Special Issues Make Wide Swings

Most Shares Unchanged In Light Day on Market

New York, Dec. 21 (UP)—Stocks moved irregularly in light trading today.

Leading stocks were dull and little changed. A few special issues made wide swings. Consolidated Oil was active and firm. Seaboard Air Line Railway selling at 12 1/2 cents a share, its low for the year and General Electric, at a small decline, also were active.

Steel shares were about unchanged. Chrysler had a small loss and General Motors a gain. Public Service of New Jersey equaled its low and then firmed to a minor advance. Utilities generally were steady. Rails were little changed.

Tobacco sagged. Lorillard made a new low at 17 1/2 off 1/4 and Reynolds Tobacco B equaled its low at 30 1/2 off 1/4. American Tobacco B registered a small advance.

Best gainers were Cudahy Packing at 13 up 2 1/2. Walgreen preferred with warrants 104 1/2 up 2 1/2 and a new high; American Woolen preferred 54 1/2 up 1 1/2; American Hawaiian Steamship 38 1/2 up 1 1/2; and U. S. Shipsum 64 up 1. American Smelting preferred made a new high at 155 up 3 1/2.

NEW MATERIALS IN LICENSING SYSTEM

President's Move Boosts List to 73

Washington, Dec. 21 (UP)—President Roosevelt today issued a proclamation placing 15 additional materials under the export licensing system, including plans and equipment for the production of aviation lubricating oil.

The president's move boosted to 73 the number of crucial materials placed under the rigid licensing system.

The materials added to the list today included:

- Bromine; ethylene; cobalt; plastic molding machines and presses; gauges; measuring machines; testing machines; hydraulic pumps; tools incorporating industrial diamonds; equipment and plans for the production of aviation lubricating oil; ethylene dye-bromide; methylamine; strontium metals and ores; abrasives and abrasive products containing emery, corundum or garnet; as well as abrasive paper and cloth; and balancing machines.

The White House said that the 15 items were added to perfect the list of products covered in former proclamations.

Already under the export license system are aviation gasoline, machine tools, tin, rubber and other strategic and critical materials needed for the national defense.
