Dewey's Defeat Is Seen Ahead of Time

Piles of Wires Received To Boost Willkie Nomination

The story of the Philadelphia convention which nominated Wendell Willkie and Charles McNary was related last night at a special meeting of Pro-American national committee men. The meeting was held at the home of William Niskanen, county republican chairman.

Highlights and sidelights of the historic convention were told informally by Cake, several of them "off the record."

As early as the Sunday immediately preceding the start of convention business it was apparent that Dewey had no chance to be nominated, according to Cake. Dewey was snappy and irritable in his interviews with the delegates, and estimates made by his followers of the first ballot were so high that it was evident they hoped thus to get the nomination for Dewey at the outset.

Policy in agreeing upon a foreign policy platform plank postponed the start of nominating speeches a few hours, said the committeeman. About 27,000 persons packed the convention hall for the nominations Wednesday.

After Willkie's nominating speaker was booed by the delegates, two of his chief lieutenants were ready to pack their bags and go home that night, revealed Cake, convinced that Willkie could not obtain more than 250 votes.

However, after the third ballot was cast Thursday night, and a request for adjournment had not been made by Taft supporters, Cake stated he was convinced nothing could stop the Willkie boom. The delegates, unwilling to accept the new figure until they were sure he actually had the backing of the people, and was not put forward by Wall Street, were receiving thousands of wires from their home states.

Cake himself received an average of 250 telegrams a day insisting Willkie be nominated, and he said that Alfred Landon of Kansas showed him a pile of approximately 6,000 wires that came Thursday for him, all backing the Commonwealth & Southern president.

A humorous note of the convention was the polling of the Georgia delegation on the very ballot. There were several delegates from the Georgia group, Cake explained, and when they understood that their voices would go out on a national network, they insisted on letting the folks back home hear them on every ballot.

With Willkie nominated, the job of selecting a good running mate was faced. Cake conferred with the nominee for an hour and a half early Friday morning in the latter's hotel room, while Willkie sat around in pajamas. In response to requests, Cake gave Willkie "a hundred reasons" why McNary should be vice-presidential nominee.

Later that morning, with several other Willkie backers, Cake met, and discussed the choice of a vice president. Then he called McNary on the telephone, in the presence of Willkie and the other men, and asked him to run.

At first McNary refused to consider the nomination. He had told Cake earlier that he intended to retire to his filbert farm after his present term in the senate expired. After 15 minutes of persuasion, during which Cake told McNary that the senate owed it to the people of Oregon and to the republican party to permit his name to be put forward for the vice-presidency, McNary yielded.

AUSTRALIAN CRASH KILLS CABINET MEN

Plane Cracks Up on Way To Meeting

Canberra, Australia, Aug. 13 (AP)—Three cabinet ministers, the chief of the Australian general staff, two other passengers and a crew of four crashed to death in a Royal Air Force airplane two miles from Canberra airport today.

Other cabinet ministers were at once sworn in to fill temporarily the posts of the key men who crashed—the ministers for army and air and the prime president of the executive council.

The crash, a national tragedy, came as the plane was about to land at Canberra, the capital, to which the ministers were on their way to a cabinet meeting.

Aslike Crop Ready; Peas, Vetch Roll in

Redmond, Aug. 13—Aslike harvest is beginning this week, pea and vetch crops are rolling rapidly in to market, and harvest of barley and oats is well under way in the Central Oregon region. It is reported here.

On the George Cooley ranch at Terrebonne, aslike clover is already being harvested. Tilman Haynes at Powell Butte plans to begin cutting aslike Wednesday. The pea and vetch harvest is now in its second week, and it begins to appear that yields will be considerably better than was expected three weeks ago. Some high yields reported at the Deschutes Grain and Feed company here run as high as 1400 pounds per acre on peas and 1000 pounds on vetch.

Yields in general on grain crops have been good. Several 100 bushel per acre yields have been reported on barley and oats. The wheat harvest has not yet started here.

HOOD FIRE PUT OUT

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—Fears aroused by the German aerial blitzkrieg against Great Britain brought declines of 1 to 6 points in stocks today.

Steel, chemicals, motors, and aircrafts were hardest hit. All groups joined the decline. Losses in railroad and utilities sections were smaller than elsewhere.

Dow Jones preliminary closing stock averages: industrial, 122.98, off 4.28; rail, 26.46, off 0.83; utility, 21.95, off 0.60; and 65 stocks, 41.77, off 1.39.

Stock sales approximated 640,000 shares, the most since 670,000 were traded July 30 and compared with only 290,000 shares yesterday. Curb stock sales were 123,900 shares against 49,000 yesterday.

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MT. WASHINGTON CLIMBED BY PARTY

Portland Climbers Make Ascent on South Side

First scaled on August 26, 1923, by six Bend youths who made the ascent from the north side, dangerous Mt. Washington, pinnacled peak of the Central Oregon Cascades, was recently climbed from the south side, according to information in the current issue of the Mazama, publication of a well-known Portland alpine organization. The ascent of the forbidding south wall was made by a party of Mazamas and Wy-East climbers consisting of Eldon Metzger, Jim Mount, Ralph Calkins, Ida and Everett Darr.

The climb up the south face of the 7,669-foot high pinnacle that overlooks the Santiam country was an ambition of many years standing of Everett Darr, organizer of the party. Following a scouting trip the week-end preceding the actual climb, the party started from Big Lake, circling the base of the pinnacle to the south face. Using ropes, carabiners, rock hammers and an assortment of pitons, the party proceeded methodically to climb directly up the south wall of the great pinnacle. Metzger led over the difficult and abrupt rise at the start of the actual climb.

The climb of the main pinnacle, about 500 feet, required four and a half hours. After reaching the summit, the party elected to return by the same route, and in less than two hours the last man was skimming down the rope.

The party reported the south and west faces of Washington are of unusually firm basalt and ideal for piton practice work, and that several alternate and sporty routes to the summit are evident, "and can be made if you have the skill and nerve."

In the first ascent of the mountain, by the Bend boys in 1923, one of the alpinists, Leo Harriman, lost his foothold on the rocks of the north face and clung by his hands to avoid an almost perpendicular drop of 800 feet. The Bend boys used a rope in reaching a steep series of lava chimneys near the top. Ervin McNeal was leader of the 1923 party.
