Victory

Pirates Keep Up Hot Pace In National Circuit By Beating Reds

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—The Cleveland Indians were back on top of the American league today for the tenth time this season and one faction of the Baseball Forecaster's association insists that the "team mutiny" is there to stay this time.

Bob Feller hurled the Indians to the fore yesterday by beating the Tigers, 8-5. It wasn't one of his better days but he pulled through despite a wild seventh inning in which he loaded the bases on three walks and then tossed a two-base hit to Barney McCosky. It was Feller's 20th victory.

The red-hot Pirates chalked up their 11th win in 12 starts to climb within a game and a half of third place in the National league last night when they defeated the leading Reds, 4-2.

Jimmy Webb's double drove in Bob Kennedy with the winning run as the Chicago White Sox climbed to within 2½ games of third place by whipping the St. Louis Browns, 6-5, last night before 4454.

Lynam Pins Burns in Redmond Appearance

Redmond, Aug. 13—Joe Lynam, making his first appearance in a local ring since his return from a prolonged training tour in southern states, won his match against Cyclone Bob Burns, Montana wrestler, in the headline bout of wrestling matches held here Friday night.

Lynam took two out of three falls, demonstrating to home town fans an immense improvement in technique since his appearance here last summer. In other bouts Friday night, Sparky Walker of Redmond lost to Owen Eugene, and Baker of Redmond won from Courtney of Warm Springs.

In one boxing match of the card, Feroni, Camp Redmond, a former lightweight A. A. U. champion, won the decision over Smith of Warm Springs with a clever exhibition of boxing.

Women's Swim Titles At Stake at Portland

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Helen Crenkovich, 10-foot springboard champion from San Francisco, and Marjorie Gestring, national platform titlist and 1936 Olympic games champion from Los Angeles, were limbering up at Jantzen beach today for the national A. Semi-Pro World Series To Be Held in September

San Juan, Puerto Rico (AP)—Juan Maldonado, amusement and sports commissioner of Puerto Rico, has announced that the 1940 semi-pro world series will be held here, between the United States and Puerto Rican semi-pro champions, starting Saturday, Sept. 21.

Maldonado said the U. S. champion, winner of the sixth annual national semi-pro tournament at Wichita, Kans. Aug. 16-28, would embark from New York Sept. 12 instead of a week earlier as previously announced.

The United States semi-pro titleholder will be the survivor of district and 48 state tournaments, as well as regional playoffs, that precede the national tourney in the National Semi-Pro Baseball congress.

Maldonado pointed out that the U. S. champion again would receive the round trip, all expenses paid, with the world's champion getting 20 per cent of the series' gross receipts and the loser 15 per cent.

The Guaymas of Puerto Rico defeated the Duncan, Okla., Halliburton Cementers, four games to two, in the first semi-pro world series here last September.

Pacific Coast Exports Drastically Hit by War

Portland, Ore. (AP)—The export trade of Pacific coast ports has been hard hit by the European war, and customer nations which once bought heavily of west coast supplies have not purchased any products in several months.

I pick Bob Pastor.

I don't ask me why I like Pastor over Billy Conn, because choosing between them is like naming the more handsome of Siamese twins, or selecting which pea in a pod is most likely to succeed.

Billy and Bob are that much alike as fighters. To start with, neither is a full-sized heavyweight. Conn, despite all the talk of how he has grown in the past three months, won't weigh much over 175 pounds tonight, and Pastor will come in at 185 or thereabouts.

Then there is the matter of speed. Conn is faster than a whippet late for supper, and Pastor is only a shade less peedy with his hands and feet.

There is nothing to choose between the courage of the Pittsburgh adonis and the New Yorker. Conn has proved in a score of fights that he has his full share of fighting heart, and one has only to see Pastor get off the floor four times in the first round of his Detroit bout with Joe Louis to know that there is no "chicken" in his make-up.

So, why do I like Pastor?

I don't know, unless it be because I feel that Pastor is the smarter of the two. Not smarter in book learning, but smarter in the ways of the ring. The New Yorker hasn't had it quite as easy as Conn. Pastor has fought just about everybody in the country, including Louis. He came up the slow, hard way, whereas Conn was a sensation almost from the start and has yet to meet the class of fighter that Pastor has faced.

