## Tigers and Cleveland Meet Today

### Bob Feller Fails to Rescue Indians Late in Game

New York, Sept. 21 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers, regarded as humpty-dumpty last spring, were back in undisputed possession of the American league lead today for the fourth time in 13 days and, to all intents and purposes, it will take more than Cleveland's "team of mutiny" to oust them again.

The Tigers' blazing finish yesterday before 22,508 fans at Detroit which enabled them to rescue a game almost lost, but the doughty Detroiters in a position to deal the Indians a fatal blow in the second game of the series today. Schoolboy Rowe, leading American league pitcher with 15 victories and only three defeats, was primed to scalp the Indians. He's beaten the Tribe twice this season and hasn't lost to them. Cleveland must depend on Al Milnar, uncertain southpaw who hasn't registered a decision against the Tigers all year.

If ever a team had another in a position to hammer home a crushing loss, that's where the Indians had the Tigers yesterday. With one out in the eighth, the Indians led, 4-1. Up to this point Mel Harder had allowed the Tigers only three hits. But at this critical moment Harder weakened slightly and Manager Oscar Vitt weakened even more. When Harder walked McCosky and Geringer singled, Vitt quit on his pitcher. He stopped the game and brought in Bob Feller.

These three hits, combined with Beau Bell's fumble on York's single, gave the Tigers a 5-4 lead. Joe Dobson replaced Feller, and Pete Fox singled. After a squeeze play failed with Higgins being caught at the plate, Bruce Campbell, an ex-Indian, singled, scoring Fox with what proved to be the winning tally.

The two clubs still have five games left to play with each other but Cleveland's lack of ability to come through in the clutch and Detroit's Indian sign on Feller make the Tigers favorites to come through with one of the biggest upsets in baseball history.

In the last night game of the season, the St. Louis Browns edged the Chicago White Sox, 7-6, before 10,263 persons: Harland Clift homered for the Browns in the first with the bases loaded while Jack Rosenthal hit one for the White Sox.

## SEATTLE LEADING IN COAST PLAYOFF

### Rainiers Hold 2-1 Edge in Series

Jo-Jo White's fifth inning home run with Al Niemiec on base gave Seattle the margin by which it defeated Oakland, 4 to 2, last night in the playoff for the Pacific Coast league's president's cup. The win gave the Rainiers a 2 to 1 edge in the series.

Los Angeles took a similar game margin over San Diego by trimming the Padres, 5 to 2, shellacking Wally Hebert, the best of the San Diego hurlers, for 11 hits. White's home run was inside the park and came after Gilly Campbell had scored on Niemiec's single and Pitcher Paul Gregory's sacrifice fly.

## McLemore's Sport Parade

Pittsburgh, Sept. 21 (AP)—If Paul Derringer were a miracle worker off the mound as well as on it, he would see to it that both the Detroit and the Cleveland collapsed, and that the Yankees got into the world series this year.

Paul was one of the Cincinnati Reds who spent an afternoon off here yesterday listening to the battle between the Indians and the Tigers, and for the life of him he couldn't work up much enthusiasm over the outcome.

"I'm still hoping that something will happen so the Yanks will get in the series against us," the big pitcher said. "I sure would like to have another crack at those fellows. And so would everybody else on the team. We haven't forgotten those four straight lickings, and with the club we have this year we could take 'em."

Did this mean that Paul felt the 1940 Reds were much stronger than the Reds of a year ago?

"Just 25 to 50 per cent stronger, that's all," Derringer answered. All you've got to do is look in the record and see the number of games we've won by one run this year. It's an amazing number—38. I think—and that's the proof of a great team. Anybody can win games by six and seven runs, but the good ones to win are those close ones."

I asked Paul which team the Reds would rather tackle, the Tigers or the Indians.

"Doesn't make much difference. We can lick either one of them. Of course, we know a little more about the Tigers. We played exhibition games against them and have a pretty fair line on their pitching and hitting. As for the Indians, not many of us have ever seen them in uniform, but we'll know plenty about them if they get the series."

Derringer said that if Ernie Lombardi's ankle didn't heal in time for the series (the big catcher is not with the club, but hobbling about his home in Cincinnati) the Reds wouldn't be sunk.

"We'll miss Ernie sure, particularly his bat, but there's nothing wrong with Jimmy Wilson's catching. He has caught seven or eight games since he got back in action, and everyone was a winning game. He's a right smart one back of that plate."

Derringer, as well as Walters and Thompson will take their regular turn until the season ends.

"The Cards and Pirates are still fighting it out for third money you know," Derringer explained, "and besides, we don't need any rest."

## COURTHOUSE NOW BEING PLASTERED

### Lathing Crew at Work on Second Floor

Plastering of rooms in the new Deschutes county courthouse on the Bond street cutoff is now well underway, it was announced today by J. Elwood Isted, county inspector of general construction on the project.

Four plasterers, who will give three coats of plaster to interiors, have finished first coats on the ground floor, and are now working on the second floor. Two lathers, placing metal lath, are also employed on the second floor, after finishing work on the ground floor.

The composition roof to the courthouse was completed last week, said Isted, and nearly all of the wall forms have been stripped. Workers are now touching up the outside concrete surface in preparation for painting and sand blasting.

Two cement finishers are finishing the floors and steps of the building, two plumbers and a helper, and one steam fitter and helper are also keeping the plumbing and heating work well up to schedule, which calls for completion of the courthouse by January 1, 1941.

Only one carpenter is now employed on odd jobs about the structure, at present setting the guides for the outside steps. Waterproofing of the jail floor on the roof of the courthouse is now finished. One electrician is installing the service entrances. Placing of jail steel in the cell blocks will start next week, and plastering and lathing will continue, said Isted.

## Father Coughlan to Be Sent to Roseburg

Word has been received at the Catholic rectory here that Father William Coughlan is being transferred to Roseburg, where he will be promoted to the office of pastor of that southern Oregon parish.

Father Coughlan will not go to Roseburg as a stranger. He was stationed there in 1935, on his arrival from Ireland. It was in 1936 that Father Coughlan came to Bend, under the pastorate of the late Father Luke Sheehan.

Father Coughlan plans to leave Bend on Monday for Roseburg, to take up his duties in his new parish.

## British Bombers Hit Italian Libyan Coast

Rome, Sept. 21 (AP)—British royal air force planes have made a heavy night bombing attack on Benghazi, Italian port and base on the Libyan coast, and caused heavy damage "to private residences," a high command communique disclosed today.

Damage was especially severe in the "zone inhabited by Moslems," the communique said. Casualties were put at three persons killed and 27 wounded.

The British raid was announced in connection with the assertion that in reprisal the Italian air force had "intensely" bombed railroad establishments, storehouses and defense works around Marsa Matruh in the British lines. "Noticeable" results were obtained, the communique said, and large explosions and fires were observed.

Prineville, Sept. 21 (Special)—A fire, which threatened the fuel bin and sawdust burner at the Ochocho Lumber company mill here Thursday, was quickly put out when the Prineville volunteer fire department answered an alarm at about 11:00 a. m.
