Today's Lesson in Flag Etiquette

RIGHT

WRONG

● Burning should be used for platforms or for the decoration of speakers' stands and for general decorations. The blue stripe should always be placed uppermost and the red at the bottom.

● On patriotic occasions, the flag may be displayed above and behind the speaker against a wall or curtain. If flown from a staff, it should be placed at the speaker's right.

● In church, the flag should be placed at the congregation's right. Other flags should be placed to the left of the congregation. In the chapel, or on a platform, the flag should be placed at the clergyman's right as he faces the congregation, and the other flags at his left.

● When one halyard is used for two or more flags, the American flag should always be flown at the peak. In displaying flags to adjacent staffs, the American flag should be hoisted first and lowered last.

● When the American flag is displayed with another flag with staffs crossed, the American flag should be on the right, with the staff over the staff of the other flag.

tive units with greatly diminished powers of legislation.

"The unique federal character of our government has been virtually destroyed," Sprague said. "We are now a national state."

The governor declared what he called the progressive centralization of authority and expressed the fear that it might end in the erection of a bureaucracy "unresponsive to popular will."

Sprague reviewed the reorganization of the state employment service in which he sought to make the body function actively as an agency for locating jobs and said that the results were gratifying. He pointed out that job openings have increased 245 per cent in the past two years. Payrolls, he said, have shown a 15 per cent increase.

Production High

The governor declared that Oregon now has reached first rank in the volume of its lumber production and that paper and pulp mills have been running at maximum capacity.

Mining, too, Sprague said, has reached new peaks of production during the past two years. He observed that he expects the Oregon economic council, headed by E. B. MacNaughton of Portland, to make important contributions to the state's economic development.

The governor cautioned, however, that part of Oregon's present prosperity is due to liberal federal expenditures for rearmament and declared: "We need, as individuals and as a state, to plan ahead if we hope to maintain the present levels of prosperity."

He warned the assembly against "devoting valuable time" to revising the present tax structure. Rather, he emphasized, the legislators should seek to apportion the revenues now available.

The most pressing need among state institutions, the governor told the meeting of both houses of the assembly, is for plant improvement at the state hospital at Salem. He described conditions there as "deplorable."

The governor called for the construction of new dormitories and a 300-bed hospital. With regard to the state highways, Sprague observed that there is a pressing demand for reconstruction of roads now regarded as "antiquated."

"There should also," Sprague emphasized, "be an equalization of the tax burden between railroads and commercial motor vehicles."

He cautioned the assembly to study carefully any changes demanded in the unemployment compensation law and to resist any pressure by group interests in keeping the law fair.

Taking note of the proposal to abolish trial by jury on appeals from the unemployment commission, the governor declared: "The importance of jury trials to workers and to the fund has been considerably exaggerated."

Regarding the state's principal industry of lumbering, the chief executive warned that "the cutting of virgin forests while giving the flush of prosperity, means a shortening of the life of this great asset."

He urged that bills which will be submitted to the assembly to enforce protection for the forests be given favorable action.

"A serious deficiency," the governor observed, "in the Oregon school system lies in vocational training." He urged that provision be made to expand this training through vocational schools situated at "strategic centers" over the state.

Labor relations, the governor said, have largely been taken over by federal agencies and laws. "Only time will tell," he remarked, "whether we can safely rely on Washington for justice and security in labor relations."

So far as public utilities are concerned, Sprague recommended to the assembly that an amendment be drafted which would permit the sale by negotiation of utility district bonds to the federal government.

Closing his report, Governor Sprague observed that, in his opinion, the state government has been a good one. He called for a resurgence of the pioneer spirit which, he said, would enable the state to originate and experiment for the general betterment.

LAVA BEARS LOSE SECOND IN SERIES

50 to 28 Score Posted at The Dalles

Bend's Lava Bear basket shooters wilted under an attack by Ed Dick and his cohorts of The Dalles Saturday night, making it possible for the Wasco county team to win, 50 to 28. On Friday night, the Indians barely got past Bend, to win 36 to 32 in one of the most thrilling games seen on The Dalles floor this season.

As a result of Saturday night's overwhelming defeat and the fine work of substitutes during the short time they were on the floor, Coach Hank Nilson anticipates there will be a considerable shake-up in the Bend squad, probably before the Prineville and Redmond games of this week-end.

The Bears will meet Prineville Friday night, on the Crook county floor, and on Saturday night, Redmond will come here for a game. Coach Nilson anticipates that his hard battle of the week-end will be against Prineville, inasmuch as the Cowboys gave Klamath Falls a real battle over the week-end.

Hard practice will be the menu awaiting the Bears this week, in preparation for their games with the Central Oregon teams.

On January 24, the University of Oregon Frosh will play Bend, on the Bend court.

Stolen Property Ring Cleared by Arrests

Portland, Jan. 13 (UP)—Arrests made simultaneously in four western cities by federal bureau of investigation agents were credited today with clearing up a \$250,000 stolen property ring.

FBI Agent J. Douglas Swenson of Portland arrested Joe Schnitzer, 45, Portland bail bond salesman and charged him with conspiracy to violate the national stolen property act.

Schnitzer resisted removal to Spokane to answer the charges when arraigned and a hearing was set for January 22 before U. S. Commissioner Kenneth Frazer.

At the same time, Federal Agents Harry Schuman in Spokane, James Pope and Maurice Simon in Los Angeles and Eddie Middleton in Yakima, on similar charges.

The FBI agents said they worked for 18 months to complete their investigation of the jewel and fur ring, uncovered after a series of thefts in Los Angeles.

Resolution to Deal With Delayed Code

Salem, Jan. 13 (UP)—Senator F. M. Francisovitch, R., Clatsop county, offered a resolution to the state senate today which would provide for the appointment of a special committee to consider the problems arising out of the belated delivery of the state annotated code.

The resolution was passed unanimously and Senate President Dean Walker, R., Polk county, named Francisovitch and Senator W. H. Strayer, Baker county, to confer with a similar house committee.

The two groups will try to ascertain what the proper procedure should be in dealing with the recently revised code. Francisovitch pointed out that a problem arises in that the code has not, as yet, been approved by the supreme court nor the office of Secretary of State Snell.

Francisovitch, in another motion also passed, moved that both houses refrain from any use of the code until its exact status has been determined.

Hopkins Received by King at Buckingham

London, Jan. 13 (UP)—King George received Harry Hopkins, personal emissary of President Roosevelt, at Buckingham palace today.

Hopkins remained with the king for more than 30 minutes.

Earlier the king received Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Lord Halifax, who is to leave soon to take up his new post of ambassador to the United States. Churchill's meeting with the king was the first since Christmas.
