STOCK PRICES STEADY TODAY

Preferred Issues Set Up Wide Gains

Lessened Fear of German Invasion Adds Strength To Market

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

New York, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—The stock market was firm today for the seventh consecutive session, heavy industry shares meeting bulk of the demand.

Preferred stocks set up wide gains, some reaching new 1940 peaks. The main stock list was up fractions to a point. Trading was quiet.

Sentiment was favorable to ward stocks with both the war and domestic business news considered encouraging.

Reports of new royal air force successes lessened fears of a German invasion of Britain over the weekend. The automobile, steel and retail trade industries highlighted the business news.

Most stock market activity centered in heavy industry issues.

Steel, motor, aircraft, electrical equipment, merchandising shares and coppers were firm. Most rails had small gains and utilities were steady.

Dow Jones preliminary closing stock averages: industrial, 132.45; up 0.84; rail, 28.46; up 0.19; utility, 21.95; off 0.03; 65 stocks, 44.59 up 0.25.

Stock sales rose to 260,000 shares from 170,000 last Saturday while curb stock volume was 46,000 shares against 26,000 in the short session a week ago.

BOSTON WOOL
Boston, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—A substantial amount of business was transacted in Boston this week on good combining fine territory and Texas wools, the U. S. agriculture department reported today.

Half blood wools shared moderately in the buying movement, but coarser wools had spotty demand. Prices strengthened on fine and half blood western wools. Graded combining bright fleece wools received some demand at grease basis at 35-37 cents for fine delaine, 36-37 for 1/2 blood, 40-42 for 3/4 blood and 41-42 for 1/4 blood.

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1941 Chevrolet Now On Display in Bend

A Chevrolet that is longer, wider, and more massive looking is on display today at the Bend Garage on Wall street. The new 1941 models have just been received, and present streamline bodies, with many mechanical improvements.

The vacuum power shift introduced last year, is standard on all models this year. Running boards are omitted, enhancing the sleek appearance of the cars. Hinges on all trunks and doors are concealed. Sides of the body extend outward and downward noticeably farther than last year, and the skirt of each door conceals a convenient rubber-ribbed safety step to facilitate entrance.

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
