Thoroughness Brought Win Over Michigan

Bierman Called Greatest Tactician in Football

Chicago, Nov. 13 (UP)—His coaching rivals are just about ready to petition Washington to call out another batch of marines. They figure that's the only way they can stop the man the United Press nominates as coach of the week.

Bernie Bierman of Minnesota. A captain in the U. S. marines during the World War, Bierman now is a major in the marine reserves. He may be called up in the next order from Washington, but as long as he is camped at Minnesota, the rough and rugged Golden Gophers will strike fear in the hearts of Big Ten foes.

Bierman usually retains his standing as the cold, calculating silent type. So others talk about Bernie:

"He is one of football's greatest tacticians," said Coach Herbert O. Fritz of Michigan, and Michigan men ought to know. The Wolverines, for years a link team for Minnesota, now have lost seven games in a row and it was Bierman who stopped them.

"He is great because he is so thorough," Fritz said. "No detail is too unimportant. A little thing gone wrong can mess up a play as easily as a missed major assignment."

It was attention to little things that drove Michigan from the ranks of the undefeated last Saturday. Michigan and its great Tommy Harmon rolled up and down the muddy field, throttled Minnesota's attack, scored one touchdown and threatened on four other occasions.

Minnesota never threatened once, but Bierman and his aids knew of a flaw in the Michigan defense. At the proper moment, Bruce Smith sneaked through

Minnesota, despite defeats, won conference titles in 1937 and 1938. It is favored now to win its fifth title in the eight years of Bierman coaching.

Coast League Season To Open on April 5

Hollywood, Nov. 13 (UP)—The Pacific Coast baseball league season will open April 5, and end Sept. 21, 1941, league directors announced today at their annual meeting.

The season will consist of 24 weeks and two days during which each team will play 176 games. It was announced by the directors. Following the announcement the baseball men went into executive session at the Hollywood Knickerbocker hotel.

President W. C. Tuttle presided over the closed meeting and indicated that the adoption of a new constitution for the league was scheduled for early consideration. The new constitution was drawn up by Victor Ford Collins, president of the Hollywood club, and a prominent attorney.

Dallas, Nov. 13 (UP)—Thank goodness, the Cleveland Indians have named a manager for the 1941 season.

Now there won't be any lack of amusement for the baseball fans during the long winter evenings. They can gather about the fireplace, stove or radiator and start guessing who will manage the Indians in 1942.

I don't like to scoop my fellow reporters (as you must have noticed during the past ten years) but I have a red hot tip on Peckinpaugh's successor. From a source who is so close to the Cleveland front office that he doesn't fit, I have learned that the following men are being given serious consideration as the Indians' pilot season after next:

1. Mickey Cochrane, former Detroit manager who is now in the automobile industry, but who is said to yearn for the good old days of second-guessers, fair weather friends, and abrupt dismissals.

2. Babe Ruth, whose followers still feel he was given a raw deal by baseball.

3. Bucky Harris, manager of Washington, who is said to be determined to get with a ball club which has pitchers with names he can pronounce.

4. The author of "Take Me Out to the Ball Game."

5. Cy Slapnicka, who has been managing the Indians for years.

6. Alva Bradley, president of the Indians, who is said to want a place on the bench so he can hear player complaints more readily.

7. Oscar Vitt, the manager who was just fired. The report is that the Indians dislike Vitt so much they want to punish him to the utmost, and the best way they can think of to do this is to re-hire him and give him another season in the Cleveland bench.

Now that Peckinpaugh has taken the job for 1941, the country shouldn't wait too long before arranging a national celebration in his honor. He had the job once before—I think he started in 1928 and lasted until he got the pink slip in the middle of the 1933 season—and his willingness to have another try merits a nationwide applause.

The hiring of Peckinpaugh so many months before the start of the 1941 season was a thoughtful act on the part of the Indians' management. Now the members of the team will have time to arrange a fitting reception for him. They will have most of November, and all of December, January and February to get together such things as parchment for petitions of dismissal, clubrooms in which to hold their sessions of revolt, and knives specially built to fit in the small of the back. Too, they will have ample time between now and the time spring training starts to scout Peckinpaugh's weaknesses and be ready to start kicking him around. Furthermore, the players will have time enough to meet and correspond and decide on the strategy they want Peckinpaugh to use.
