

Churches Plan Special Services and Programs

Special services and programs in most of Bend's 19 churches will commemorate the Christmas season tomorrow, and bring the Yuletide spirit to church-goers with cantatas, candle lighting services, sermons, pageants, readings, and treats for the children.

At least eight churches will have their Sunday school entertainments Sunday evening or morning. The Westminster Presbyterian church had its program last night, and the Trinity Lutheran Bible school will wait until Christmas eve to present its children's program.

At St. Francis of Assisi Catholic church there will be a procession of children bearing the image of the newborn babe of Bethlehem. At the Trinity Episcopal church the annual pre-nativity candle light service of praise will be held Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Under the direction of Tom O'Brien, the choir will present a program of Christmas music. On Christmas eve the regular mid-night eucharist will be held at 11:15 o'clock.

Christmas festivities at the First Methodist church will be climaxed with two events tomorrow. The first is the annual Christmas service at 11 o'clock, with music, message, and other features.

Theme of the evening's service at the Methodist church will be "The Old, Old Story, Ever New." Children of all ages will participate in the program. A large snow-covered cabin with Santa and his reindeer, and a huge Christmas tree will have a central place in the setting. Half a hundred candles will be lighted.

The First Presbyterian church choir, with Mrs. Lela Schwendker at the organ, will present the Christmas cantata, "The Star and the Song," at a candle light vesper service Sunday afternoon at 4:30. The church has been decorated for the occasion with tall candleholders throughout the sanctuary, appropriate greenery, and a nativity creche on the chancel. The Sunday school Christmas program will be held at 9:45 a. m.

A Sunday morning observance of the nativity will begin the day at the First Christian church. Christmas anthems by the choir will feature the morning service.

Captor of de Tristan Kidnaper Visits Bend

Ellis Woods, one of the two captors of the kidnaper of three-year-old Marc de Tristan last September, paid Bend a visit yesterday on his way to New York city to receive a gold medal for his deed.

While in the city, Woods and his family visited his aunt, Mrs. D. G. Raymond, 138 East Norton, who did not realize until he told her, that Woods was involved in the de Tristan rescue.

It was in the Sierra-Nevada foothills that Woods and his companion, Cecil Wetzel, both lumbermen, apprehended the kidnaper September 22. He was later sentenced to life imprisonment for the crime.

Mrs. Raymond's discovery that she is related to the hero of the rescue links up both men with Bend people. Cecil Wetzel is a friend of the M. B. Smith family here.

According to Mrs. Raymond, Woods has prospered since September. With part of the reward money he has built a new home and bought logging equipment. On this trip, the expenses of himself and family have been paid to New York and back.

Holiday Hazards

Salem, Dec. 21 (Special)—The most dangerous time of day, so far as pedestrian traffic accidents are concerned, is from 5 to 8 p. m., accident statistics for Oregon show.

These figures are significant when applied to plans for Christmas because they indicate that it is wise to do your Christmas shopping early in the day in order to avoid the peaks of traffic congestion and thus run less risk of being involved in an accident. The morning hours before 11 o'clock and the afternoon hours between two and four o'clock are the safest times of the day for pedestrians. But regardless of the time of day, remember to cross streets only at intersections, look both ways before leaving the curb and don't overload yourself with packages which may obstruct your view.
