

LIBRARYRANKS HIGH IN STATE

Circulation Is Sixth
Highest

Ten-Year Survey Made by
State Librarian
At Salem

Although it has not ranked among the first 10 libraries in the state in number of volumes owned during the decade 1930-40, the Deschutes county library has consistently held sixth place in circulation throughout the period, it has been revealed by a ten-year survey of Oregon library facilities made by State Librarian Harriet C. Long, and received here by Librarian Myra B. Lyons.

Ashland, Eugene, La Grande, Klamath Falls, Baker, Medford, The Dalles, Salem, Pendleton and Portland all have more books on their shelves than Bend, but only Portland, Pendleton, Salem, Klamath Falls, and Medford have a greater circulation than the local library.

County library circulation here increased from 105,000 in 1929 to 154,000 in 1939, the survey shows. Volumes owned are only 18,130, as compared with Ashland's 19,121 books, tenth ranking in the state.

At the beginning of 1930 there were 108 free public libraries in the state, 74 of which had some support from tax funds. A decade later, there were 142 public libraries in Oregon, of which 102 were supported in some measure from tax funds.

Although total volumes owned increased 41 per cent during the 10 years in Oregon, public funds increased only two per cent, according to the figures of Librarian Long. Borrowers were up 17 per cent, and expenditures were seven per cent higher.

Eleven counties, of which Deschutes is one, have county libraries. The others are Multnomah, Malheur, Umatilla, Wasco, Hood River, Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Clackamas, and Clatsop.

Among the gifts to Oregon libraries mentioned in the survey, the \$20,000 Benson building given the Deschutes county library by Ramsey Benson, in the name of

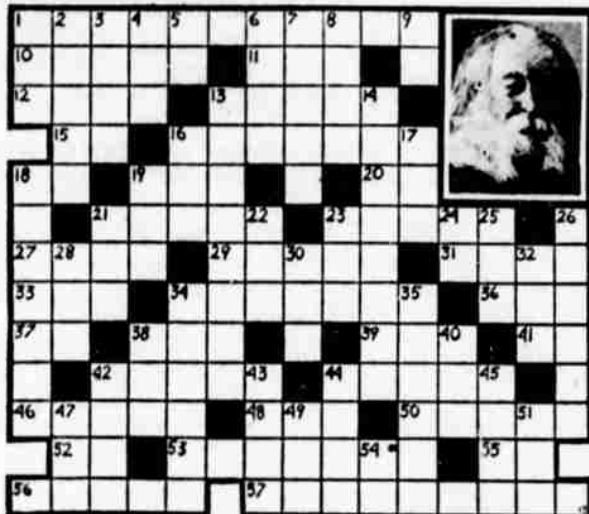

Charles Stuart Benson, was the second most valuable of the decade. First was the \$250,000 bequest of the late W. B. Ayer to the Library Association of Portland.

High school libraries at Bend and Pendleton are mentioned in the survey as "two good examples of how new library rooms have come to life in older buildings."

At the head of her discussion of library buildings, the librarian states: "The most recent public library building is the beautiful new \$100,000 county library building erected with WPA aid in Bend by Deschutes county in 1939."

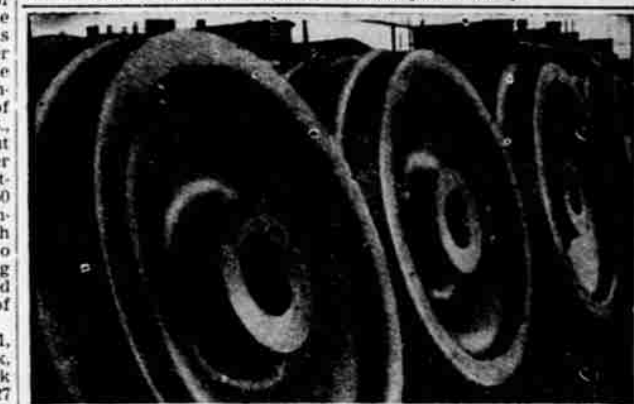

What the Quartermaster's Department is to the Army, the Stores Department is to a railroad. Some 70,000 items, ranging from tooth picks to telephone poles and coal to car wheels as pictured above, are quickly obtainable from storehouses and storage yards along the Great Northern's 8,000 miles of main and branch lines. Some 500 persons are kept busy handling these stocks of materials and supplies that inventory about \$9,000,000.

