MICE IN THE GRANARY
Savings may take the form of money, of credit or of goods. It would be hard to say which of these is the most vulnerable, the most easily dissipated. Dollars take wings readily enough, but useless purchases may wipe out not only the individual's bank account but his credit rating as well.

Deschutes county has a granary of savings potentially available for the coming year. The county's budget makers—the members of the county court and the members of the advisory budget board—are the custodians of these savings.

Through intelligent use of such savings, Deschutes county may provide for a warrant retirement fund of at least \$25,000. No levy for this purpose has been made in the last two years.

These things will not be done if there are holes in the corners of the county's granaries. It is well known that there are funds available for next year's budgeting, funds which, conceivably, can be diverted to other purposes.

Washington—Although it has been more or less lost sight of in the press of more spectacular happenings, the government's drive to re-establish the rubber-growing industry in Latin America may eventually rate as one of the most important events of the year.

Incidentally, it would probably mean more exports for the United States, by vastly increasing Latin America's purchasing power.

PERENNIAL REQUEST GRANTED
Every year for a long time the agriculture department has been asking congress to finance the experimental and research work which must be done before the industry can be re-established in the new world.

What it could do then, however, would be plenty.
British and Dutch growers, secure in their monopoly, have let themselves get stuck with what industry would call an obsolete plant.

Best guess right now is that the Latins could sell profitably at 10 cents a pound—as compared with the current level of around 20 cents for the Far East.