The winner of tonight's fight will probably get a shot at Louis late next month. This dire prospect should be consolation enough for the loser.

SIRENS ANNOUNCE NEW FIRE ENGINE

Redmond Truck Is Driven From Detroit

Redmond, Aug. 13—Redmond's new fire truck, driven by John Berning of the Redmond volunteer fire department, arrived in town Monday after a seven day trip from Detroit, Michigan.

With siren screaming, Berning drove the big white fire engine, resplendent with gleaming nickel, into town shortly after noon, bringing residents of Redmond from all sides to get a first look at the new equipment. The truck was delivered by Berning to Mayor E. C. Parker, fire chief, and parked on Sixth street, where it drew an interested group of admirers throughout the afternoon.

The new \$3,500 truck has triple combination equipment, including a powerful 500-gallon pump, extension and roof ladders, and hose. It carries a search light, hose lights, bell and siren. Fire fighting equipment by the General Fire Truck company, is mounted on a Dodge chassis and was bought through Franks Motor company.

Mayor Parker expressed himself as very well pleased with the new equipment, which he said would be an asset to the community. The city may soon be able, Parker said, to employ a paid fireman to sleep at the fire hall, and this together with the new engine should result in savings on insurance rates to the town which will far more than pay for the cost of the engine.

Insurance reductions believed possible under such a set-up vary from 5 to 7 per cent on residence property to 15 per cent on mercantile property, according to L. E. Garrison, Redmond insurance man. Mayor Parker said a representative of the Oregon Insurance rating bureau would be asked to come to Redmond as soon as possible to test the new pump.

Berning reported a pleasant trip in the new fire engine from Detroit, and said that he had never talked so much about Redmond before in all his life. Everywhere he stopped with the big truck, which bears the words "Redmond Fire Department" in gold letters, people wanted to know about Redmond and Central Oregon. Mrs. Berning accompanied him on the trip.

Portland Chiropodist Opens Office in Bend

Dr. R. E. Dallen, registered chiropodist and foot orthopedist, opened his office in room 26 of the O'Kane building yesterday. Dr. Dallen, who received his D. S. C. degree two years ago from the University of California, has been with the firm of Drs. De Vany, in Portland, for the past 18 months.

Dr. Dallen is a native Oregonian, having been reared at Union, in eastern Oregon. Except for his years at the University of California at Berkeley, he has always resided in Oregon. He is unmarried.

NAVY MAN TELLS OF EARHART HUNT

Predicts Disappearance to Remain Mystery

Highlights of the cruise of the U. S. S. Colorado through the south Pacific in search of Miss Amelia Earhart and her navigator, Captain Fred Noonan, were related here today by H. S. Waller, chief machinist mate and member of the Colorado's crew on the epochal hunt. Chief Waller is now in Bend, on recruiting duty for the navy, with headquarters in the postoffice building. He will be here until Wednesday, and will be in Prineville on Thursday and Friday, in the court house.

Just what did happen to Miss Earhart and her navigator, Captain Fred Noonan, is something that in all probability will never be known," Waller said. "Why she ran out of fuel is the big mystery. Airplane experts say she should have had plenty, even if she was bucking a head wind. But I can't understand why she didn't find her plane wreckage. However, it is my personal opinion that she no sooner hit than the plane went to the bottom."

It was on July 2, 1937, that the U. S. S. Colorado, in Honolulu, received a message from Miss Earhart and her navigator that they had but one hour's fuel supply left, and no land in sight. "Our radio operators kept tuned in, but no further word was ever received," Waller said.

"Miss Earhart was to land on Howland island, where a landing field had been established. The coast guard cutter Itasca was standing by there, to assist her, but no assistance was needed, for she never arrived."

"When no further word was received, the Itasca began an immediate search, but to find a plane in the ocean is like trying to find the proverbial needle in a haystack. The Colorado, being the only large navy ship available, was ordered to assist in the search."

After taking on fuel at Pearl Harbor navy yard, the Colorado made a high speed run to Howland island, day and by night, the Colorado and her three seaplanes searched the area, without success. "At night we played our powerful searchlights on the water and in the air, in the hope that she would see them and send up the rockets we knew she carried."

Waller said the Colorado's search continued for about a week.