Feats in Tax-Eating

Some kinds of transportation are unable to stand on their own feet. To keep them going, it has been necessary to pour billions of your tax dollars into them.

The inland waterways probably are the worst examples. For instance, the Upper Mississippi River, from Minneapolis to St. Louis.

When you total up the tax dollars that have been lavished on this "improvement," and figure interest at 4 per cent, and add the annual cost of maintaining dams, locks and channel, you discover that to provide "cheap" transportation for those who can ship by river, it is costing the taxpayers about \$3.50 for every ton of freight floated.

This particular kind of transportation—slower than any other, frozen up completely for five months of the year, and contributing no taxes at all—requires taxpayers to pay out about \$10 for every \$1 it saves a shipper!

Highway transportation also leans heavily on the taxes paid by the owners of homes and farms and by other general taxpayers.

All of the various kinds of special taxes imposed on motor vehicles—many as they are represented to be, and mounting to really impressive totals—have been equivalent only to about one-half of the cost of maintaining and improving highways, bridges, roads and streets.

And this leaves nothing to compare with the taxes imposed on railroad transportation for the support of schools and the various other functions of government—which take about 10 cents of every dollar the railroads collect from their patrons.

Against such competitive odds as these, your railroad fights to maintain that volume of traffic without which unit costs go up—for railway transportation is mass transportation, dependent on volume to reduce costs.

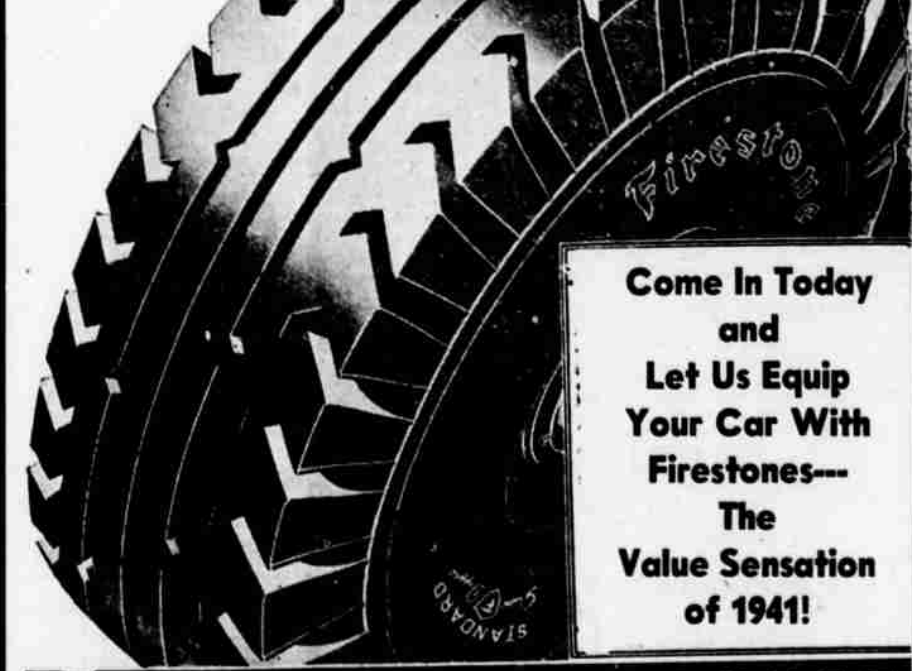
The key to the lowest possible railroad rates obviously is VOLUME—not the artificial diversion of traffic to tax-eating kinds of transportation.

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
